INSTITUTIONAL MISSION

Utah Valley State College is a state college comprised of two interdependent divisions. The lower division embraces and preserves the philosophy and mission of a comprehensive community college, while the upper division consists of selected programs leading to baccalaureate degrees in areas of high community demand and interest.

Utah Valley State College is dedicated to providing a broad range of quality academic, vocational, technical, cultural, and social opportunities and experiences designed to encourage and assist students in attaining their goals and realizing their talents and potential, personally and professionally. The College is committed to meeting student and community lower division and selected upper division needs for occupational training; providing developmental, general, and transfer education; meeting the needs for continuing education for personal enrichment and career enhancement; and providing diverse social, cultural, and international opportunities, and student support services.

HISTORY OF UTAH VALLEY STATE COLLEGE

Utah Valley State College, Orem, is situated in the heart of Utah County. Nestled beneath mountains on all sides, the name Utah Valley has become synonymous with Utah County and is used interchangeably throughout the state. With a population of more than 263,000 it is the second largest county in the State and includes twenty incorporated cities. The College serves primarily the Mountainlands District of students with Utah County residents comprising 61 percent of its enrollment.

*The College was established when the Utah State Legislature passed an appropriation of \$100,000 for the biennium of 1936-38 for vocational education. Central Utah residents who had been supported by government funding, wanted to upgrade their skills in order to obtain better jobs and many enrolled in vocational classes administered by the school districts. However, the school districts were not able to give adequate supervision to organize, conduct, coordinate, and supervise adult programs, and in the spring of 1938, **Hyrum E. Johnson** of Provo was appointed supervisor of vocational education for Utah and Heber Valleys.*

*In the fall of 1941 the scattered classes throughout the two valleys were moved to a central location in south Provo and the Fairgrounds Campus was enthusiastically welcomed by the staff and students. Provo School District assumed the financial supervision of the new school and both federal and state monies flowed through the District to the school. It became imperative that the school have proper identification and the name **Central Utah Vocational School** was selected. With the advent of World War II, most of the school's operating budget came from federal government funds for war production training.*

*The birth of the school as a state institution was March 15, 1945, when Governor Herbert B. Maw signed a bill appropriating \$50,000 to operate for the biennium of 1945-47. A second bill was introduced and adopted in 1947 making the school a permanent state institution without any cut-off date. In 1946 **Wilson W. Sorensen** was appointed director of the school by the Utah State Board for Vocational Education and was the chief executive officer until June 1982.*

In 1948 a new site, located between 1200 and 1400 North on 150 East in Provo, was obtained. The site was purchased by the four school districts (Alpine, Nebo, Provo and Wasatch) as well as Provo City and Utah County, with the understanding, if the property were given to the school, the state would appropriate the money for buildings. The location of the campus was considered ideal because of accessibility to students from Provo High School, the Vocational School, or Brigham Young University.

*In March 1953 the name of the school was changed from Central Utah Vocational School to **Utah Trade Technical Institute**. In March 1967 the name was again changed, this time to **Utah Technical College at Provo**. In February 1966 the Utah State Board for Vocational Education approved granting Associate of Applied Science Degrees and on July 14, 1967, the State Board approved offering general education courses. In August of 1971 the Associate of Science Degree was approved.*

Enrollment growth became so immense the Provo Campus was no longer adequate and a search for a new site was begun. Several locations in Provo and Orem were reviewed and a decision was made to purchase 185 acres in southwest Orem. This location was chosen because of its landscape, excellent traffic flow, and accessibility. The business education building, student center, heating plant, and auto trades building were occupied at the beginning of the 1976-77 school year.

In 1974 the Associate of Science Degree was discontinued, but approval was given by the Board of Regents to again award the degree in December 1980. In 1981 the Legislature approved granting an Associate of Science Degree in general education on a three-year probationary basis with permanent approval in 1985.

*On June 1, 1982, Wilson W. Sorensen retired as President and **Dr. J. Marvin Higbee** was selected by the Board of Regents as the new President. Since the move to the Orem Campus the College continued to grow with a trades building, learning resource center, athletic center and administration building added. As classes and service facilities were moved from Provo to Orem the vacated areas were filled by new programs, thus maintaining a split campus. A new science building was occupied in fall 1989. An extensive addition to the Learning Resource building was completed for use in 1992.*

Beginning fall quarter 1985 articulation was completed with Weber State College to offer a four-year bachelor's degree in electronic technology while students continue their advanced courses on this campus. In winter quarter 1987 the same opportunity was offered students in the computer information systems program.

*In 1987 the legislature approved a name change better reflecting the location and mission of the College--**Utah Valley Community College**.*

*In October 1987 Dr. J. Marvin Higbee resigned as President and **Dr. Lucille T. Stoddard** was appointed Acting President until a new chief executive officer was selected.*

***Dr. Kerry D. Romesburg** was appointed President of Utah Valley Community College on July 17, 1988.*

The Associate of Arts Degree was approved by the Board of Regents in 1987 and in 1989 the Regents and State Legislature approved funding for the Associate Degree Nursing program.

October 21, 1988, the College was granted permission by the State Board of Regents to convert from the quarter to the semester calendar system. This change became effective fall semester 1990.

A four-year accounting program became available to students beginning fall semester 1990.

In 1989 the College added an International Studies Center to coordinate exchange programs, bring international students on campus, and assist in giving faculty exchange opportunities. During this same period Utah Valley Community College became one of the first community colleges in the United States to sign an exchange agreement with Soviet Russia. Exchange agreements were reached with Central America and Caribbean countries, China, Hong Kong, Japan, Taiwan and Germany.

August 1, 1991, Dr. Sharon Staples was appointed Director of the new **University Center** and assumed responsibility for bachelor's degree programs in accounting, computer science information systems, criminal justice, early childhood/elementary education and electronic engineering technology. These programs are offered on the UVCC campus and degrees are awarded through Utah State and Weber State Universities.

January 17, 1992, the Utah State Board of Regents directed Utah Valley Community College and the Commissioner of Higher Education to develop a proposed model or plan for offering a limited number of high demand bachelor's degree programs directed to the needs of the region. The Regents' action directed that the model include the following: full data on costs with a 5-year projection, enrollment projections, program offerings, deployment of faculty, quality safeguards, accreditation processes, library and other requirements. Underscoring all of the process was the Regents' expressed concern for the undiminished continuation of UVCC's present lower division academic and technical programs.

*A five-year, renewable consortium agreement was established between **Utah Valley Community College** and the **Kiev College of Hotel Management**. The program began in September, 1992 in Kiev, Ukraine.*

*On July 1, 1993, the name of the College was changed by the Board of Regents to **Utah Valley State College** and UVSC was given provisional accreditation by Northwest Accrediting Association to offer four year degree programs. The mission of the college was expanded to include four year degree programs. At the same time, UVSC became the first U.S. institution to receive accreditation for programs offered in the former Soviet Union.*

During the 1993-94 school year, construction was completed on the Student Center Expansion and the new Theater. Accreditation was granted on June 22, 1994, by Northwest Accrediting Association. Construction is underway on the new Special Events Center. Anticipated completion on the Special Events Center is Fall 1995.

A significant milestone in the history of UVSC was reached when the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges extended accreditation status at the baccalaureate level. The effective date of accreditation is September 1, 1995 and will run until the year 2004.

