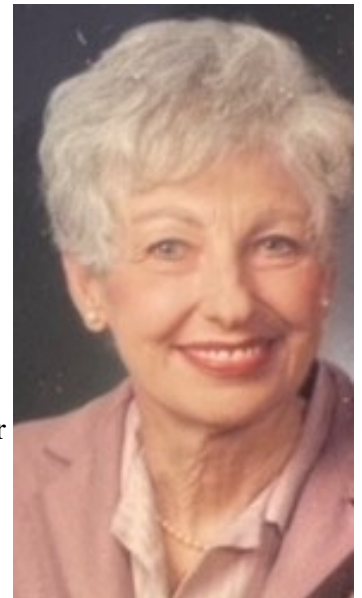
We recognize and appreciate the continuing support we receive from **Karina Eckern**, Recreation Coordinator with the Provo Recreation Center.











Participate in discussions

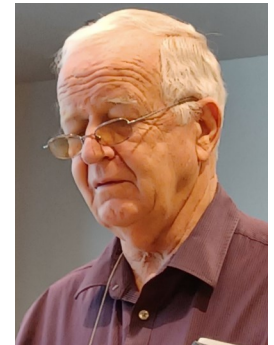

Worthwhile Readings

Judy and Ernest Istook

Judy and Ernest Istook, have curated an exceptional selection for you. Each has a message or story that endures. Some are fiction; some are non-fiction. Some are famous; others are not. All are memorable!

You will get the most from these classes if you read each book *before* it is discussed. But even if you don't do so, we hope you will benefit from the discussions.

For some of the books, we may delegate and ask students to take the lead, rather than the instructors, on presenting and leading discussion. With that thought in mind, please come to each class prepared to share a passage, thought or insight from that week's book which you find interesting, inspiring or simply well-written. Your input will spark good discussions!

- ♦ **Jan. 24** (Judy Istook) *The Agony and the Ecstasy by Irving Stone* (1961): An acclaimed telling of the life of Michelangelo, focused on his paintings in the Vatican's Sistine Chapel.
- ♦ **Jan. 31** (Ernest Istook) *The Wonderful Wizard of Oz by L. Frank Baum* (1900): The Great American Fairy Tale. You may have seen the movie, but there IS more to the story!
- ♦ **Feb. 7** (TBA) *The Last Bookshop in London: A Novel of World War II by Madeline Martin* (2021): A woman moves to London in 1939, just in time to experience Hitler's blitz bombings.
- ♦ **Feb. 14** (Ernest Istook) *How To Win Friends and Influence People by Dale Carnegie* (1936): The Great American Self-Help Book. First published in 1936, this book still sells about 200,000 copies a year. Why?
- ♦ **Feb. 21** (Judy Istook) *My Antonia by Willa Cather* (1918): In the late 1800's, an orphan boy and a family of immigrants are brought together in Nebraska, facing the challenges of building life after that territory has become a state.
- ♦ **Feb. 28** (Ernest Istook) *The Great Gatsby by F. Scott Fitzgerald* (1925): The Great American Novel. Idle rich are the backdrop for Gatsby's ambitions and his effort to learn if money can buy happiness.
- ♦ **Mar 7** (Marjean Bingham) *Cold Sassy Tree by Olive Ann Burns* (2007): Set in turn of the century Georgia, a 14 year old boy experiences a momentous and elusive year when childhood melts into adolescence. Enjoy characters who are wise and loony, unimpeachably pious and deliciously irreverent in this small Southern town.
- ♦ **Mar 14** (Judy Istook) *The Pioneers: The Heroic Story of the Settlers Who Brought the American Ideal West, by David McCullough* (2019): The first frontier for the new United States was the settling of the Northwest Territory. The pioneers face the hardships of creating communities in isolated areas while establishing the ideals proclaimed by the young nation.
- ♦ **Mar 21** (TBA) *The Boys in the Boat by Daniel James Brown* (2013): Nine Americans seek to win the gold at the 1936 Olympics in Berlin—hoping to row their way to victory.
- ♦ **Mar 28** (Judy & Ernest Istook) *Books That Made A Difference to You*. Our final class will be devoted to a special time for class members to tell about books that made a difference in their lives. Although not meant to be dismissive of books of faith and religion, the intent of this segment is for each class member to share a secular work that made a difference to you, whether fiction or non-fiction.



Harriet Beecher Stowe's Uncle Tom's Cabin

Neal Lambert

Explore this classic in a way you never anticipated. Follow Stowe's complex subthemes weaving the moral authority of motherhood and the redeeming virtues of Christianity with the horrors of slavery.

Harriet Beecher Stowe (1811-1896) published more than 30 books, but it was her best-selling anti-slavery novel *Uncle Tom's Cabin* that catapulted her to international celebrity and secured her place in history. Neal Lambert discusses the cultural and political significance of her book, then and now.

