Make sure to get your forms signed and submitted before the April 12 deadline. If you applied, but didn't receive an acceptance letter, you have been placed on a waiting list. FASFA Troubleshooting issues or glitches:

- Common problems: Many students may encounter minor problems as they are filling out the FAFSA, such as being unable to move forward, getting kicked out of the FAFSA, unable to load the page, and many more problems. Sometimes these issues can be quickly resolved by doing a couple of things. (This is my go-to when I don't have an answer on how to fix the error or glitch.)
 - Clear cache and cookies off the browser. This can help remove any items that could be causing the studentaid.gov to glitch or not work. Here are [instructions](#) to clear cache and cookies off Google Chrome.
 - Try a different browser. Other browsers that could work are Firefox, Safari, or Microsoft Edge. However, studentaid.gov normally works best on Google Chrome.
 - Try a different computer or device, or restart the device used.
 - Try a different internet.

Contacting Federal Student Aid:

- I know we have had many issues getting ahold of Federal Student Aid's Information Center (FSAIC). I've heard of parents or students being on hold for hours and then getting hung up on, I've heard of Federal Student Aid not answering, and many other stories. So, how do you get ahold of them if they won't answer? If you have any students or parents that need to call, I highly recommend calling early in the morning right when the FSAIC opens. Families and counselors have had some luck getting ahold of them early in the morning.
 - Here are their hours of operation in Mountain Standard Time:
 - Monday–Friday: 6 a.m.–8 p.m.
 - Saturday: 9 a.m.–3 p.m.
 - Sunday: Closed
 - Closed on all federal holidays.