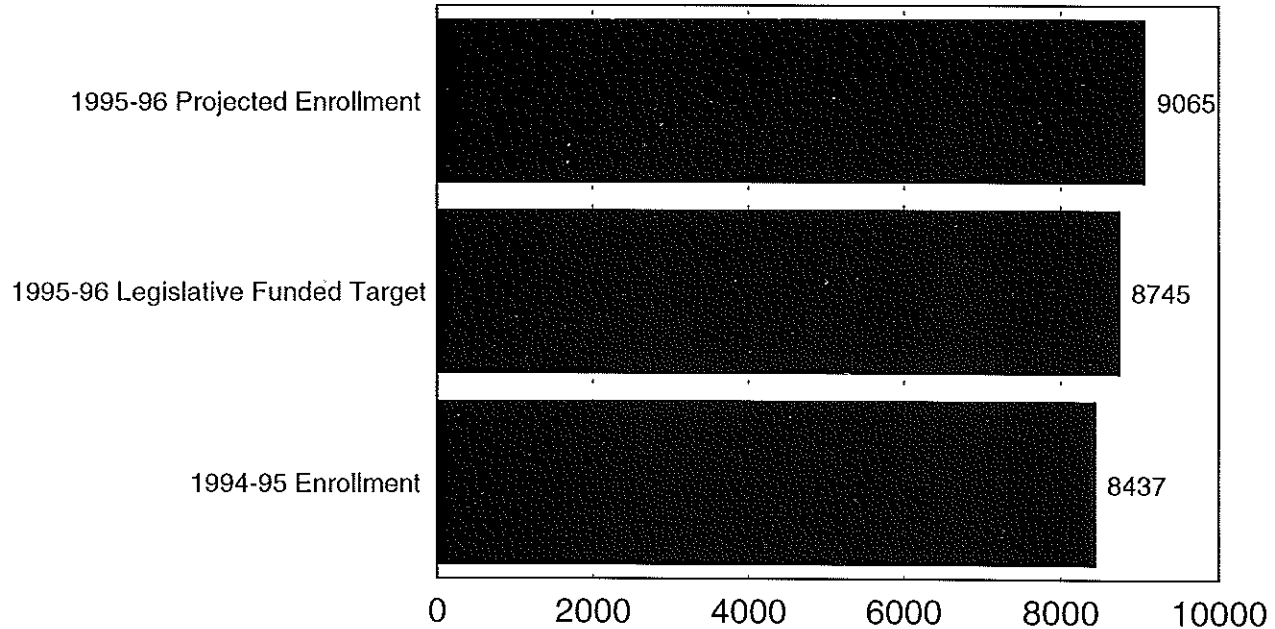

ENROLLMENT COMPARISON

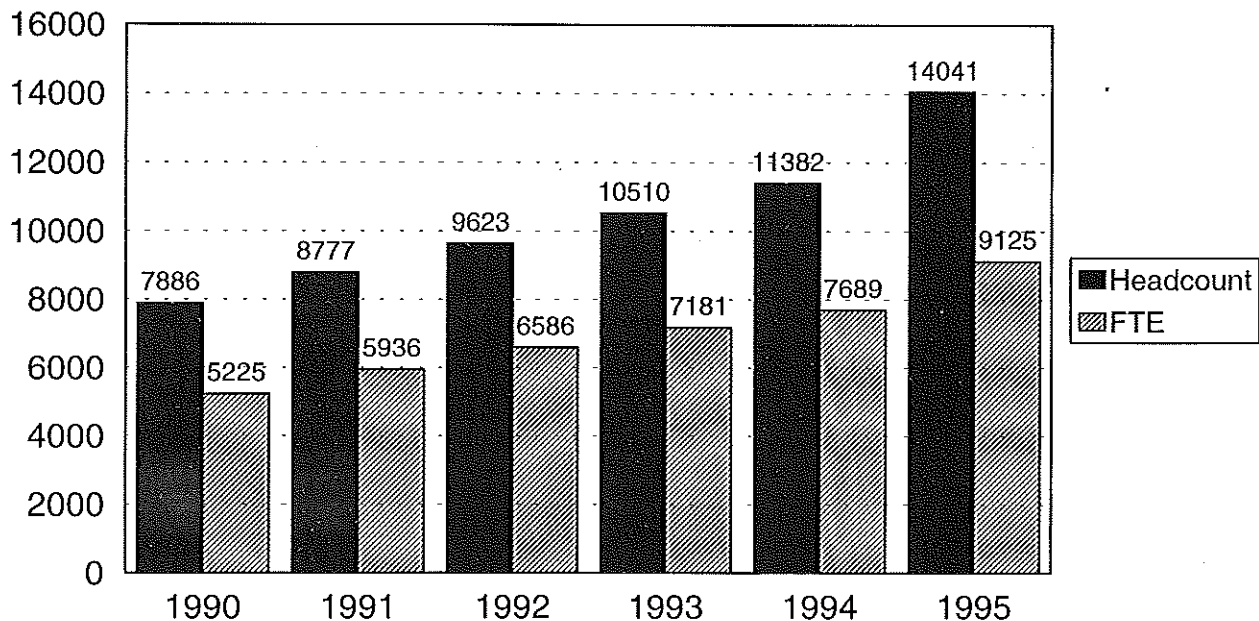
Annualized FTE Students

Fall Semesters 1990 - 1995

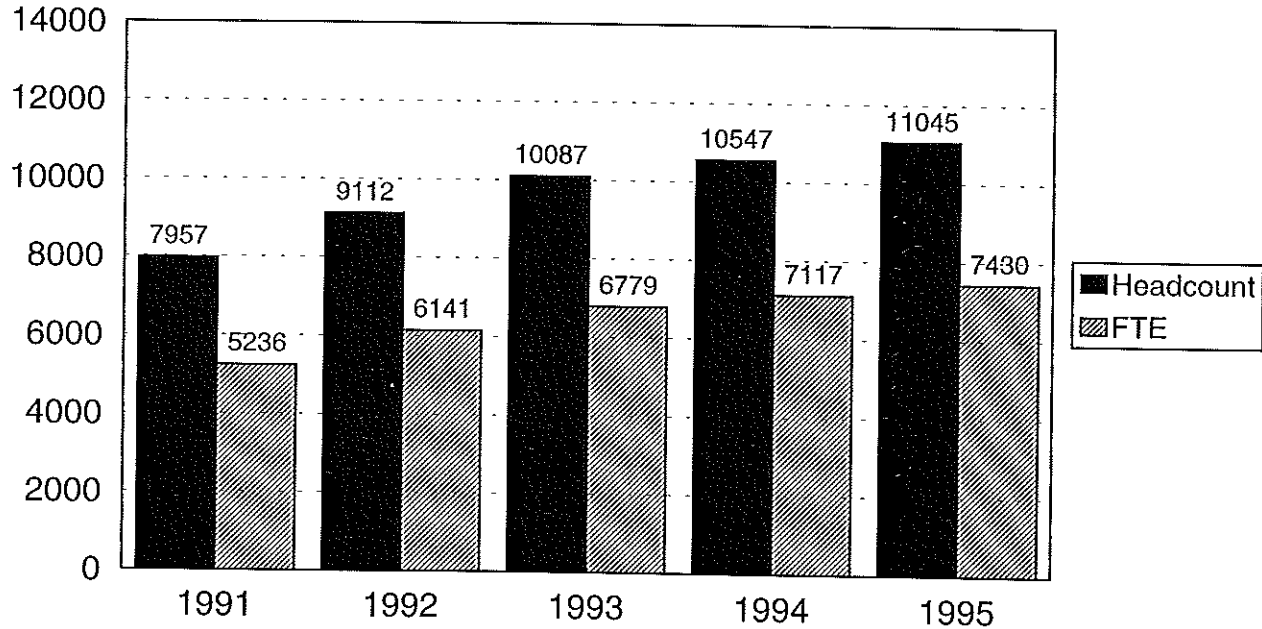

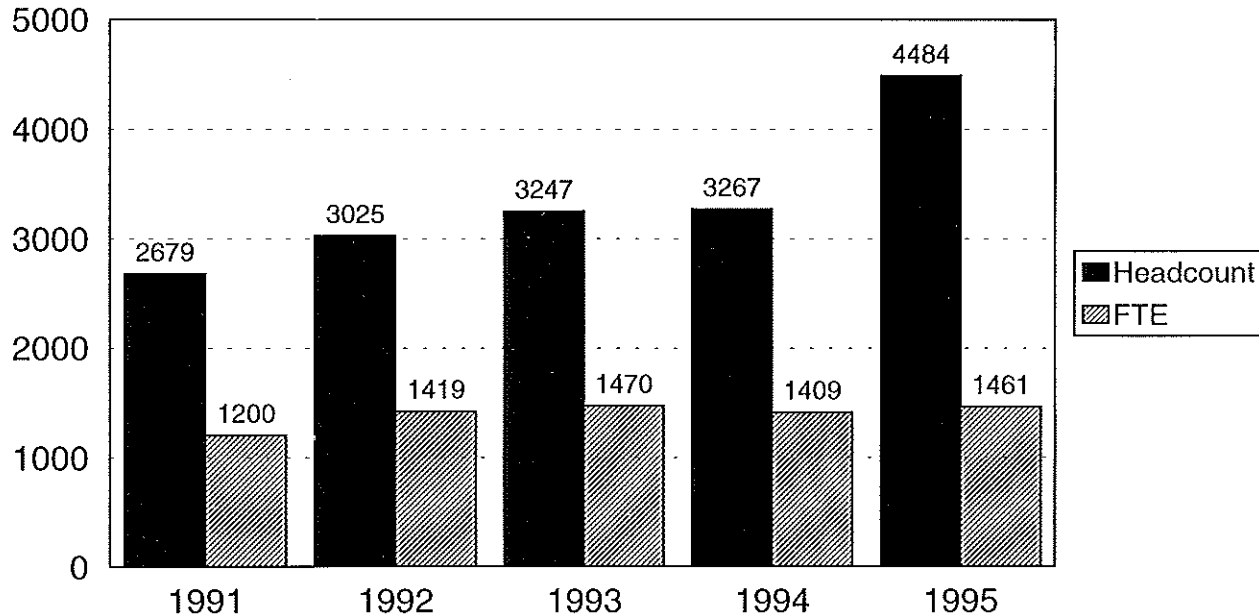
Spring Semesters 1991 - 1995

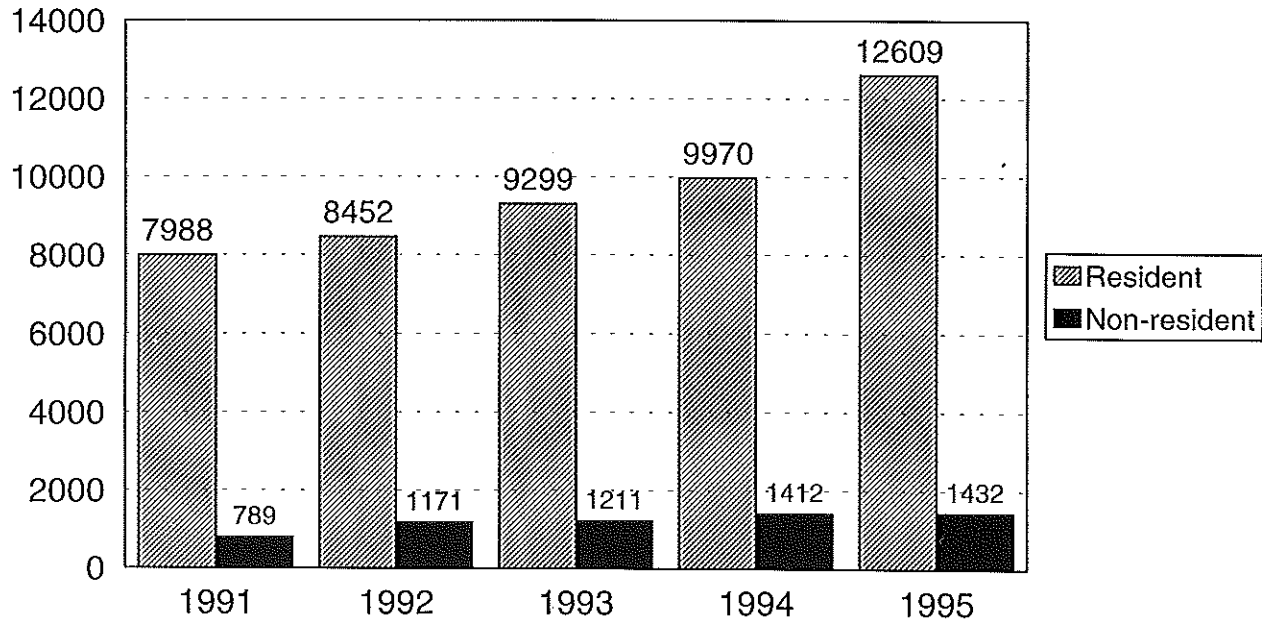

RESIDENT/NON-RESIDENT HEADCOUNT

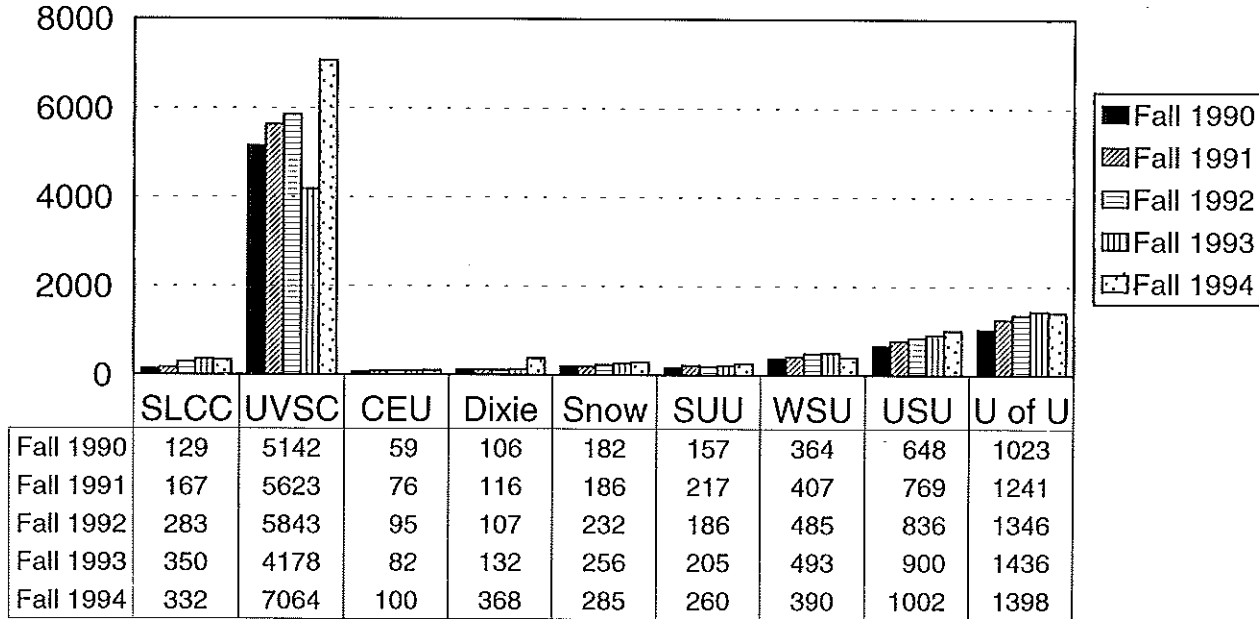
Fall Semesters 1991 - 1995

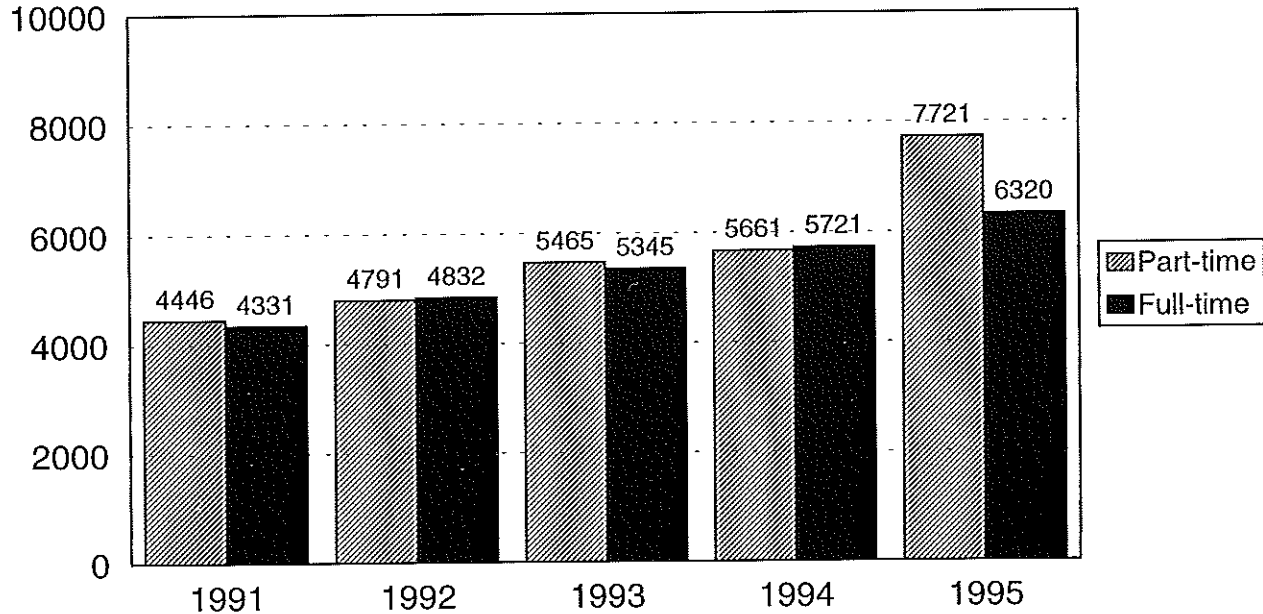

PART-TIME/FULL-TIME HEADCOUNT

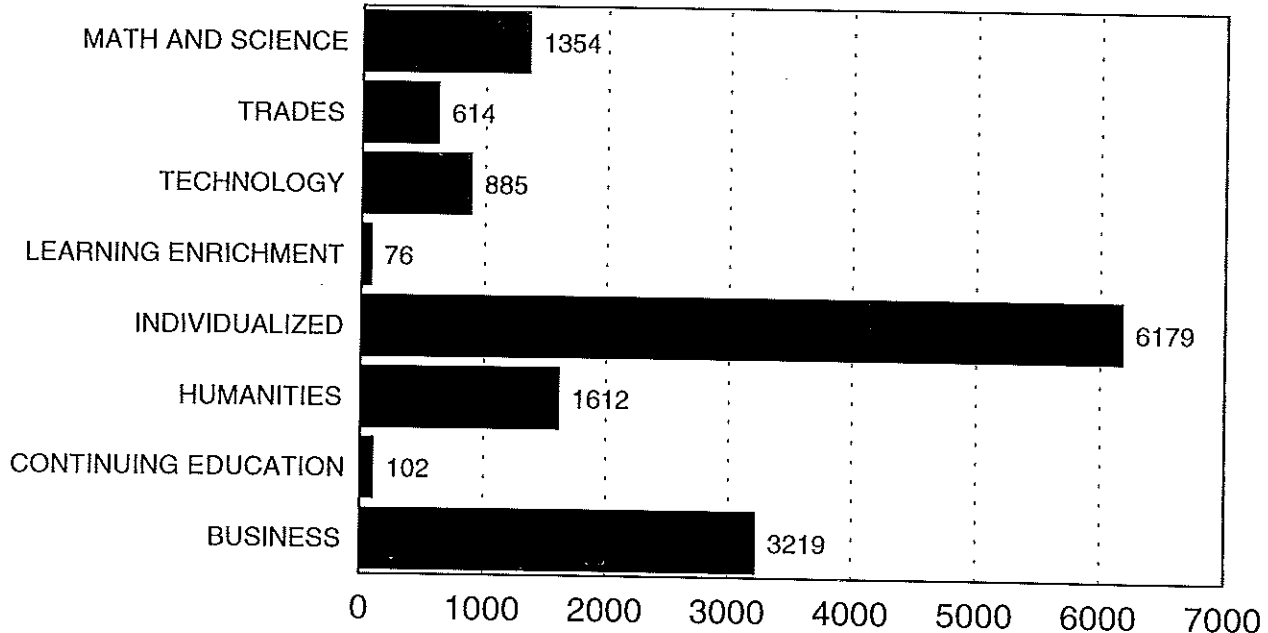
Fall Semesters 1991 - 1995

