The industry made dozens if not hundreds of “war movies,” but our interest is in its attention to the lives of ordinary people on the home front.

We will consider these contributions—made by major studios, Hollywood stars, and even Walt Disney—and discuss some classics of the era such as *Casablanca*, *Mrs. Miniver*, and *The Best Years of Our Lives*, among others. Even Donald Duck got into the act. Did you know he was drafted?

EXPLORING PARADISE LOST

We'll explore *Paradise Lost*, one of the greatest epics of all time – and certainly the greatest epic in English – by examining and discussing it, part by part, over the course of ten weeks. Written by John Milton in the mid- to late 1600s, *Paradise Lost* presents Milton's account of the War in Heaven, the creation of the universe and of the first humans, the temptation and fall of Adam and Eve, and their expulsion from the Garden of Eden, along with a preview of human history from that point forward.

Along the way, I'll share information about Milton's life and historical context, about his glorious poetic style (the book is written entirely in blank verse), and about his use of mythology and (with many modifications) the traditional epic.

The most valuable thing we'll discover in *Paradise Lost* is the way it wrestles with issues all of us have to deal with – good and evil, sin and repentance, and especially our relationships with each other and with God. Exploring *Paradise Lost* will thus be an opportunity to experience a powerful, beautiful, and highly influential work of literature and at the same time to explore the meaning of our own lives.

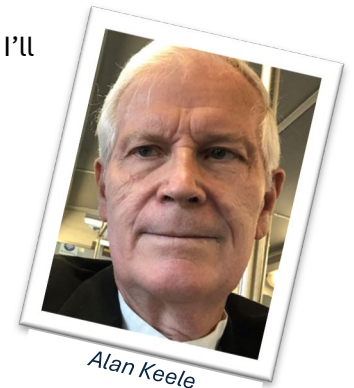
THE POETRY OF LESLIE NORRIS

Hi! I'm Alan Keele and I'm excited to tell you about the Elder Quest course I'll be conducting this coming Fall semester on the life and works of Leslie Norris, the justifiably famous Welsh poet and prose writer who somehow miraculously found his way to Utah where he spent the last several decades of his life. (In fact, the first home he and his wife Kitty purchased in Utah County — in 1985 — is their "cottage" located at 1138 South 400 West in Orem, which has now been purchased by UVU and incorporated into the campus, making Leslie a kind of literal poet in residence at UVU, even though that was technically his title at BYU.)

By some further miracle, Leslie and Kitty and Linda and I became great friends and Leslie and I even collaborated on the translation from the German of two

magnificent poem cycles by the great Austrian poet Rainer Marie Rilke as well as a number of works by the greatest German poet Johann Wolfgang von Goethe.

If you are like many average folks (who often go through life thinking poetry is some kind of rhyming sentimentality like that on greeting cards or something read aloud with the best intentions from pulpits), this may be a once-in-lifetime opportunity to experience true poetry, which is nothing less than a visionary, mind-boggling revelation of deeper, eternal meaning in our lives, a key to the profound harmony of all parts of the universe. That's what Leslie Norris did for me and I hope you'll want to let him do that for you!

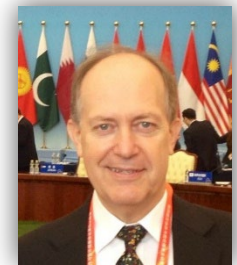

DANCE OF THE TITANS

How do the United States and China wrestle with their common challenges, and with each other? Should China's authoritarian system be the envy of U.S. politicians who want to "get things done"? Is China's system on the verge of collapse, or is the United States in decline? Who is more likely to be the envy of the world in the decades to come? The answer to these important questions largely depends on how effectively the United States and China can deal with the problems they face.

In our class this year, we will examine several issues: economic efficiency, political legitimacy, workforce competitiveness, the attractiveness of lifestyle, and so on, to get a sense of where the world is being led by the two global titans.

Africa has one of the fastest growing populations in the world. Economically, Africa has eleven of the world's twenty fastest growing nations. We will hear amazing stories of Christian pastors who felt inspired by God to organize hundreds of unauthorized LDS congregations, long before the church officially showed up! We finished Part One of our course, “Winston Churchill in the 20th Century” in the very early stages of WWII: mid-1940. If we must leave Winston frozen in a specific year of his life, 1940 would be his personal choice. But there’s more.

In Part Two we will take a closer look at Churchill as both a war leader and an international statesman. He will battle his way through the first two years of the war when England held on, cobbled together by crisis, and Churchill’s determination not to see further concessions made to Hitler.

We will examine the major conferences held by the Allied Powers during the war and how the agreements reached, especially in the final gatherings at Yalta and Potsdam, still affect us in our time.

We will examine Churchill’s performance as a military strategist, the role in which he greatly frustrated his generals and admirals but also made important, though checkered contributions to winning the conflict.

