


UTAH VALLEY UNIVERSITY 2020 YEAR IN REVIEW Donor Report



Janette Hales Beckham describes her passion for Utah Valley University (UVU) as a love affair. "I suppose most everyone who knows me, knows about my enthusiasm for UVU," she says. Beckham, a long-time donor to the university, has spent her life helping others and the community. Professionally, she served in the Utah State Legislature, was the General President of Young Women for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS), and worked on the Executive Committee and Board of Trustees for the LDS Church Education System. Below she shares her "WHY," for supporting UVU.

What inspired you to start working with **Utah Valley University (UVU)?**

I was a community-involved homemaker until my husband died suddenly in 1988. I was 54 and my youngest daughter was leaving on a mission. Everything I had been doing ended abruptly.

That year, I ran for the Utah State Legislature and served for two years alongside Kerry Romesburg, who was the new president of Utah Valley Community College (UVCC). The two of us were asked to co-chair a clean air coalition for Utah County. While working on that initiative, he opened my eyes to the needs of UVCC.

That's when my passion for the school began. Growing up in Utah Valley, I knew how important it was for the area to have access to higher education, and I was enthusiastic about its inclusive mission.



What is your greatest accomplishment in your work with UVU?

In 2002, I was asked by the governor to be on the Board of Trustees for Utah Valley State College (UVSC). Seeking university status was a top priority. I worked mainly with UVSC President Bill Sederberg who said, "If it's the right thing to do, we will do it the right way." I understood how important this was for the community, and I was well-acquainted politically. I am grateful that I was part of that process.

What about UVU inspires you the most?



Building on Our Success

Scott C. Keller, president and chief executive officer of Keller Investment Properties and his wife and business partner, Karen Keller, donated \$10 million to complete the funding for the planned Woodbury School of Business Building. UVU broke ground on the Scott C. Keller Building Nov. 11, 2019. The 205,000-square-foot building will house the Bloomberg Lab, Entrepreneurship Institute, Money Management Resource Center, SmartLab, and a grand auditorium for lectures and special events. Classrooms will be outfitted with lecture-capture technology to help students learn remotely.

WOMEN'S SUCCESS CENTER



"When I enrolled at UVU. I became a better version of myself. I started working toward my degree while in high school, nearly 20 years ago. But I stopped school when I married. I was just 19 years old. My

then-husband and I started a family right away. I now have five beautiful children, ranging in age from 4 to 17 years old. Even though I loved being a stay-at-home mom, I always wanted to finish my education - I just wasn't sure when the time would be right. Then, I went through a painful divorce. I realized I had spent my entire married life building my husband's resume and not my own. I knew it was time to get my own college degree. I would not be able to pursue my education without a scholarship through the Women's Success Center. It is the generosity of beautiful people like you who elevate our world."

The UVU Women's Success Center, founded in 2011, seeks to help students graduate by providing personalized support and removing barriers that prevent individuals involved with the Women's Success Center from finishing degrees. The programs include:

- Scholarships: On average, students who hold Women's Success Center scholarships remain in school at rates 17% higher than their peers.
- Women Lead: A class designed to prepare individuals to serve in leadership roles in every aspect of their lives.
- Wee Care Center: Offering affordable, accessible, quality on-campus child care specifically for parentstudents at UVU.

The I Am First program at UVU helps students achieve their goal of being the first in their family to graduate with a bachelor's degree.

The No. 1 reason first-generation students leave college is due to financial difficulties. Scholarships and specialized resources are critical to help these students reach graduation.

- More than 75% come from households with a combined income of \$50,000 or less
- 27% come from households with a combined income of \$20,000 or less

Utah Valley University offers solutions to significantly increase graduation rates for the first-generation population. Support such as faculty and peer mentorship, engagement activities, and networking opportunities have played a crucial role for these students.