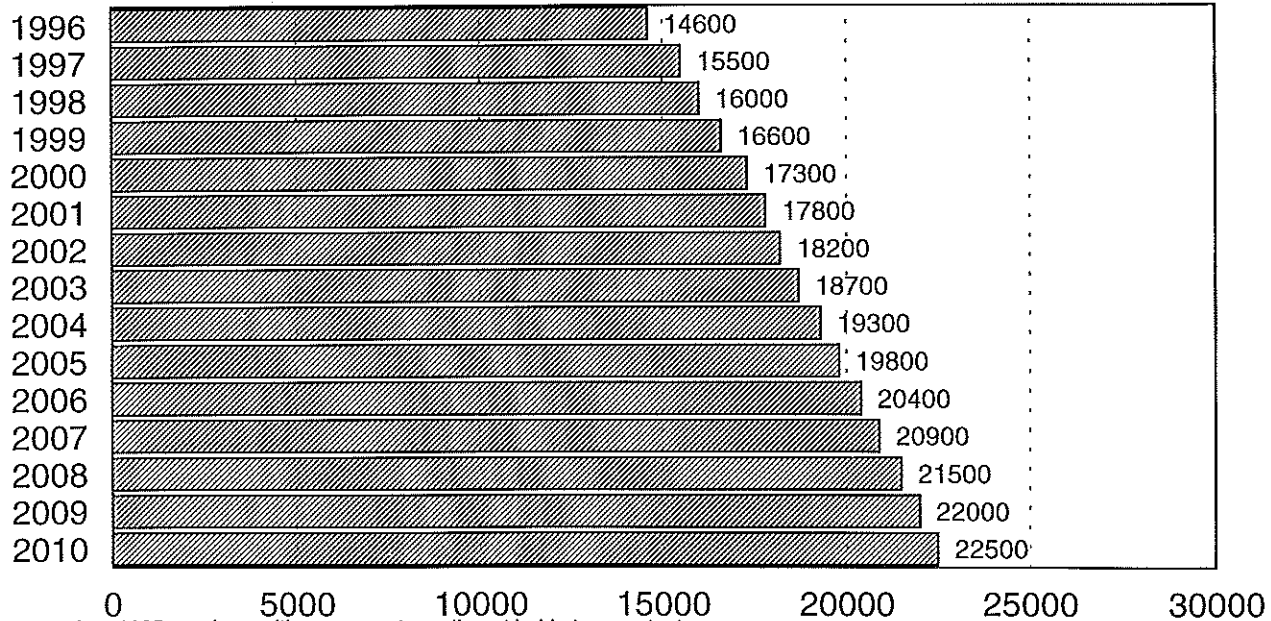

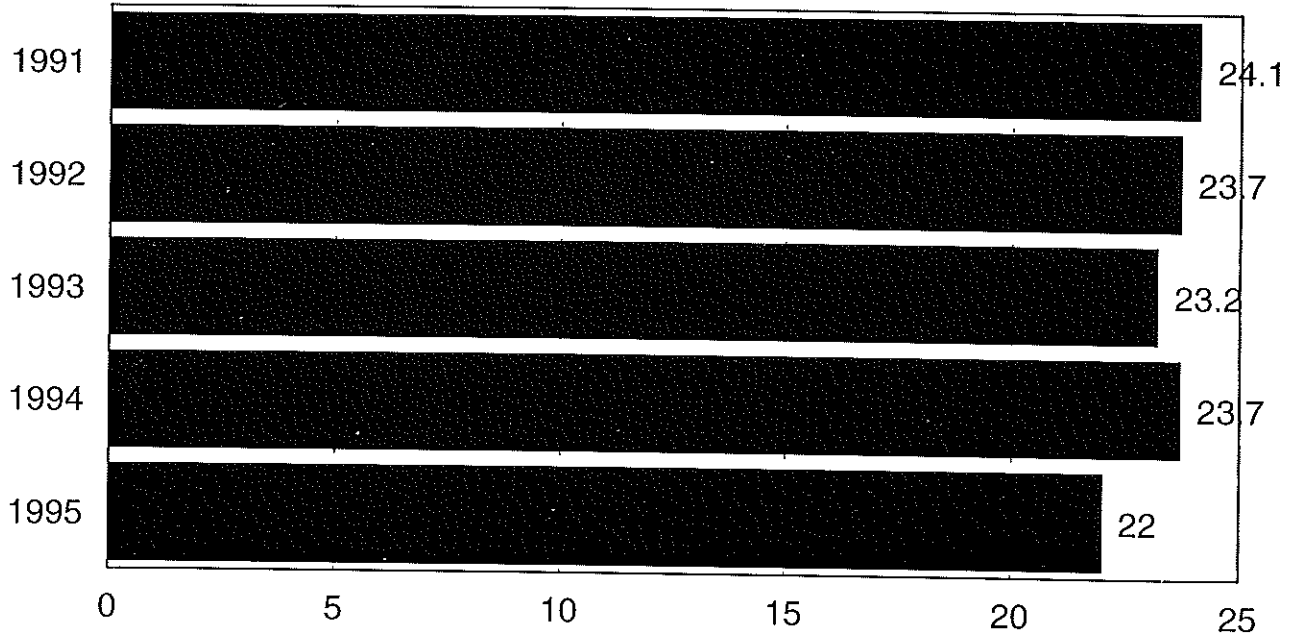

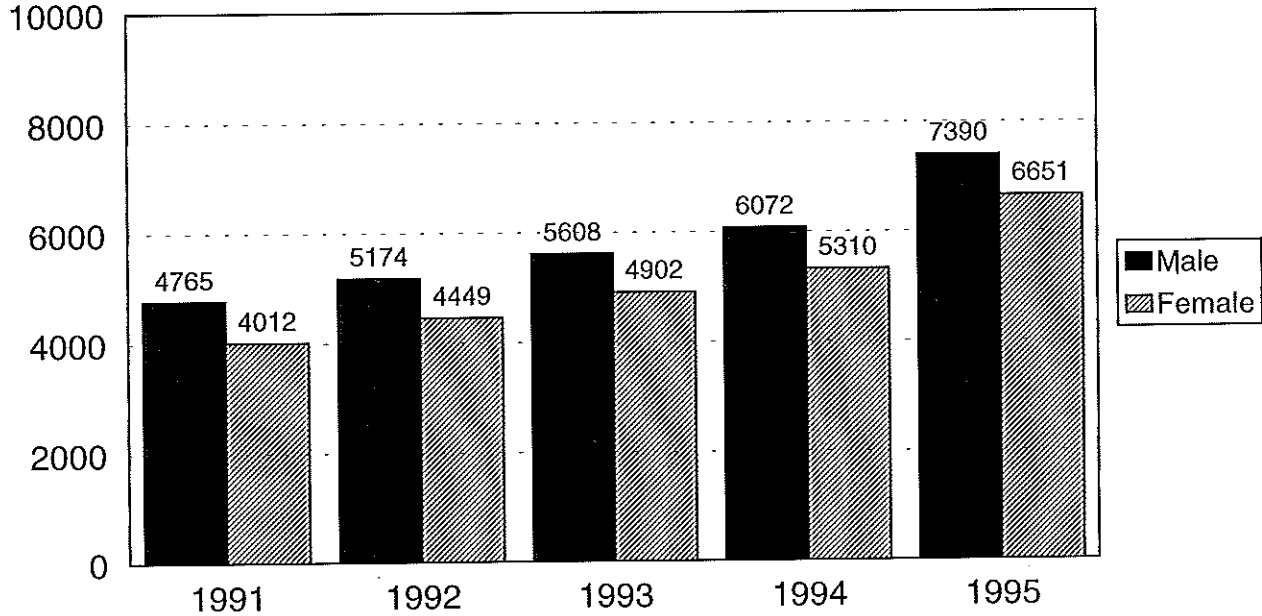

MALE/FEMALE HEADCOUNT

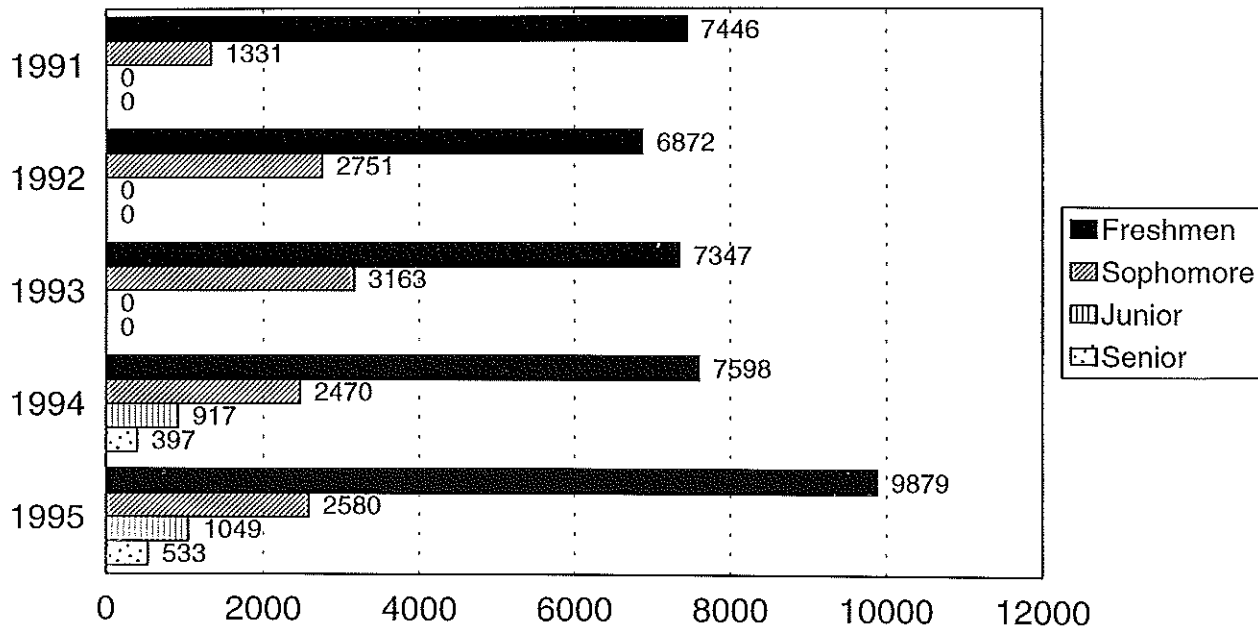
Fall Semesters 1991 - 1995

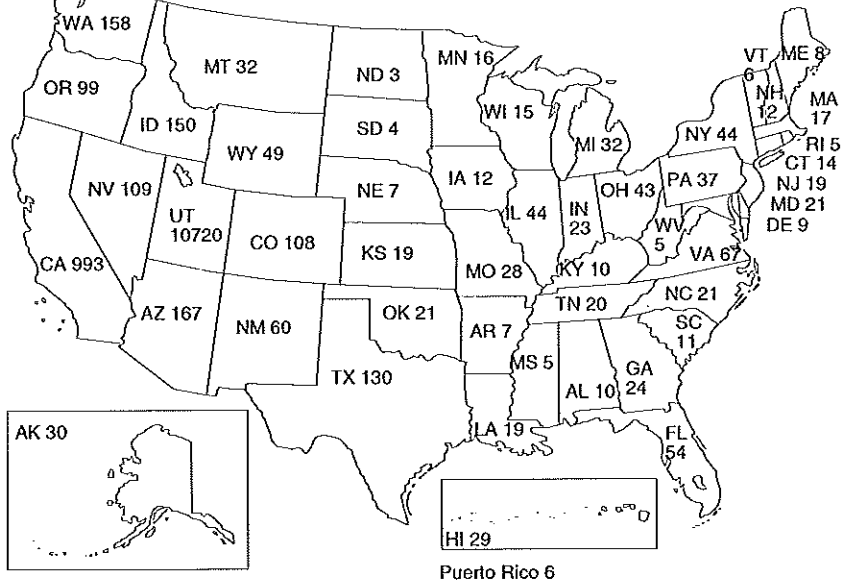
HEADCOUNT BY CLASS STANDING

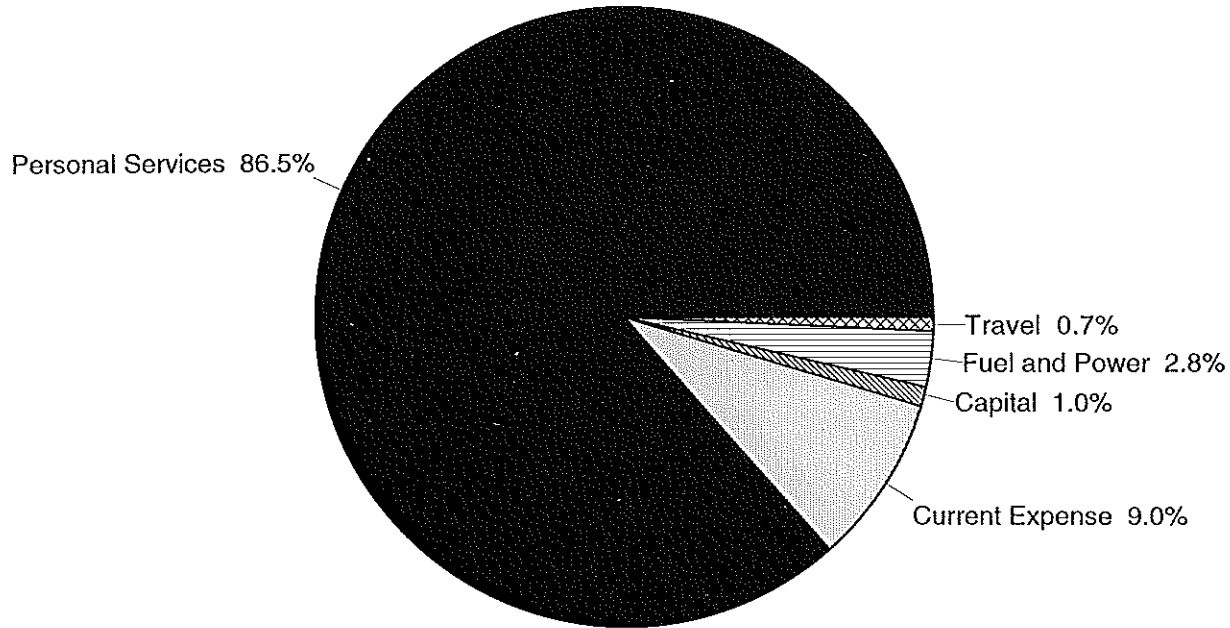

EDUCATION & GENERAL OPERATING FUNDS

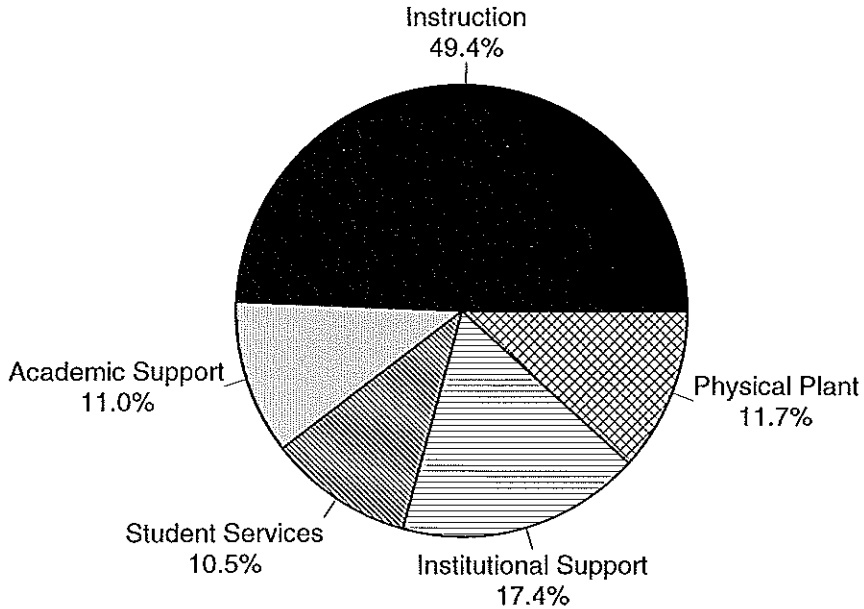
Expenditure Category 1995 - 1996

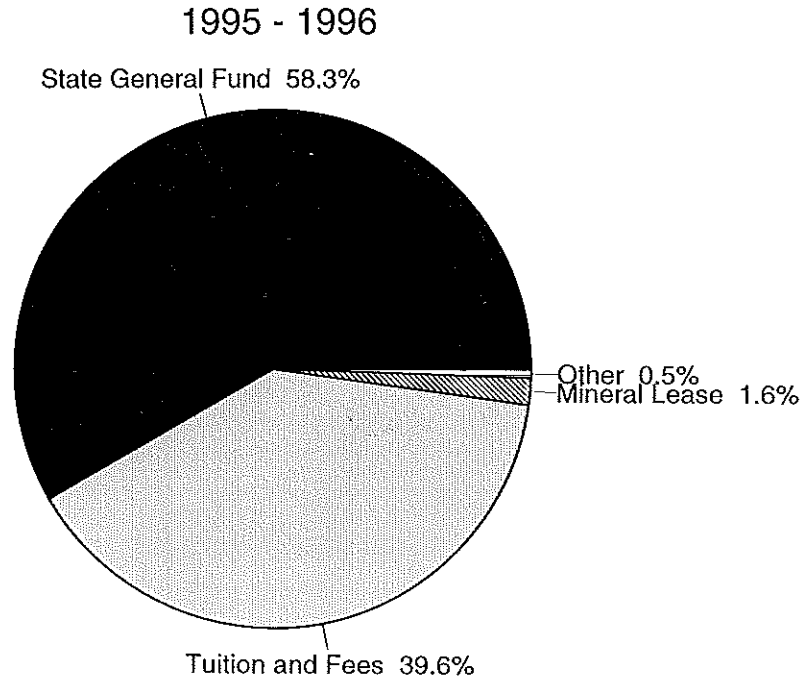
EDUCATION & GENERAL OPERATING FUNDS