We will see Churchill rejected by the vote of his grateful but exhausted countrymen in 1945, followed by his less than welcomed warnings about the rise of Soviet aggression leading up to the Cold War.

Amidst these global events, he continues to write furiously, emerging as one of the most prolific historians of his time, though writing was for most of his life not his day job. We will turn to Churchill as both historian and prescient commentator on the turn of world events

In the post-war years, as we continue to walk with Churchill, we see he is still very much a husband and father. We will reflect on some marvelous and heartrending moments from the family’s personal history.

Finally, we must see Winston through the two last decades of a life that may have lasted a bit too long for his own liking. Still, he lived until 1965, defiant as an old lion and having left his indelible mark on our turbulent world.

Poetic expression arises out of our felt human need to explain ourselves—to explore who we are and what we are as human beings. Poetry is a matter of both our outer and our inner lives—the world of

the hearth and the world of the heart—expressed not in paint or music, but in words: the sound and sense of saying something about who we are as individuals at a given place and time, negotiating the hours of each day as wives, husbands, children, citizens, people old and young—human beings with fears and hopes, individuals who delight, wish, love, laugh, and weep—or, as Robert Frost said, poetry can be “the surprise of remembering something I didn’t know I knew.”

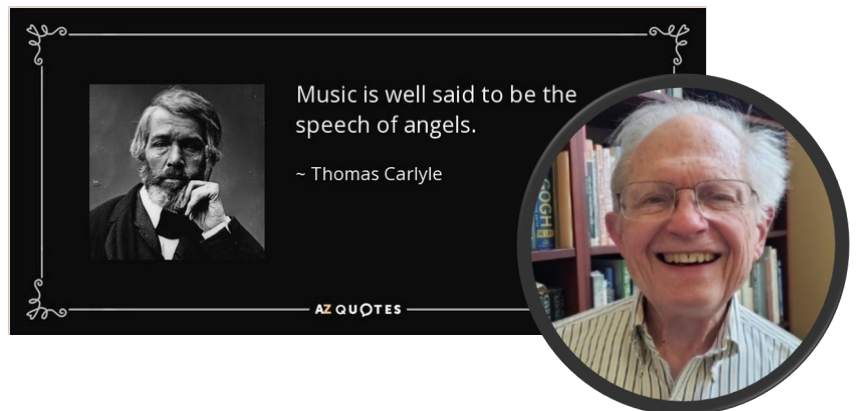

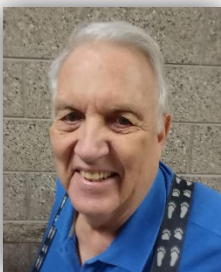

ENJOYING SHAKESPEARE



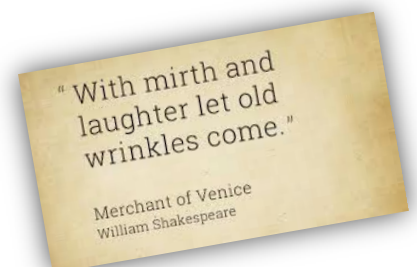

Who We Are

- Elder Quest is a unique organization sponsored by Utah Valley University.
- Our major purpose is to provide life-long learning opportunities for seniors 55 and older.
- We're now in our 30th year! Last year we served over 200 members throughout Utah Valley.

What We Do

1. We offer two semesters of classes per year. Fall semester begins mid-September and runs until shortly before Thanksgiving. Winter semester starts mid-January and runs mid to late March.
2. Ten to twelve classes are offered each semester. Each class is held once per week, ten classes per semester. Classes are held Monday through Thursday at the Provo Senior Center and are also available on-line via Zoom. Elder Quest members can take as many or as few classes as they desire. Classes require no homework or tests.
3. Classes include a variety of subjects (see fall class schedule on the back side of this page). Elder Quest teachers are skilled professionals. All teachers donate their time and effort simply because they love teaching Elder Quest.
4. In addition to regular classes, we hold a series of guest lectures each semester, our Elder Quest potpourris. Guest presenters teach one short class based on interest and expertise.
5. We sponsor monthly luncheons prepared and served by UVU Culinary Arts students.
6. Three or four day trips each semester take us to fascinating places and afford opportunity to socialize together. Elder Quest also shows weekly Friday movies at the Orem Public Library.
7. Our Elder Quest scholarships provide financial aid to non-traditional UVU students. Following winter semester an outstanding one-day seminar is held, featuring excellent speakers and outstanding entertainment. Here we ask members to dig deep and contribute to our UVU Non-Traditional Student Scholarship program.

You may be surprised to find that **Elder Quest membership costs just \$45.00 per year or \$25.00 for each semester.** Lunches are priced separately at \$16.00 and day trips are extra based upon the price of the event and the cost of the bus.
