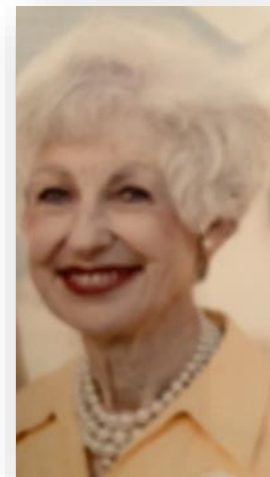

Jan. 25 *The African Trilogy—Things Fall Apart* Chinua Achebe Dale & Margene Shumway

In this rich cultural novel of Africa, Okonkwo, the hero of his village, falls from grace because of doubts of his own worth and a failure to control his temper.

Feb. 1 *A Street Cat Named Bob* James Bowen Ruth Hillam

James is a homeless recovering drug-addict on methadone, living in London, who was befriended by a cat. The cat is injured and then helped by James, who gets his family involved.

Feb. 8 *Letters for Emily* Camron Wright Fran Reiser

Emily, age 7, visits her grandfather with Alzheimer's every week. He leaves her a book of poems, riddles, and puzzles upon his death. It is soon realized he was trying to heal the fragile relationships within the whole family. A fascinating, clever, book with a surprise ending.

Feb. 15 *Curious Incident of the Dog in the Nighttime* Mark Haddon Margene & Dale Shumway

A British murder mystery told from the viewpoint of Chris, a 15 year old autistic boy, a dog lover, who finds his neighbor's dog killed in her back yard. How could Chris become a suspect in the murder?

Feb. 22 *Hope After Suicide (From Dark to Light)* Wendy Parmley Marjean Bingham

A true account by an open, talented, woman whose mother took her own life. She describes all the components and horror of her loss and also of her amazing recovery.

Mar. 1 *American Dirt* Jeanine Cummins Carol Hinckley

We end up with a migrant story because Lydia, a book-store owner in Mexico, who cherishes her young son Luca, is forced to flee with him to the north because of drug cartel craziness.

March 8 *Love and War* Mai Lee Dale & Margene Shumway

A true refugee story with its vivid descriptions of Communist life and atrocities in Vietnam. Hers is a family story depicting her escape to Korea, Saudi Arabia, and finally to Utah.

March 15 *When You Look Like Your Passport Photo, It's Time to Go Home* Erma Bombeck Linda Knight

Bombeck who has over 15 million comedic books writes a witty saga of travel--local & abroad.

Mar. 22 *Grant* Ron Chernow Tal Huber

Before the Civil war, Ulysses S. Grant was mostly a failure, but during the conflict he realized his remarkable potential and went on to become a United States president.

Mar. 29 *My Dog Tulip* J. R. Ackerley Dale & Margene Shumway

A story of a man searching for love. It is called one of the greatest animal stories, controversial because of Chapter two--about dog "liquids and solids" and about the author trying to find a husband for Tulip.



C.S. Lewis

C. S. Lewis, one of the best known Christian writers and thinkers of the twentieth century, produced writings that many have found enjoyable, inspiring, and intellectually stimulating. His life, including his conversion to Christianity and his eventual marriage and loss of his wife, is fascinating in its own right and can serve as an example of Christian discipleship.

We will look at his life through his own writings (*Surprised by Joy* and *A Grief Observed*) and through the film *Shadowlands*. We will also look at some of his most important fiction and non-fiction books, including *The Screwtape Letters*, *The Great Divorce*, *Mere Christianity*, *Perelandra*, *Till We Have Faces*, and several of the Chronicles of Narnia.

Tuesday Classes

Inside the Great War: World War I

10:00 AM taught by George Tate

In summer 2000 I began offering a seminar on The Great War and Modernism, usually on BYU London study abroad programs (2000, 2002, 2006, 2010) but also on campus.

I had long been drawn to the Great War (as WWI is called in England and France)—to its pathos, its poets, painters, and writers of memoirs—and I welcomed the chance to teach the course in England, where (despite Churchill and British valor in WWII) this is the war that shaped cultural identity.

The ubiquity of memorials, the Imperial War Museum, and other venues added richness to the course, as did our visit each time to sites associated with the Battle of the Somme in northern France. We not only studied the war itself, seeing it from inside, as it were, through the eyes of those who experienced it, but we also looked at its relationship to modernism, in literature (Eliot, the Bloomsbury group) and art. And we considered the legacy of the war and its commemoration.

It will not be possible to do all this in a single course meeting once a week for 10 weeks. So in this course, we will concentrate on the Great War as seen from the inside. Be prepared to have your hearts touched by what you encounter.

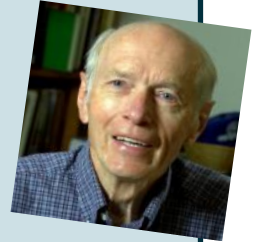

Temples Ancient and Modern

10:00 AM Taught by Don Norton

Winter semester, my class will review "apocryphal" documents as they relate to the temple—writings not included in our Bible. Many of these documents are part of a flood of Bible-related documents that have been discovered or re-discovered in the last 125 years and throw light on what happens in temples, ancient and modern (for example, the Dead Sea Scrolls, and the Nag Hammadi collection in Egypt). These documents are often very explicit in their references to temple worship.



A Historical, Virtual Rhine Cruise

1:00 Taught by Alan Keele

(In 2016, Alan Keele and his wife were invited as the cultural commentator for this BYU cruise.) We'll learn about amazing cathedral architectural history including Romans, Romanesque, Gothic and about cathedrals in Strasbourg, Worms, Mainz, Speyer, and Cologne. In Amsterdam, we'll find synagogues and Protestant church styles stripped of religious images by iconoclasm. In Worms we'll cover Martin Luther's story. He was summoned there to the famous Diet of Worms to answer for his heresies. We'll learn how his theology may still affect each of us personally here in Utah today. We'll discuss how many of our ancestors populated the banks of the Rhine. We'll cover secret Swiss bank accounts and forced factory slave labor of the Nuremberg trials along with the origins of the Crusades, the slaughter of the Jews in WW II during the Holocaust. This is a course you will never forget - and it's an exceptional chance to "get out of town!" And no jet lag!

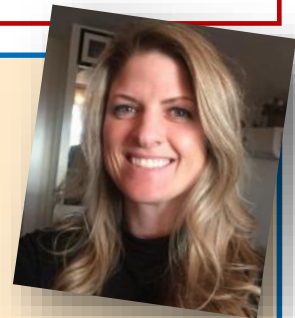