Expenditure Purpose 1995 - 1996



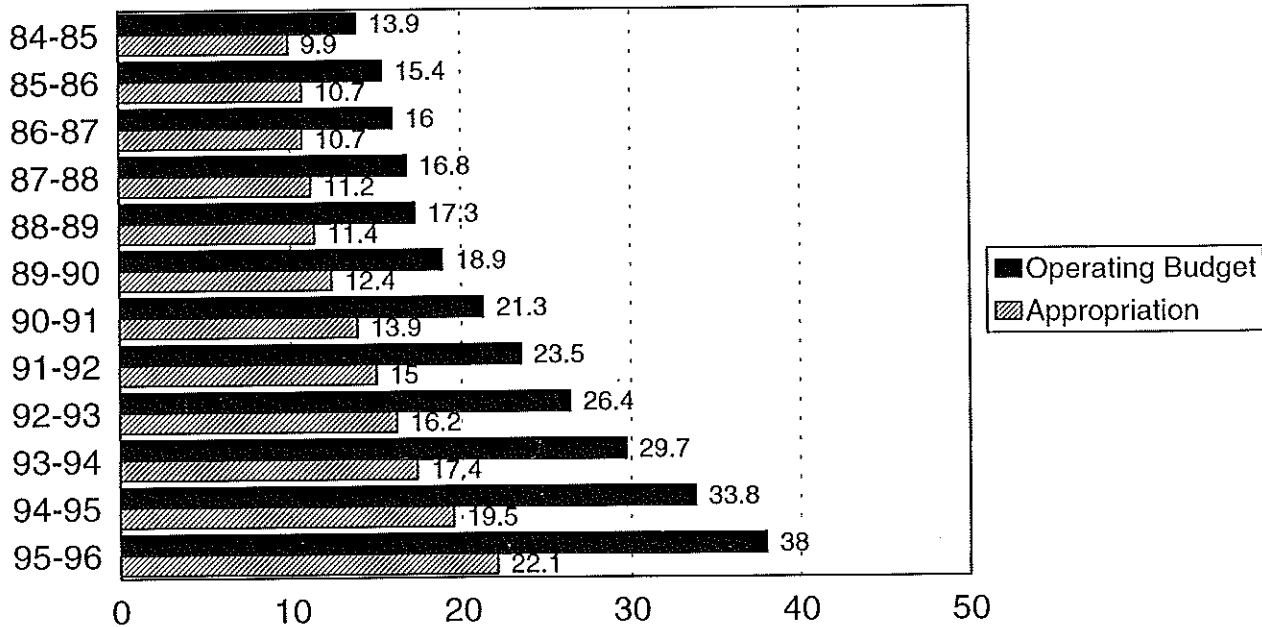

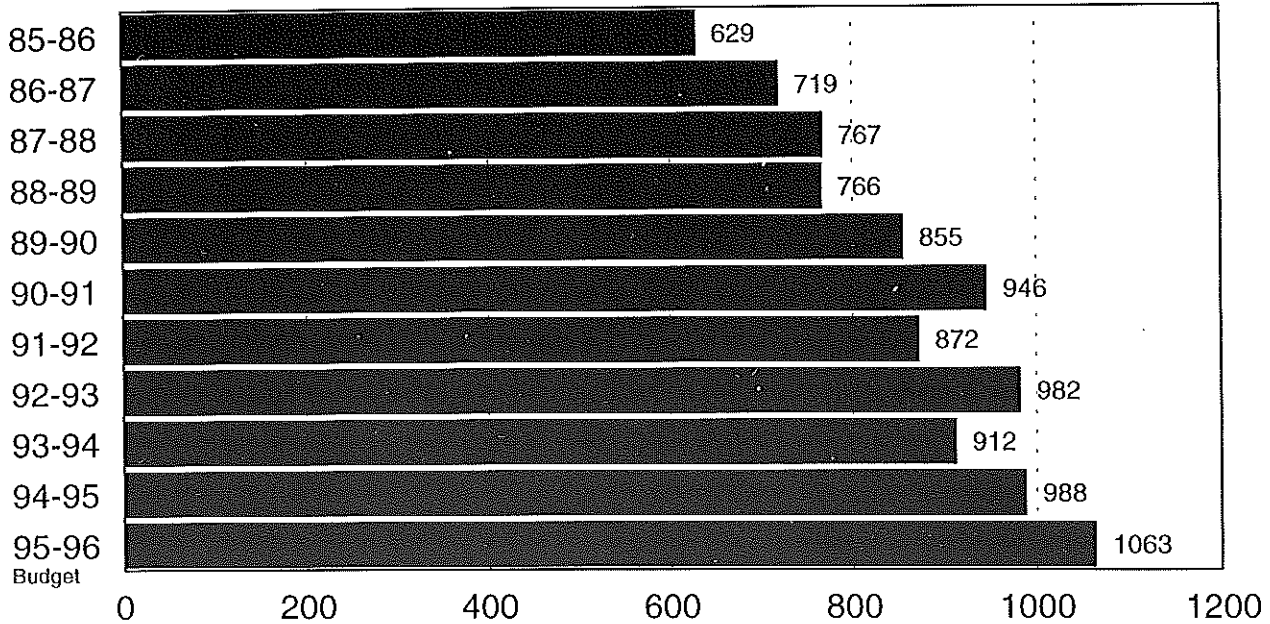
HISTORY OF EDUCATION AND GENERAL OPERATING BUDGET AND STATE APPROPRIATION

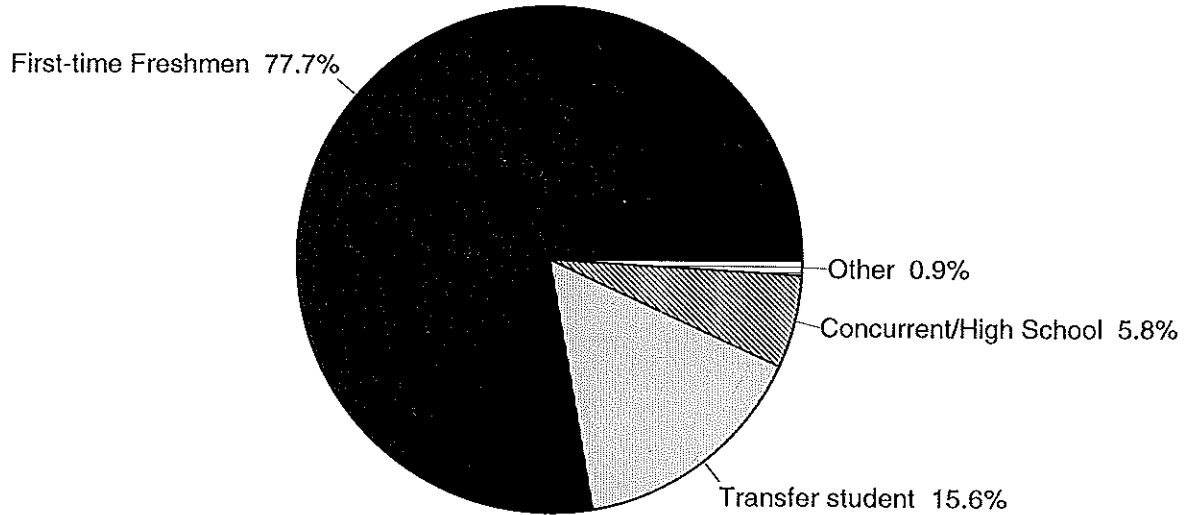

Fall 1995 New Student Survey

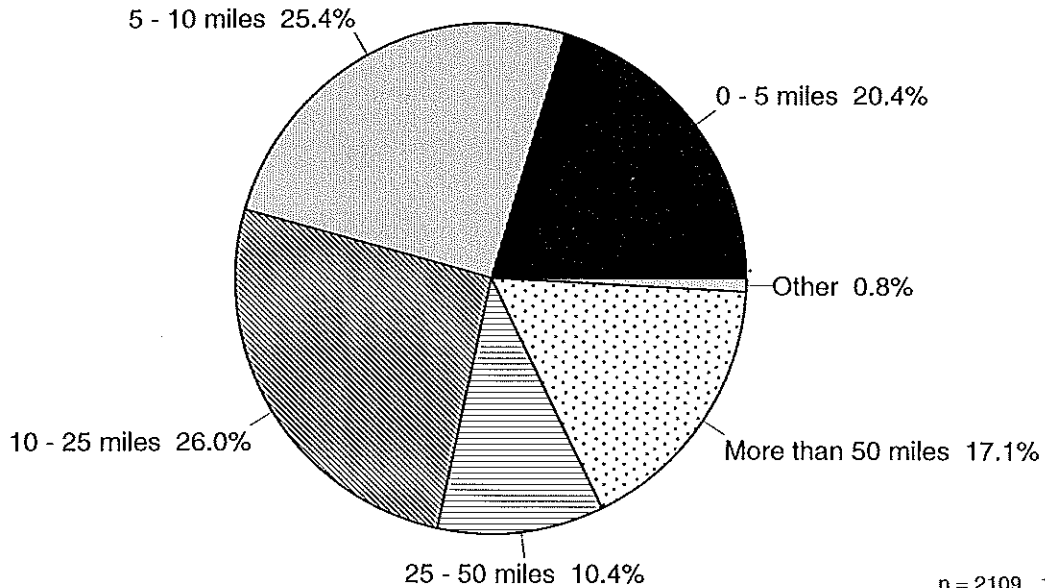

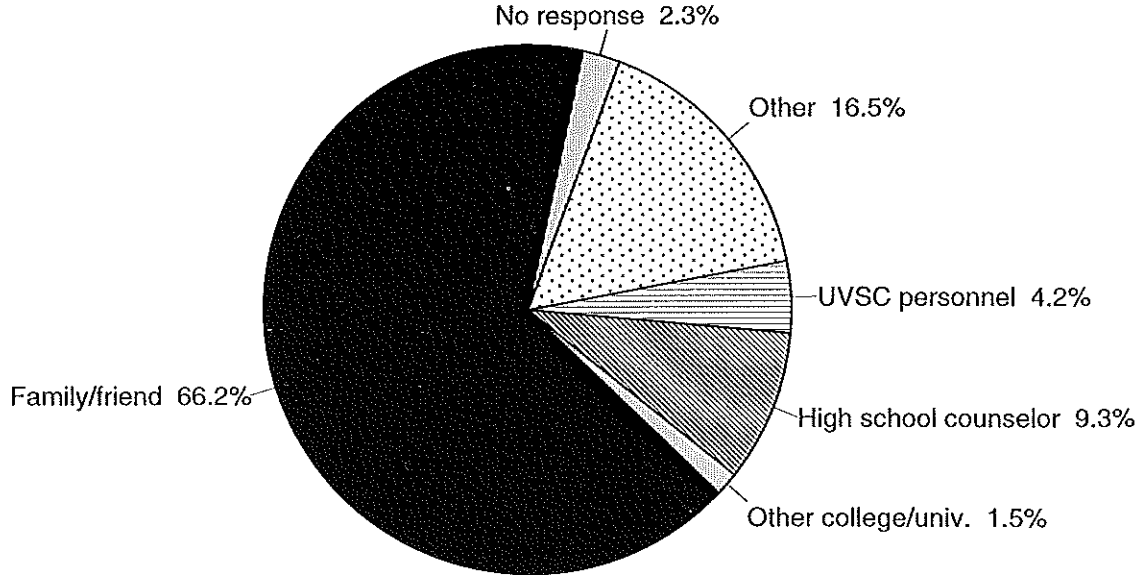

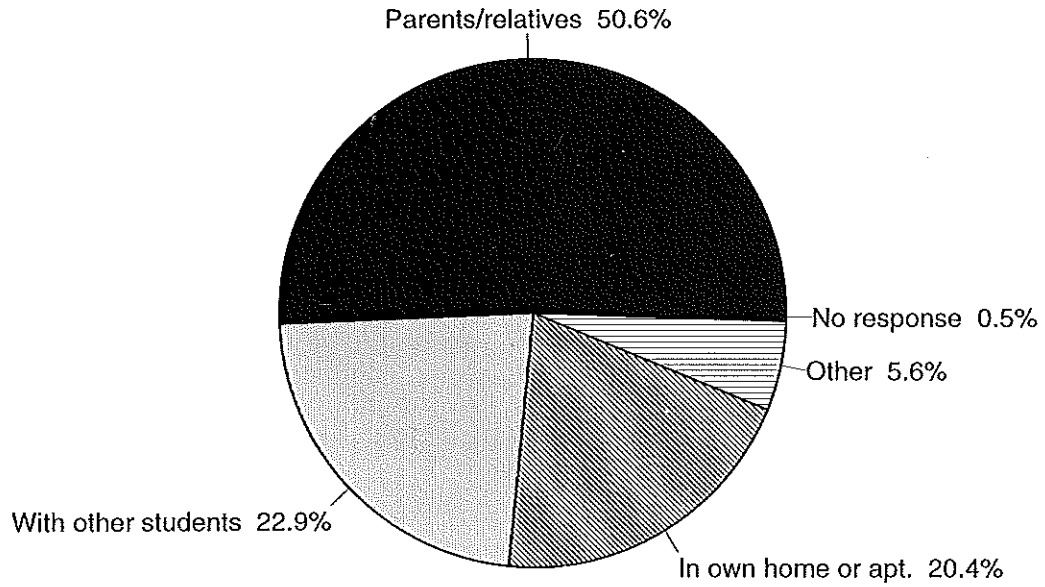

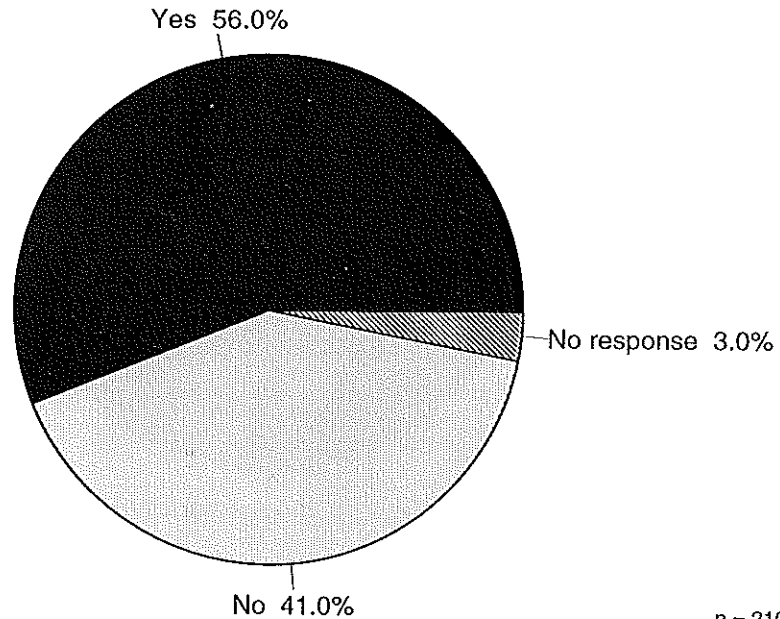

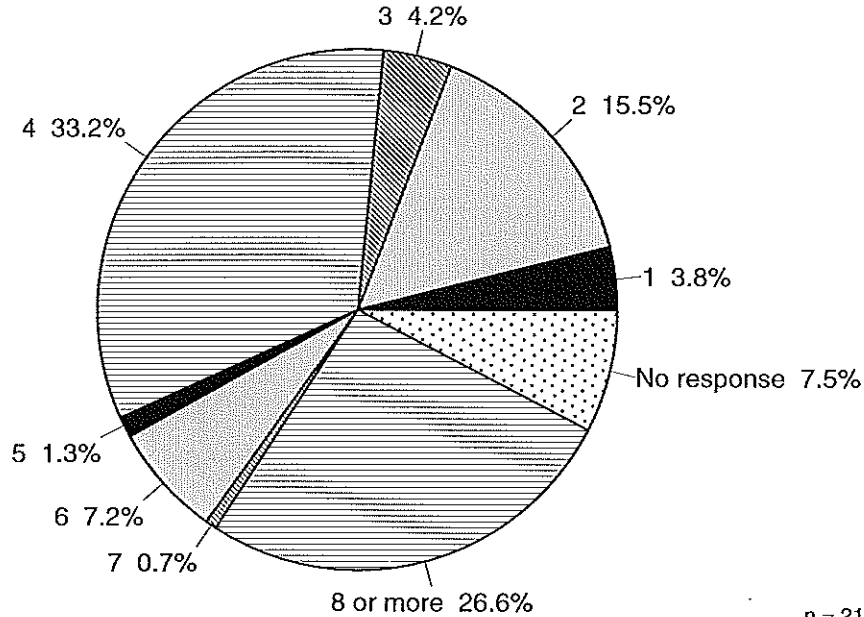

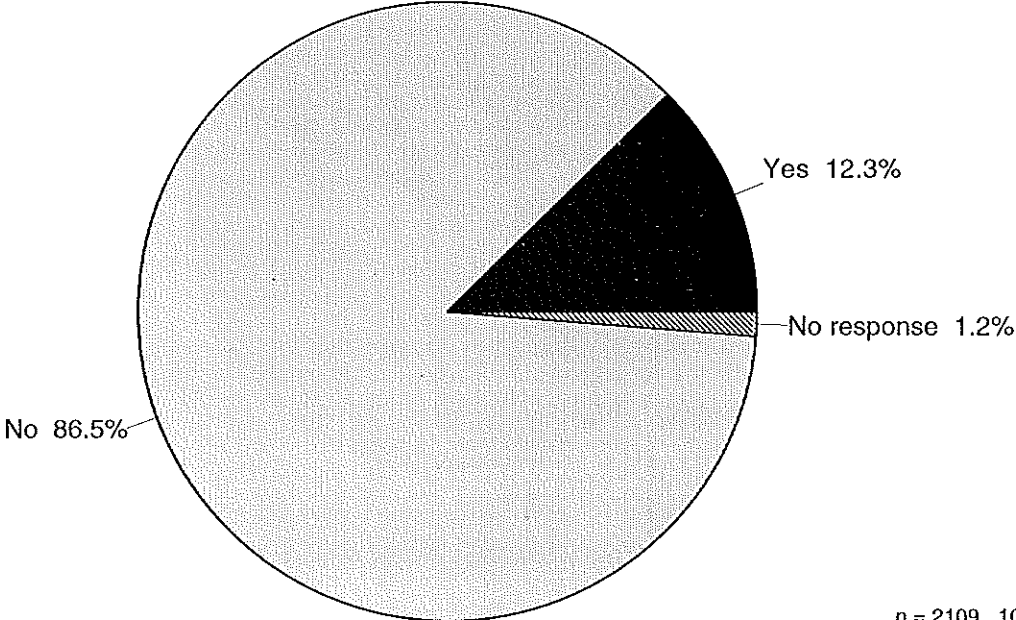

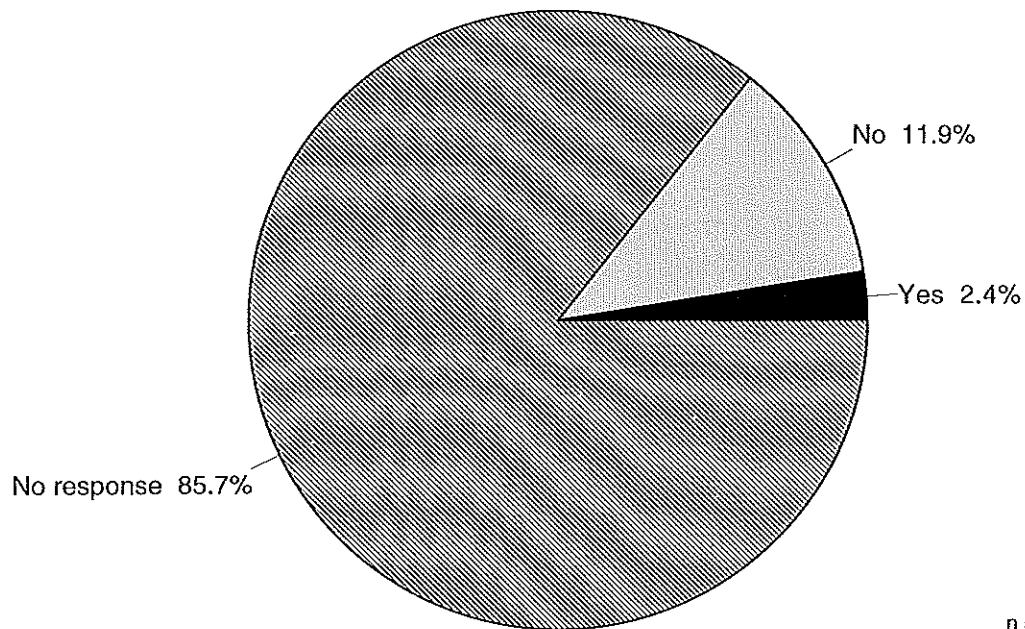

