DID YOU KNOW?



Declaration

Whereas, TRIO is the first set of federal programs to address the serious social, economic, and cultural barriers to higher education in the United States;

Whereas, today, more than 800,000 students in nearly 3,000 programs at host institutions, both urban and rural, make higher education a reality for students who are often the first members of their family to enroll in and graduate from college;

WHETERS, on Feb. 24, 1986, concurrent resolution H. Con. Res. 278 declared the sense of Congress that Feb. 28, 1986, should be designated as "National TRIO Day" and the achievements of the TRIO programs should be recognized;

Whereas, TRIO emerged from an understanding that low-income, first-generation students need more than financial aid to overcome systematic obstacles in the way of them acquiring a college degree;

Whereas, by recognizing the untapped potential and talent of low-income, first-generation Americans, with diverse racial and economic backgrounds, TRIO programs open the doors to education access and opportunity for all; and,

Bhereas, on the 35th anniversary of National TRIO Day we reaffirm our commitment to educational equity, access and opportunity for all;
