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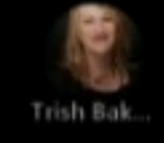

- Healthcare district (north), innovation district (west), housing district (south)

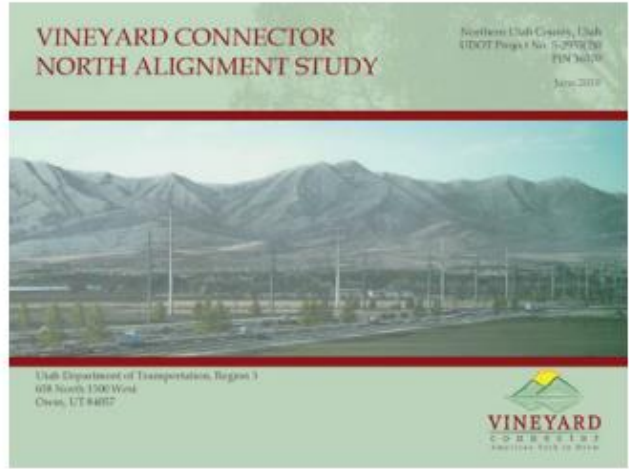

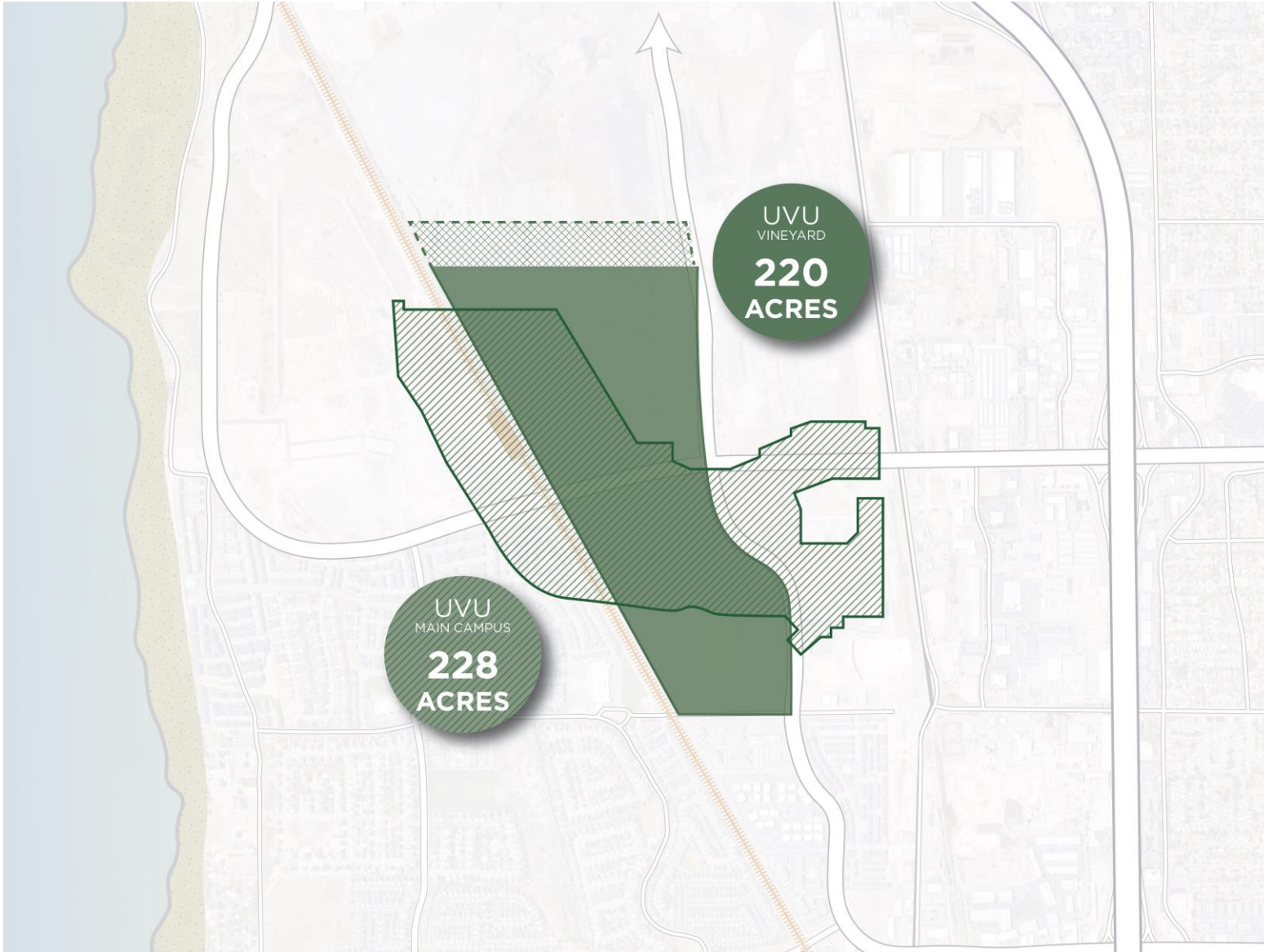

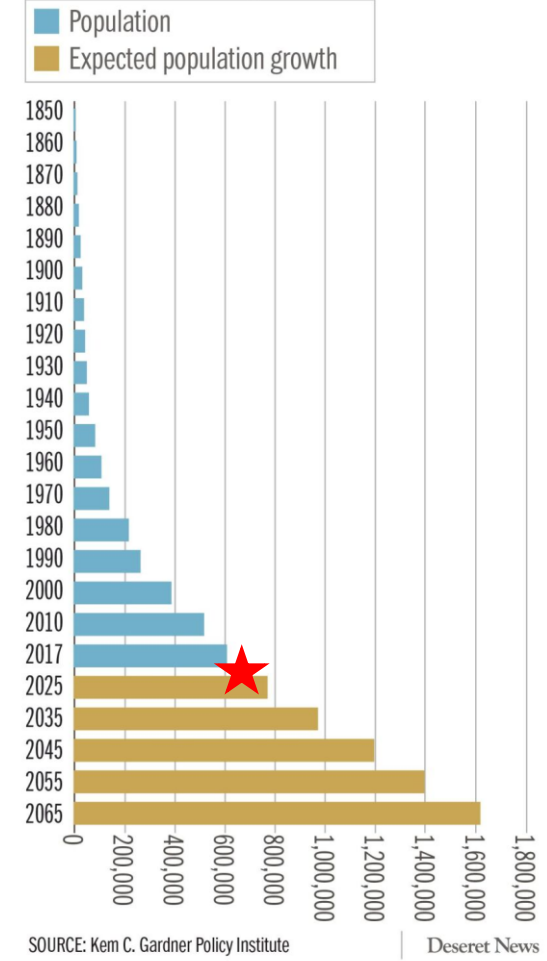

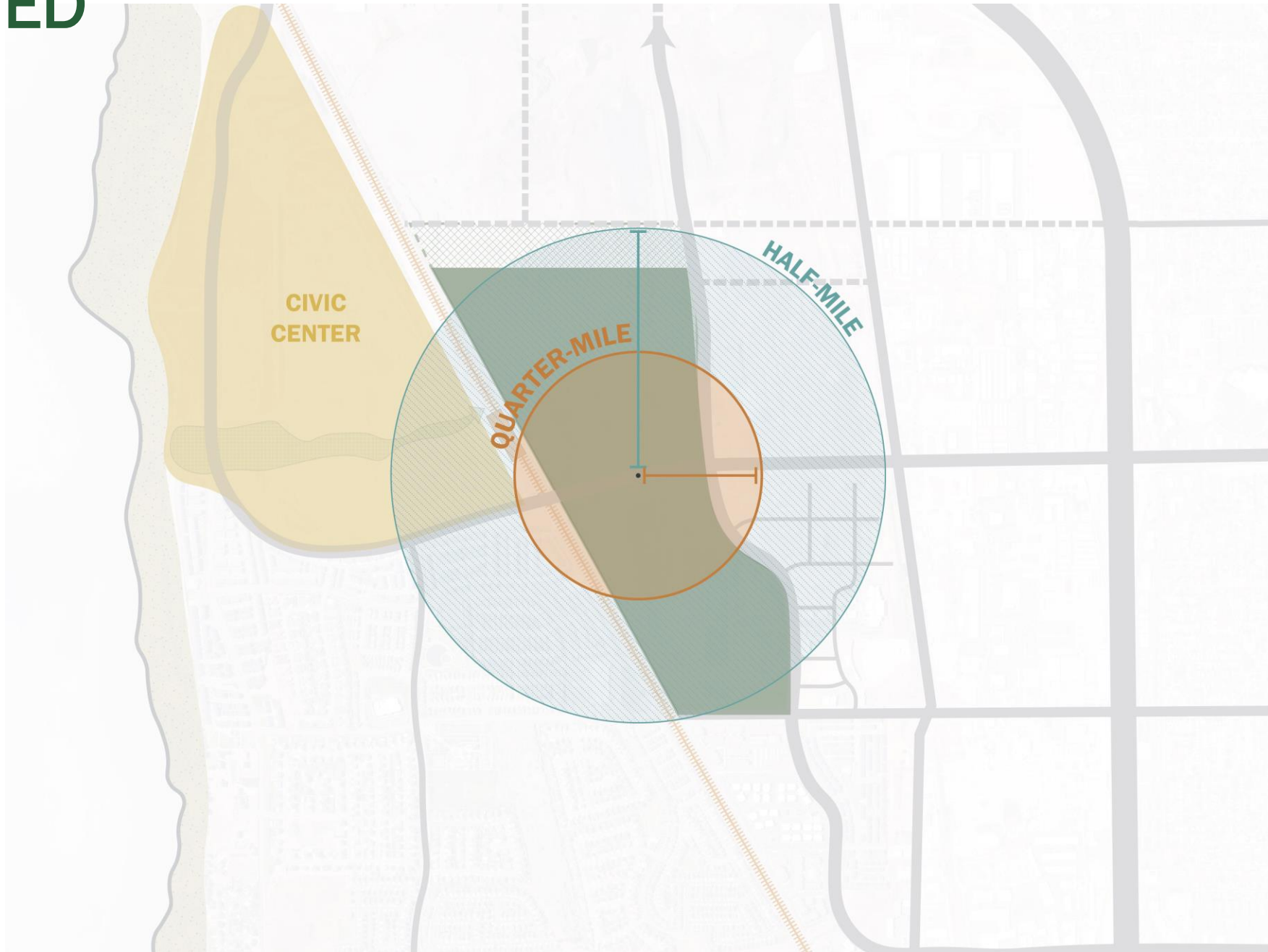

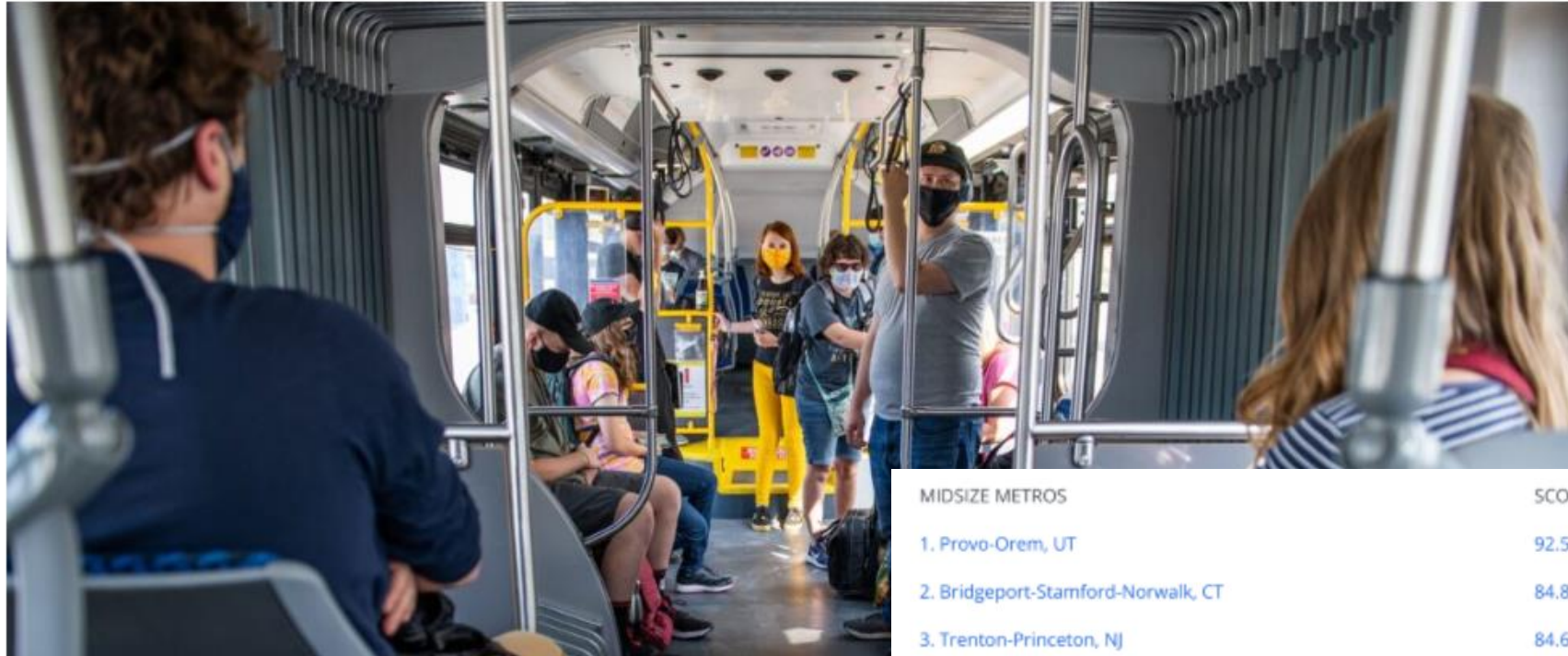

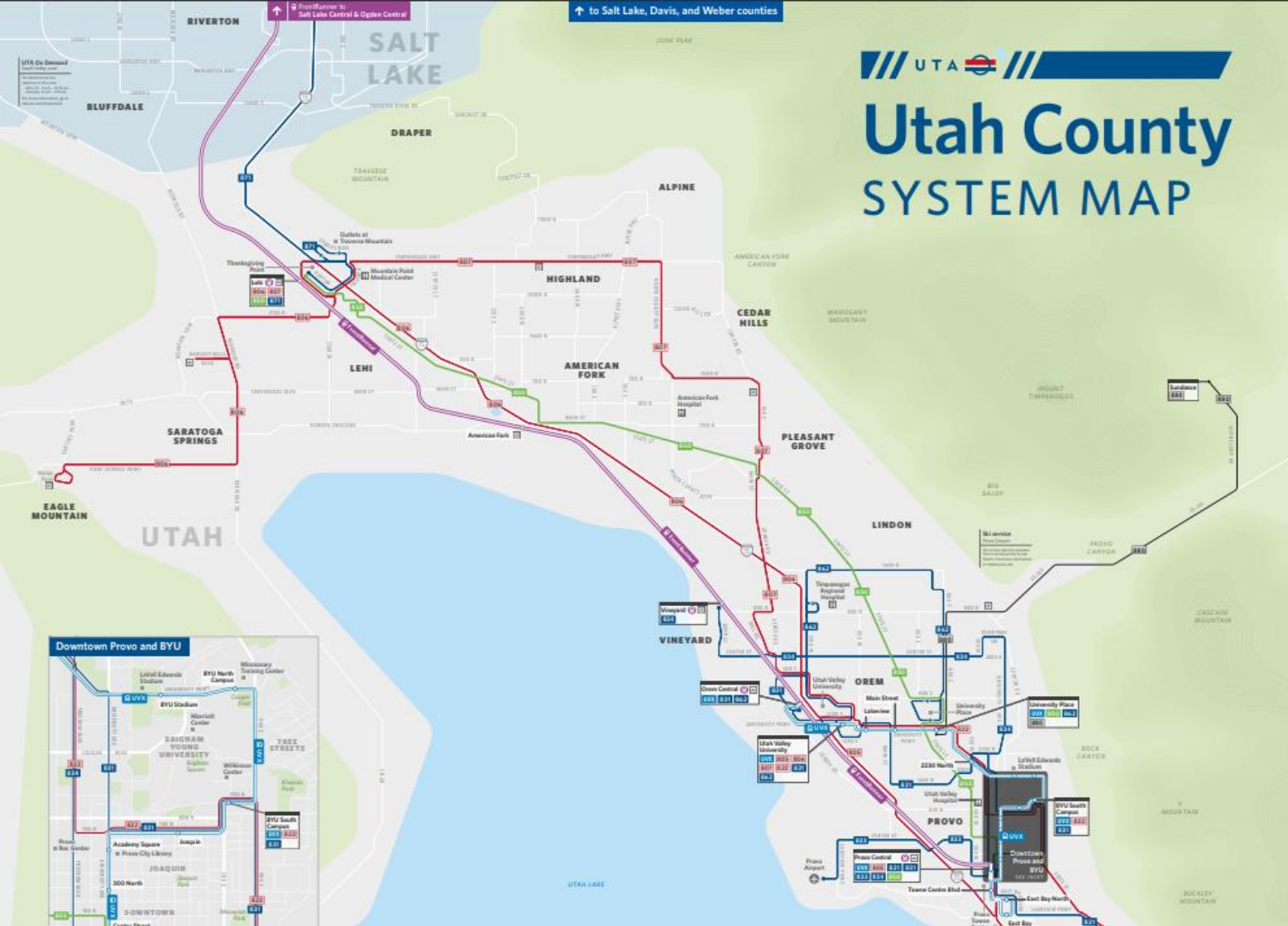

North Utah County Transit Map

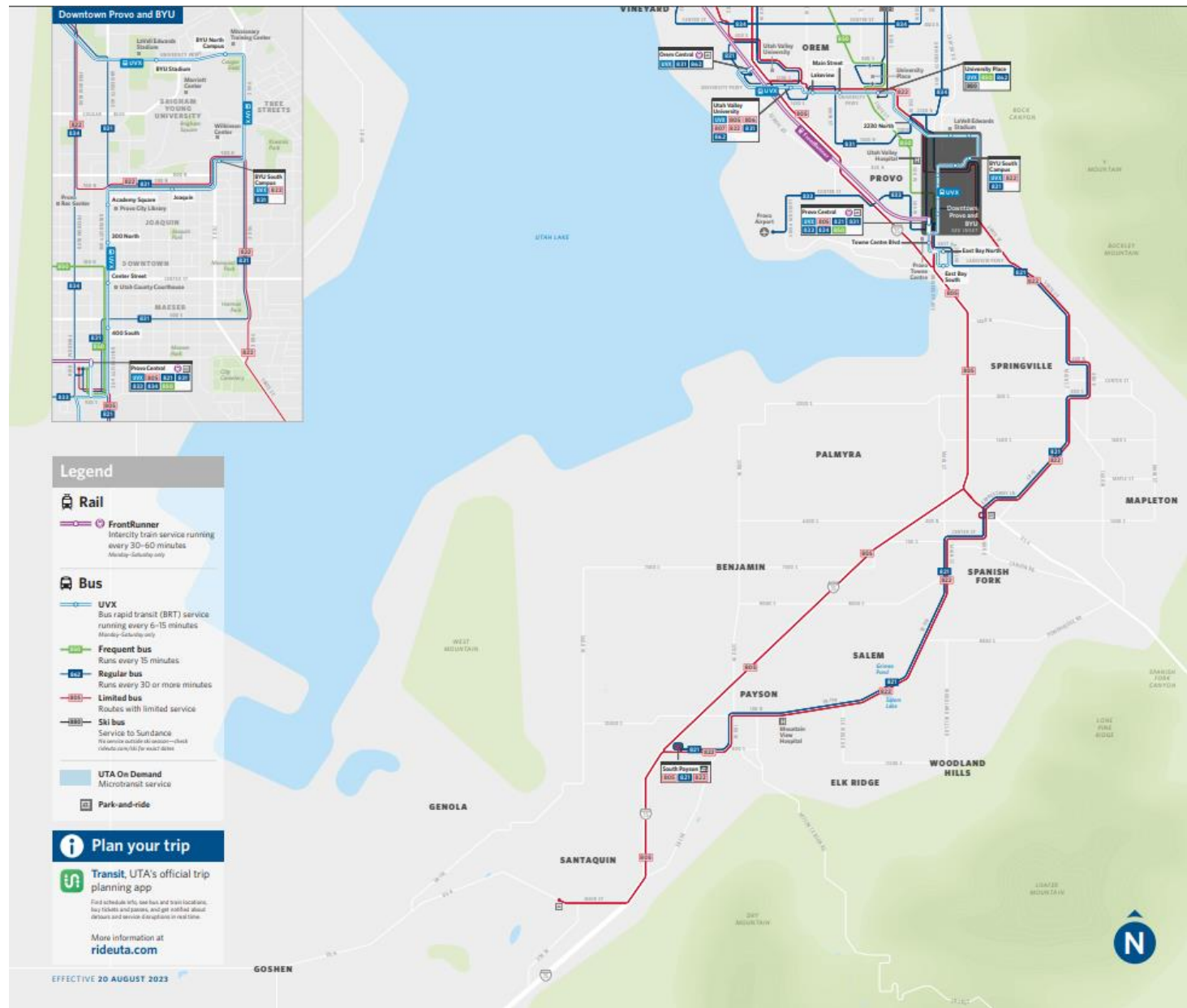

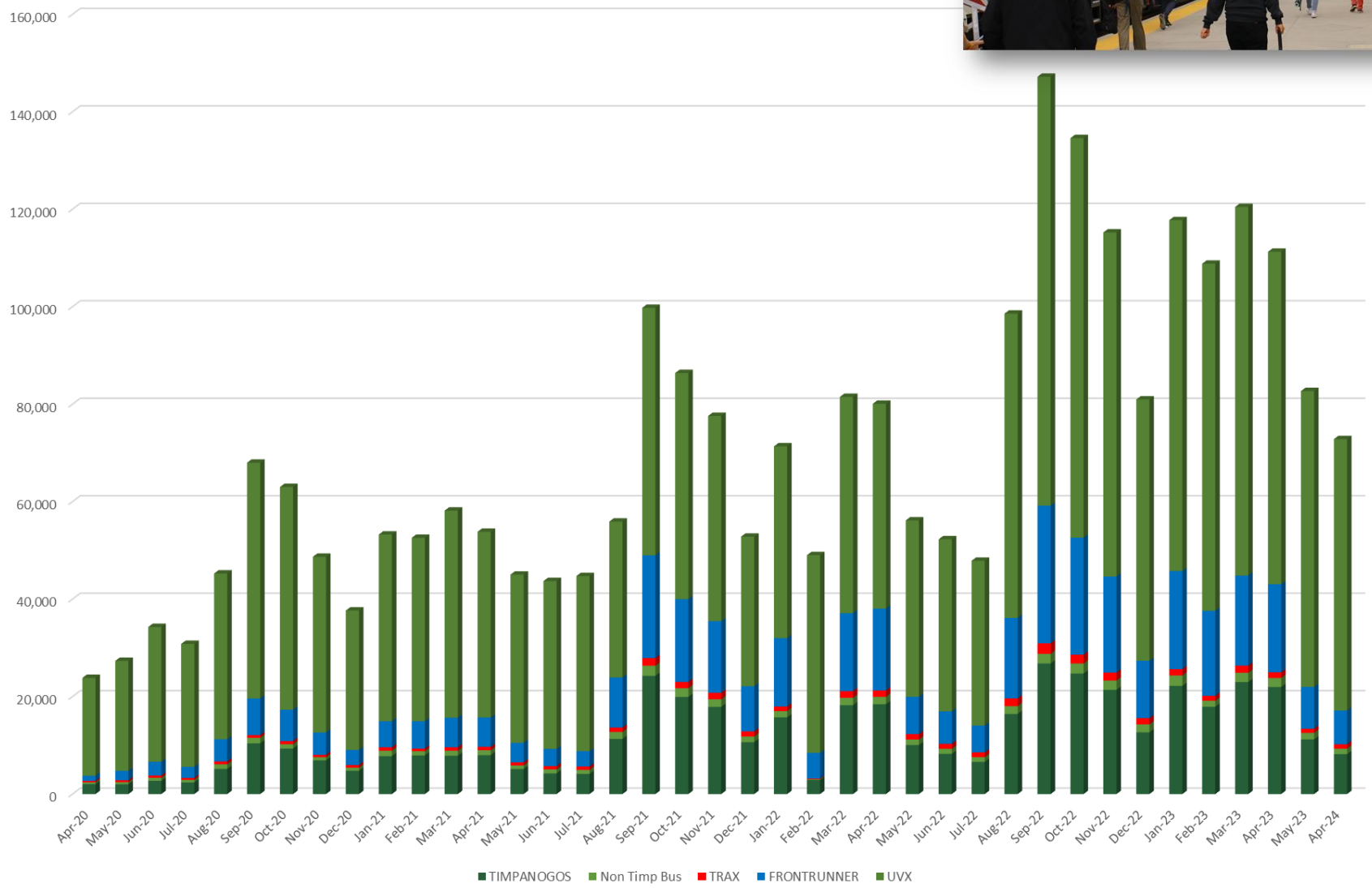


South Utah County Transit Map

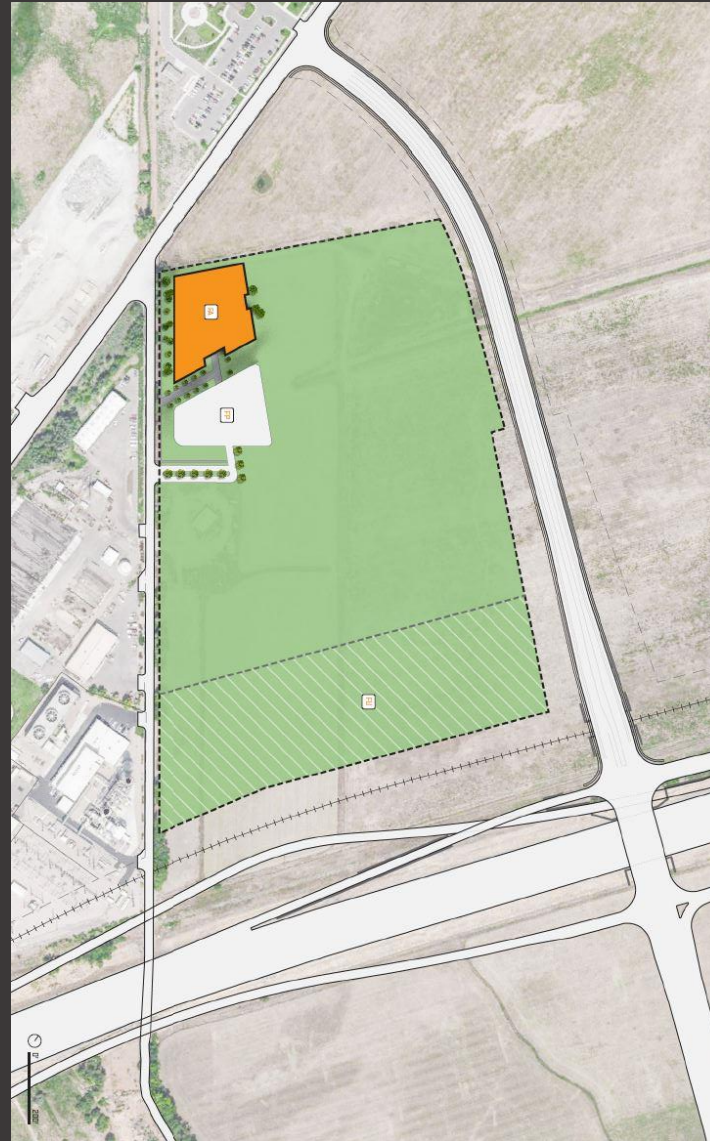

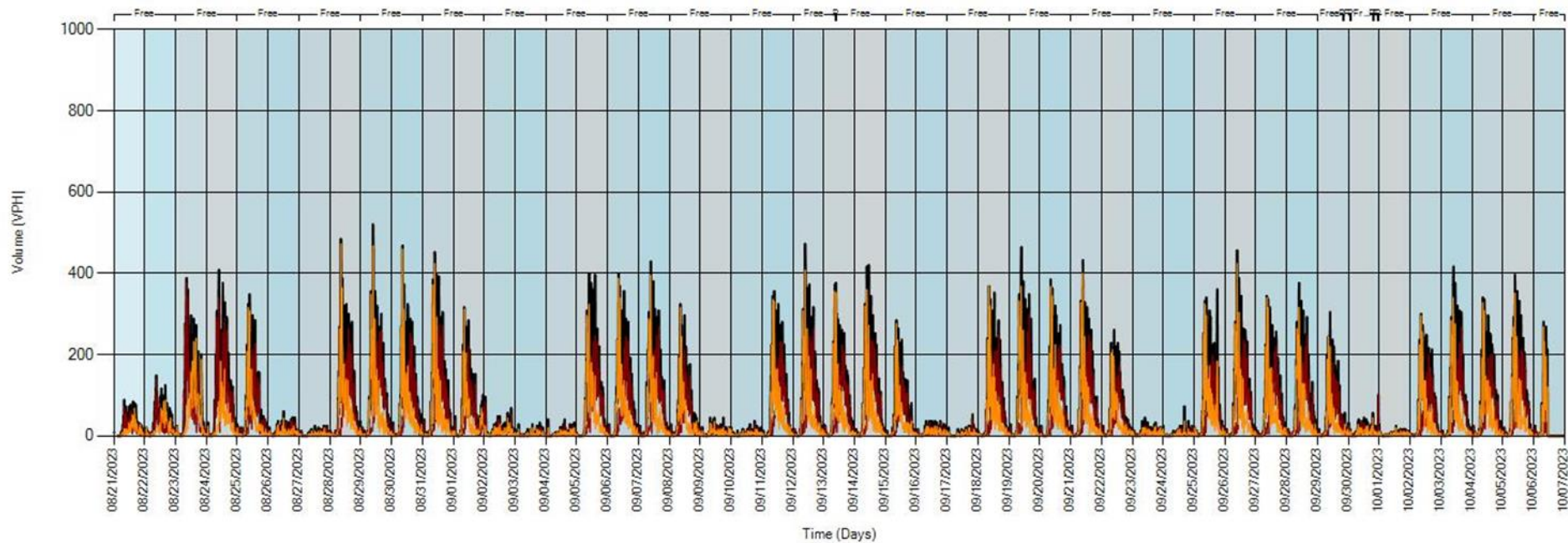