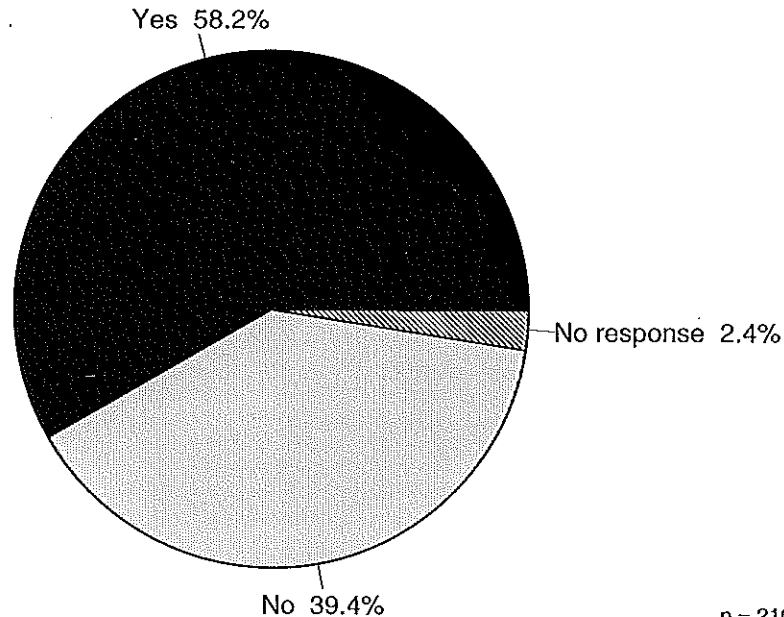

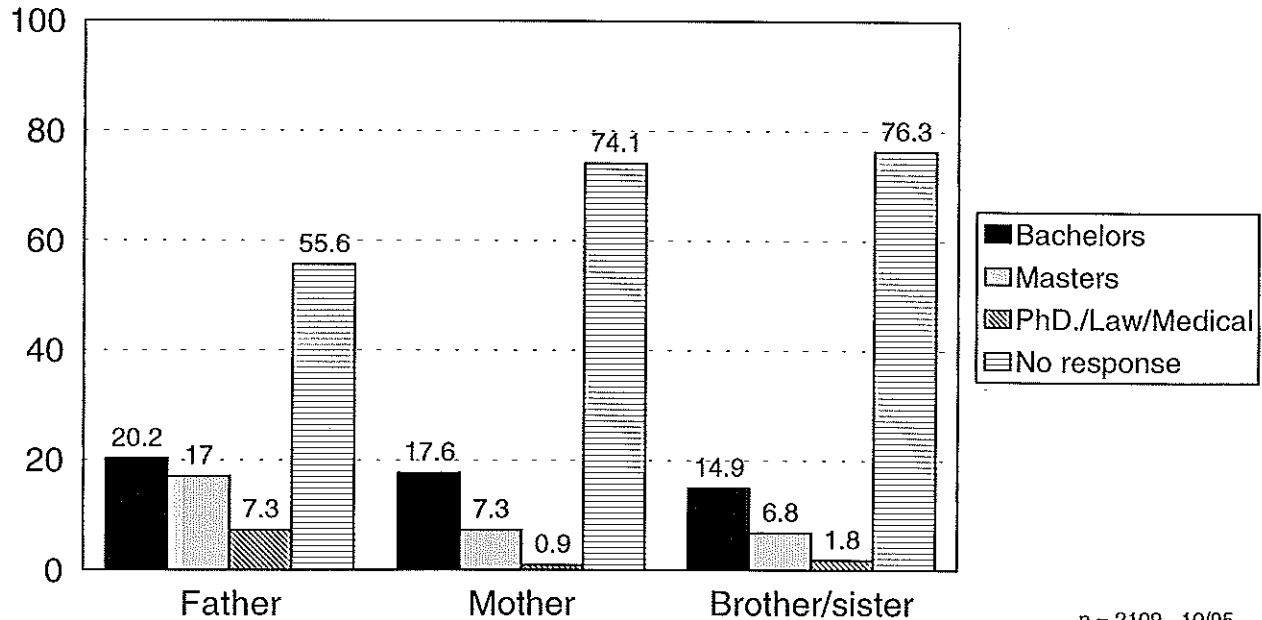

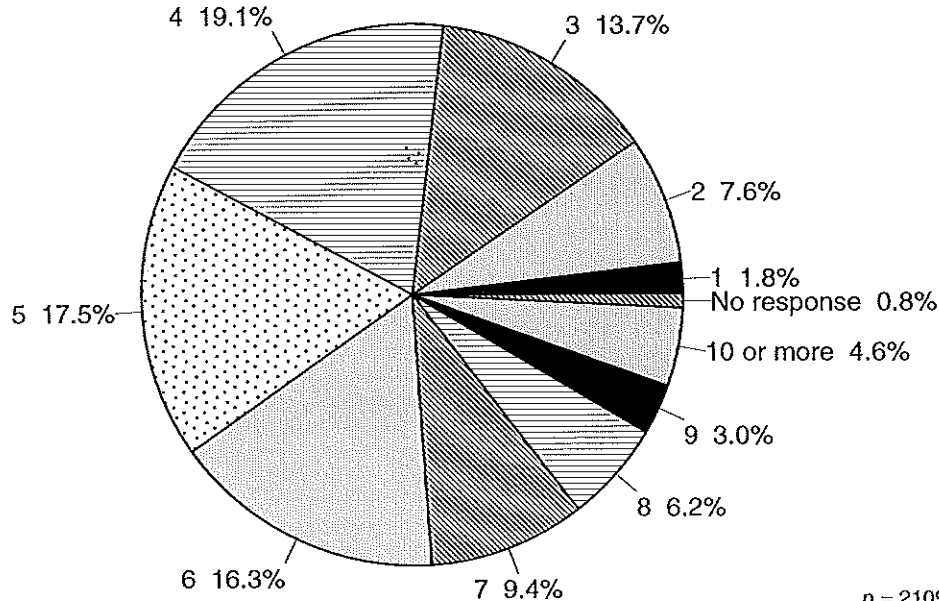

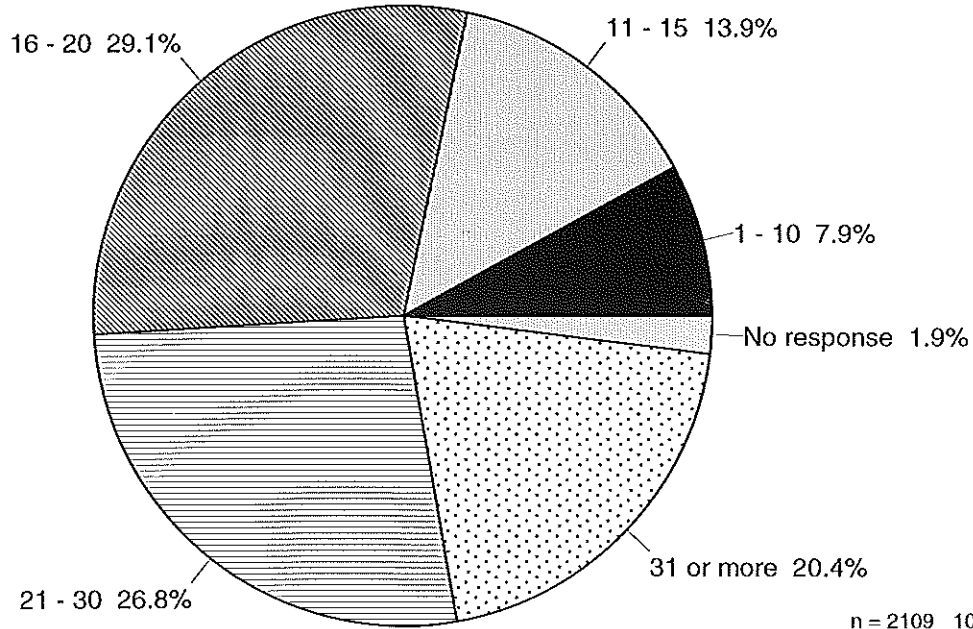

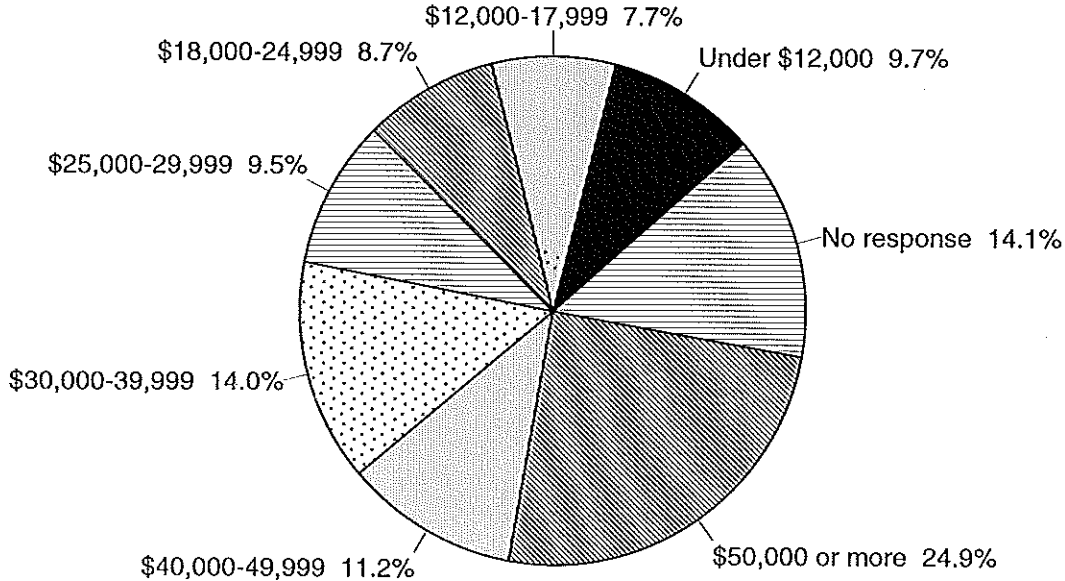

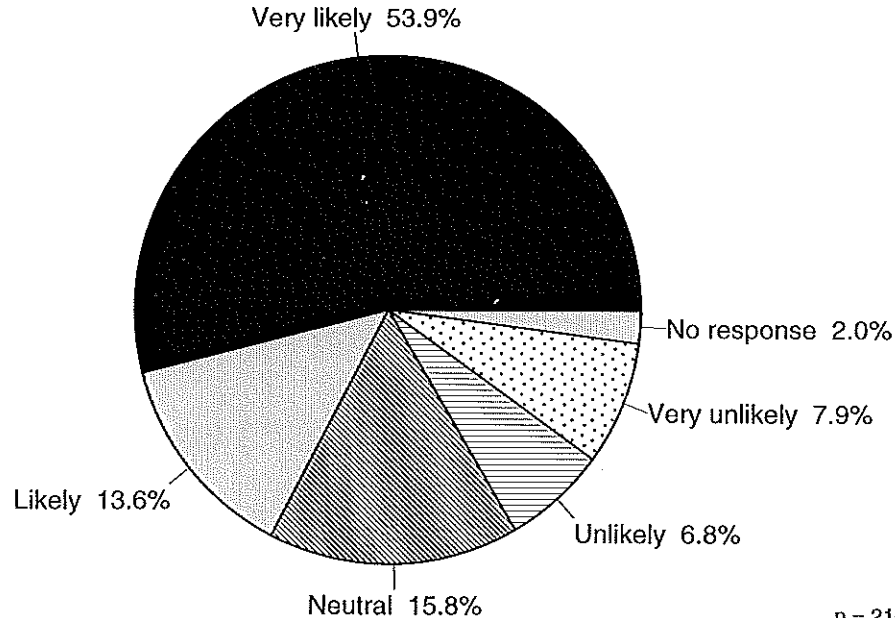

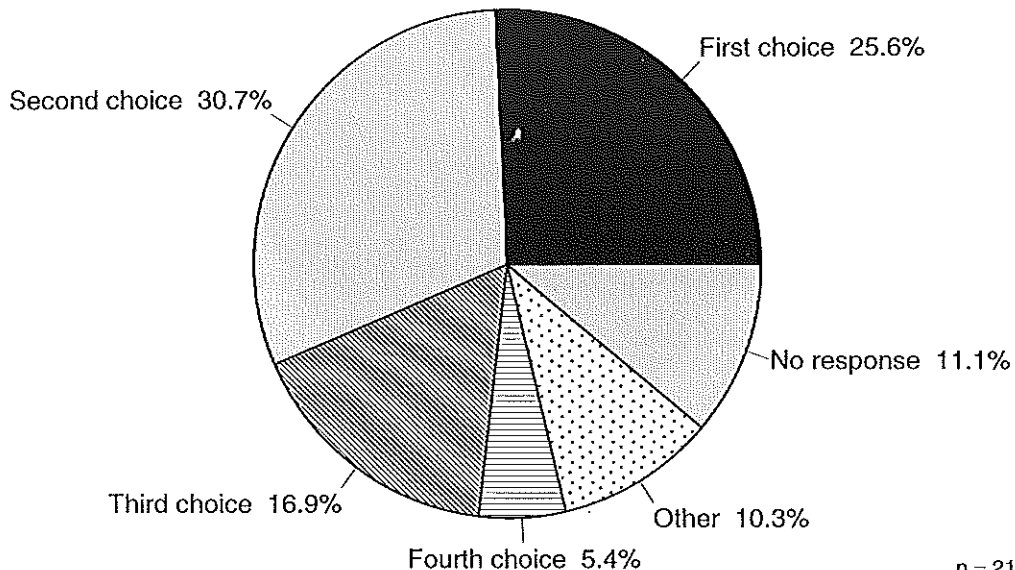

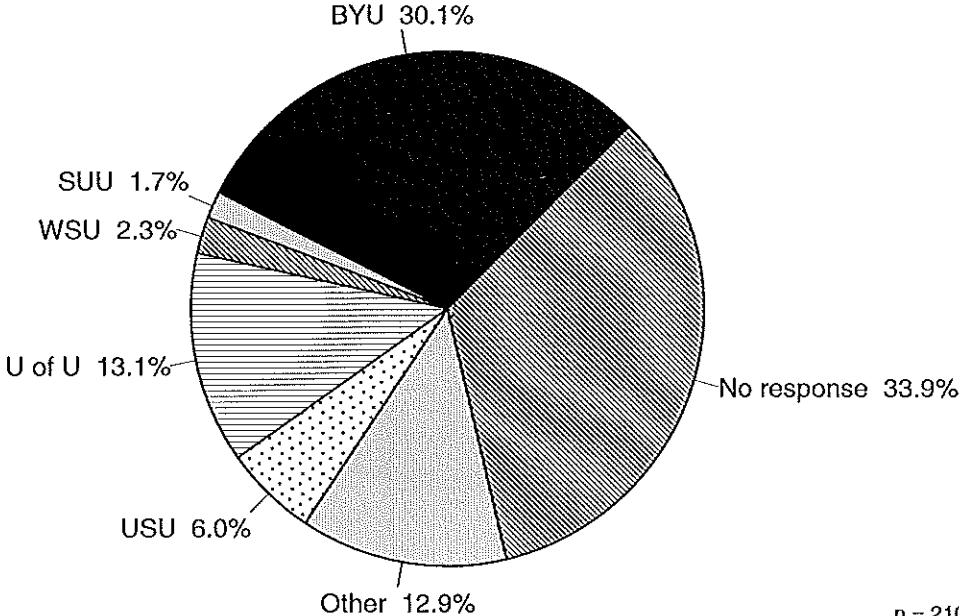

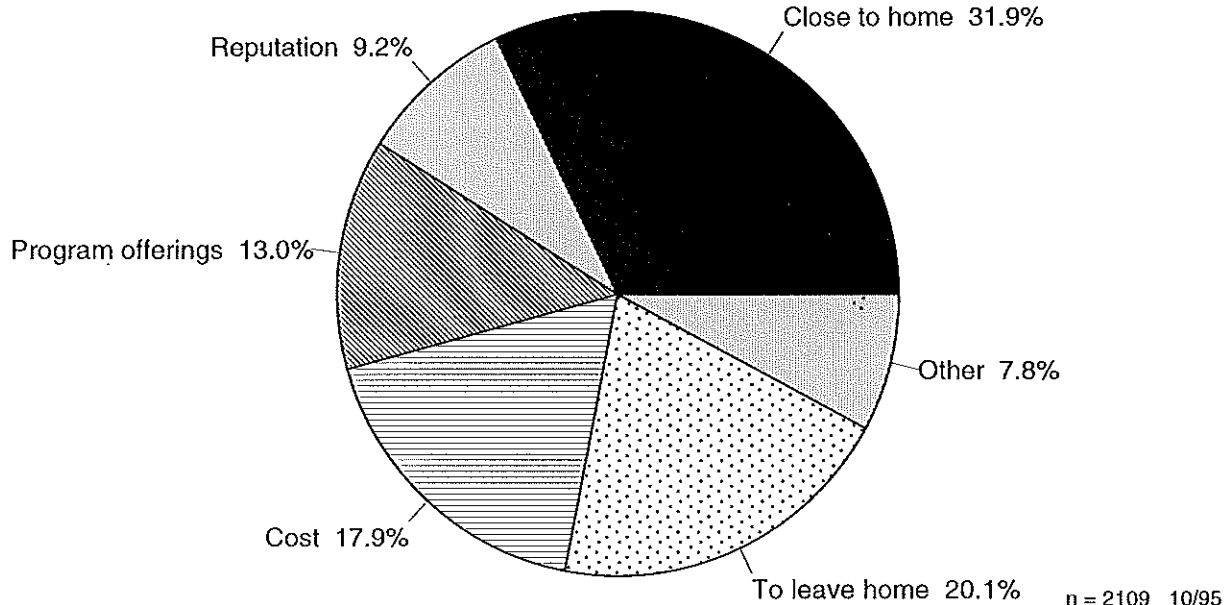

UVSC 1995 ECONOMIC IMPACT STUDY

The purpose of an economic impact study is to measure the effect of UVSC on the local economy. The measure is created by estimating the amount