## The Civic Knowledge of Utahns

Survey of Utah Residents
October 13 - November 15, 2021

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## About this Survey

Utah Valley University [UVU] contracted with YouGov to administer an online survey to a statewide representative sample of 942 Utahns, aged 18 and up. The survey was administered October 13 - November 15, 2001.

The survey was conducted as part of UVU's Civic Thought and Leadership Initiative to gauge the level of civic knowledge among Utah's voting age population. Respondents were asked a series of questions designed to assess basic factual knowledge about the U.S. Constitution as well as about U.S. governmental system in general, along with their general awareness of various national and international political leaders. They were also asked questions about their general orientation towards government, as well as the 2020 election and the subsequent controversy.

The questions were selected to match those used in surveys administered in major national academic surveys like the American National Election Study, administered each election year by the Center for Political Studies at the University of Michigan, as well those from other major national survey organizations:

- The Annenberg Public Policy Center at the University of Pennsylvania
- The Pew Research Center
- The Monmouth University Polling Institute

The purpose was to compare the level of civic knowledge and political attitudes among this sample of Utahns to that of the national samples.

Methodological and Weighting Information

YouGov interviewed 1553 respondents (18+ residents of Utah) who were then matched down to a sample of 1000 . To ensure data quality, respondents who failed an attention check question were then filtered out to arrive at a final sample size of 942 based on respondents' response to an attention check filter question. The respondents were matched to a sampling frame on gender, age, race, and education. The frame was constructed by stratified sampling from the full 2019 American Community Survey (ACS) 1-year sample with selection within strata by weighted sampling with replacements (using the person weights on the public use file).

The matched cases were weighted to the sampling frame using propensity scores. The matched cases and the frame were combined and a logistic regression was estimated for inclusion in the frame. The propensity score function included age, gender, race/ethnicity, years of education, and region. The propensity scores were grouped into deciles of the estimated propensity score in the frame and post-stratified according to these deciles. The weights were then post-stratified on 2016 and 2020 Presidential vote choice, and a four-way stratification of gender, age (4-categories), race (4-categories), and education (4-categories), to produce the final weight.

Demographic characteristics of the weighted and unweighted samples are compared to population parameters for Utah in the table below.