So when you look at Thanksgiving point, when you look at vineyard, when you look at Payson in every one of those instances and Orem, we have a front runner station that's tied to campus.

We actually hired Ken and architects.

They're a national firm to come in.

They held several working sessions together with the cabinet and with all the Deans as we talked about how we see the site development coming up and one of the things that we considered, if you look at that drawing on the left, that says downtown vineyard, uh, how it would interact with Utah City, how it interacts and the whole area and then how it interacts and the whole region.

So you think about that we're adding another 900,000 people to Utah County. How does this site work in that type of an urban environment? Just to give you an idea of the site, uh 225 acres at vineyard, the main campus here is 228 acres. You can see the the graph there on the growth in Utah County and what's supposed to happen and how it's supposed to just take off. If you look at the Wasatch Front to they they estimate the Wasatch Front by 2065, we'll have 5.5 million people.

Currently you have about 3 million people along the Wasatch Front, and the reason that that growth happens in Utah County is because the north and the the central part of the Wasatch Front is built out.

Just to show you the connectivity of this particular piece of property, if you're taking front runner, it's 2.3 miles from the vineyard station to the Orem station. It's literally 4 minutes by the front runner train. So right now the front runner runs every half hour during peak time and it runs a hourly on off peak and so it's literally just a train stop away to move back and forth. And with the bridge, you really get that connectivity between the main campus and

this particular location?

This just shows you a walking diagram, so 1/4 mile.

You know you have about a 5 minute walk on 1/4 mile.

You can see how our property works out if you're going 1/2 mile, you're about to 12 to 15 minutes, so it's very walkable.

So that as as we sat down, we developed it, we developed a concept plan.

This is our project area.

It is divided by 8 N there is an overpass there, but we had built into the overpass.

There's a a place on the on the underneath it that allows for a connection between the two pieces of property.