of money that the college brings into, or prevents from leaving, the local economy. The study also estimates the amount of money that is spent locally, and frequency with which the money is recycled or respent within the community--a multiplier effect. An additional impact estimated by the study is the impact the college has on local employment. Each person that the college employs will require services and products from other businesses which leads to new jobs (labor multiplier).

The 1995 UVSC Economic Impact Study suggests that UVSC plays a significant role in the Utah County economy. During the 1993-94 budget year, UVSC created over \$98 million dollars of economic activity in the valley and generated the equivalent of 1,696 full-time jobs for the residents of Utah County. The return-on-investment for Utah taxpayers was over five dollars for every one dollar UVSC received from state tax appropriations (see table below). In addition to the impacts that can be attributed to UVSC, the value of an educated population has also been demonstrated to be a significant benefit to the community. These benefits are realized in new businesses and industries locating in the area (MICRON), higher wages, and lower unemployment.

While an exact measure of economic impact would be extremely difficult to measure, the estimates have been proven to be a reliable way of approximating the economic impact of colleges and universities on their local communities. A full copy of this study with an executive summary and technical report is available in the UVSC, Office of Institutional Research.

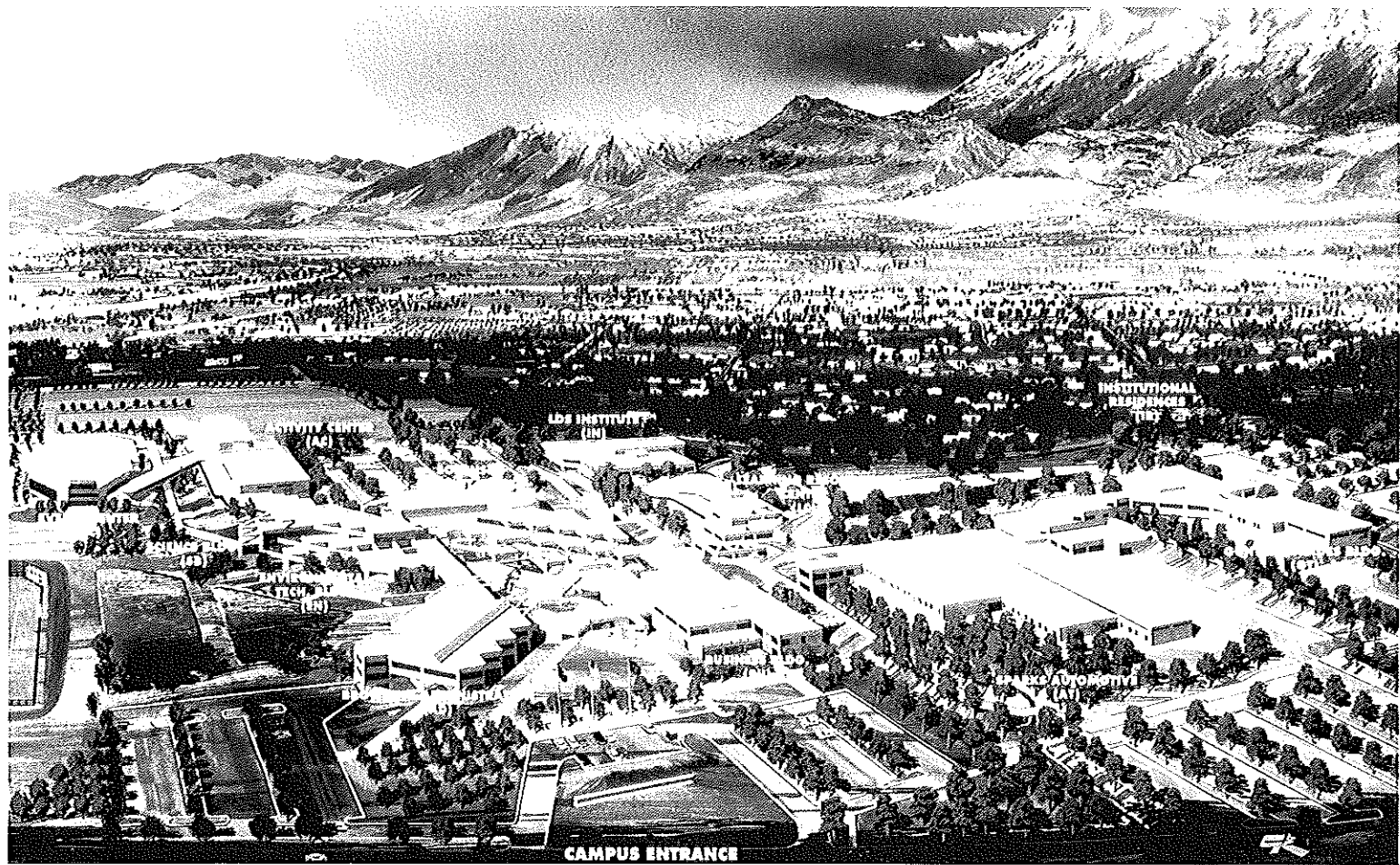