Stories taken from first hand accounts

In 1851 Stowe offered the publisher of the abolitionist newspaper *The National Era* a piece that would "paint a word picture of slavery." The first installment appeared on June 5, 1851. Stowe enlisted friends and family to send her information and scoured freedom narratives and anti-slavery newspapers for first hand accounts that she included. Stowe expected to write three or four installments, but *Uncle Tom's Cabin* grew to more than 40. In 1852 the serial was published as a two volume book.

Most important book of the 19th century

In the 19th century, the only book to outsell *Uncle Tom's Cabin* was the Bible. More than 170 years after its publication, *Uncle Tom's Cabin* has been translated into more than 70 languages and is known throughout the world. There are good reasons for paying close attention to Stowe's novel as scholars and cultural observers have referred to it as "the most important book of the nineteenth century." In important ways, much in the book still has relevance for us a century and a half later.

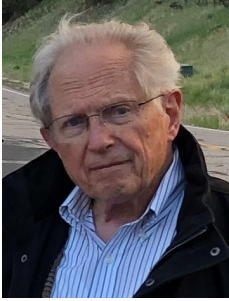
Bitcoin and Blockchain Basics

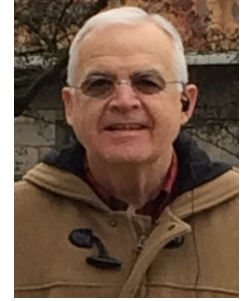

Cases & Legal Issues Relevant to You and Me

Alex Ludlow



If you enjoy fictionalized legal television dramas such as Suits, Better Call Saul, Boston Legal, How to Get Away With Murder, Perry Mason, The Good Wife, etc. You will enjoy our Elder Quest version of reality law. It’s not romanticized fiction but gritty real-life.

In this class you will become familiar with the legal issues and how they relate to us all. Alexander Ludlow knows the reality of laws, their intended effects and unintended consequences on all of us.

Whether historical or contemporary, the law has in the past, and continues in the present, to explore and examine issues which are important to us as individuals, and collectively as a community and nation.

In this course, we will study and discuss some of the cases and issues which have shaped our society as well as those with which we grapple today.

Alexander Ludlow graduated from the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU. Following graduation, he was commissioned as a JAG officer in the US Navy. After active duty and Reserve service, he retired as a Commander. He practiced law in Southeastern Connecticut and served as an adjunct faculty member teaching Business Law. After returning to Utah Valley, he became a prosecutor for the Utah County Attorney’s Office.

“Law is an imperfect profession in which success can rarely be achieved without some sacrifice of principle. Thus all practicing lawyers — and most others in the profession — will necessarily be imperfect, especially in the eyes of young idealists. There is no perfect justice, just as there is no absolute in ethics.



THE REAL MACGUFFIN: The Genius of Early Hitchcock

Master of Suspense

Even before Alfred Hitchcock moved to America from his native England in 1939, he already enjoyed the reputation as a master of suspense film-making with the new toy, cinema. Such films as *THE LODGER*, *THE 39 STEPS*, *THE LADY VANISHES*, *THE SECRET AGENT*, *FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT* and many more that won the attention of Hollywood moguls who invited him to join their ranks. They gave him the opportunity to create such early classics as *REBECCA*, *SUSPICION*, *SHADOW OF A DOUBT*, *SPELLBOUND*, *NOTORIOUS*, *THE PARADINE CASE*, and others. After 1950, of course, he made film history with more of his brilliant works.

Hitchcockian Techniques

This course will look at the crucial elements in his earliest films, up to 1950, to learn how what is celebrated in his later films—mystery, humor, suspense, shock, and even the creepy—is already blooming darkly in his earlier efforts. We will look at his influences, his unique Hitchcockian techniques, and his methods of creating character, mood, suspense, and those wonderful plot twists that are his indelible signature.

We'll even define “MacGuffin” for those out of the loop, and we'll reveal Hitchcock's greatest understatement regarding his own film work: “It's only a movie.”

Enjoying Shakespeare

What is just and what is fair? Experience betrayal, love and forgiveness in two of the Bard's best. Escape with us to a time eternally poignant as we read *The Tempest*. Although first performed at court in 1611 by the King's Men, many quotes from the plays are just as relevant today. Perhaps you've occasionally thought, “Hell is empty and all the devils are here.”

Today's feminists will enjoy *The Merry Wives of Windsor*, as Falstaff dearly pays for his treatment of women. Published in 1602, it is believed to have been written prior to 1597. There's no doubt it may be Shakespeare's most entertaining comedy.





Collections: Hidden Treasures!

If you've ever wondered why your closets, spare rooms and garages are so full, perhaps you're a collector and haven't yet realized that you, too, may be surrounded by hidden treasures.

John Nebeker began collecting stamps as a child. Since retiring from the US Marine Corps in 1990, he has been collecting and selling stamps from all over the world.