So you can access that by walking by golf cart.

We probably could take a small vehicles through there as well if we if we needed to, but definitely the the two pieces of property or interconnected and like I said, if you look at this property round about you see all the development that starting to happen there with Utah City you have the forge that's down there where you've got top golf and Larry Miller Cineplex that's located there.

We were just talking to the developers or getting ready to announce a grocery store in the area.

You've actually got health professions that are down there, so this area is really starting to take off.

So you look at how that campus has developed over those 35 years as we've added buildings to make sure that we can accomplish our academic mission, that we can educate to those who are looking for specific programs.

And so who at this point, you know, we have an idea of some of the programs that would go on on vineyard, but that hasn't been fully fleshed out yet because there could be things that are coming in the future that we haven't even thought of yet.

As we continue to look at that, some of the things that we looked at were making sure that we were maintaining the views that are on this particular site, the views that we have of Timpanogos, the views that we have of Utah Lake, one of the concepts that Utah City is working on as a view corridor.

So we want to continue that view corridor through our property.

And so making sure that we're being sensitive to the environment that we find ourselves, that we were making sure that it's a place that people want to be, that they feel like they can, umm, thrive in the academic environment that we create along with that is a rail trail making sure that we have a trail that goes next to the railroad along with a possible tracks right away.

So as we did all that, we put that together and and we kind of developed this bubble diagram where we talked about possibilities of a hospital.

Uh Conference Center, commercial district housing and and then, of course the academic core.

And that helped us create this bubble map that you see here on this page.

So yes, obviously they would have first right to clinicals and things like that, but I know the Provost has signed a collaborative agreement with Huntsman Cancer Institute, which gives some opportunities for clinicals and internships at the hospital, that this would be a collaborative project between both Huntsman Cancer Institute and Utah Valley Community College.

And then it looks like there's a question about the Lake Promenade and that is not a waterway into that property.

That is just that is just a view corridor that we're maintaining throughout the site so that you can see the lake they wanted to keep a view corridor so that we just didn't uh, turn everything into buildings that you would still be able to see the the surroundings that we have.