Not an ordinary collector, John's known as the "Quirky" stamp guy, because he likes finding rare stamps with mistakes or errors. He loves "stamp treasure hunts" and quickly admits that finding a unique stamp is a great thrill for him.

Stamps are only part of John's story. Google will find over 7 billion responses in less than one second if you search Collections. While John doesn't have billions of collections what he does have varies widely and includes everything from stamps to coins, vinyl, comic books, trading cards, toys, dolls, porcelains and even the Little Golden Books. John's adventures will entertain, amaze and inspire you.

We will learn how to collect valued antiques, vintage and items that are simply collectible. Negotiation is the name of the game and John will help us be smart shoppers. He will share how he locates, acquires, organizes, stores, maintains and, yes, sells at a profit! Like John, you can also find treasures at garage sales and thrift shops.

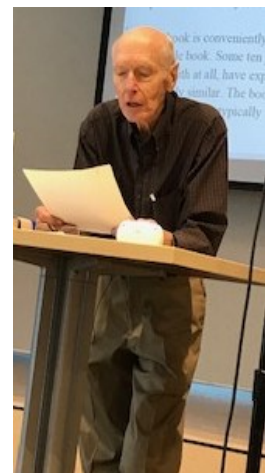
John shares how he found one of the very first Barbies. "I stopped into a thrift shop in Idaho. In the collectible case was a Barbie doll with no clothes on. I thought to myself, 'What is a Barbie doll doing in this collectible case?' Most Barbie dolls aren't worth much. So I did a internet search for the Barbie logo identification site. Bingo! It was one of the first Barbies. Probably #4, worth \$100's. The thrift shop was asking \$20. I asked if the store would go lower. And the manager did go lower. Got the doll for \$12." Not everyone knows that the first Barbies have different eyes and facial features, clothes and markings.

Each week John and an occasional special guest will take us on a virtual treasure hunt, telling us what was found and challenging us to find the hidden treasures all around us.

Hugh W Nibley and Temples in History

Our earth is all but saturated with a variety of special "structures"—mounds of earth, concentric circles, subterranean passages (caves), axial highways, towers, pyramids, and other great ancient monuments, including temples (ancient and modern)—all of which mark human religious efforts to link themselves with the Heavens, the erstwhile home of us humans, the "real" world. Latter-day Saints have just dedicated some 170 such structures, whose significance has puzzled scholars for centuries. Hugh Nibley was one of the first of Latter-day Saints to dedicate himself to exploring the meaning of these sites and buildings—which he aptly calls powerhouses. His work—and that of his successors, both scholars and prophets—will be the focus of this class.





German Literature

The Remarkable Heinrich von Kleist

My forte is German Literature, yet so far in my time with Elder Quest, I have not taught any German Literature. I have treated the works of Leslie Norris, Mozart's *The Magic Flute*, the Helmuth Hübener story of LDS resistance to Nazism, two films about our pre-existent life and our decision to become human, some random ramblings about the River Rhine, and most recently the spellbinding account of Ray Matheny's adventures in a B17 and in Stalag 17B (interesting numerical coincidence!).

This semester I look forward to teaching a course on the stories of a remarkable German writer named Heinrich von Kleist *1777 – †1811 (in English translation, of course). Kleist's not-so-short stories such as "The Earthquake in Chile" or "Michael Kohlhaas" are so gripping that I guarantee that your heart will be pounding loudly in your chest as you experience them. They have been described as "Dark, Complex, Compelling, Engrossing, Tragic, Vivid, Brilliant." Understatements! All understatements!

We have a great 320-page volume of eight of Kleist's stories in the Penguin Classics series entitled: *The Marquise of O and Other Stories* (\$17 on Amazon). I think it is possible that we can read them all in ten weeks. I hope you can join me our Spring Semester!

His journey has been long and often frightening, but always hopeful. He spent years in refugee camps until he landed in Salt Lake City. Without friends and desperate, he came to Provo in 1996 because he said he felt the spirit telling him to ask for help.

Through unwavering courage, hard work, and assistance from generous strangers, he has gone on to become a well-educated, contributing member of our society.

Leonard founded and is currently the Executive Director of the Utah Community & Refugee Partnership Center helping Utah Valley refugees with a variety of needs including housing, language training, and basic health and hygiene necessities. They are currently gearing up to welcome refugees from Afghanistan to our community.

As a child in Norway Mosie loved American movies because there was always a hero to save the day. At the age of 19 Mosie immigrated from Norway by herself to attend BYU.

Later Mosie served on the Provo Utah School Board Association for 25 yrs.; she also served on the National School Board Association for 10 yrs. and was inducted as President of the National School Boards Association (NSBA) in 2002. At that time, she said, "...the United States' education system is not a movie and there is no Superman to rescue the nation's children.
