


Hitchcock: The Flourishing Fifties Monday 10:00 — 11:00 Judith and Leonard Tourney

Congo Adventures Monday 1:00 — 2:00 Bruce Young



In this class you will learn about the recent adventures my wife and I had in one of the most beautiful countries

on earth — the DR-Congo. You will also learn of the history of their wonderful people, their challenges, and their magnificent possibilities.

We taught English to adults and youth and worked with albinos who face particularly hard challenges in Africa. We attended a celebration of the International Day of Albinism at Don Bosco, in Mbuji-Mayi, where we were living. While in Mbuji-Mayi we also shot a short film (which we'll show in class) presenting an imaginative story that focuses on issues of healing and reconciliation and celebrates our love of the Congolese people.

In the capital, Kinshasa, we were judges at an international film festival and got acquainted with filmmakers from the DR-Congo and other countries. Besides seeing old friends in Kinshasa, we made new ones, including members of the Lumumba family, who carry on the heritage of Patrice Lumumba, the first Prime Minister of the independent Congo, described by Malcolm X as "the greatest black man who ever walked the African continent."

We've curated a memorable selection for you this semester. You will enjoy these classes more if you read each book *before* it is discussed; but even if you don't, we believe you will appreciate the discussions.

Please come to each class prepared to share a passage, thought or insight from that week's book which you find interesting, inspiring or simply well-written. Your input will spark good discussions!

Judy will focus on books that inspire, such as Michael Wilcox' 10 Great Souls I Want to Meet in Heaven and his Fire in the Bones, and Light From Many Lamps by Lillian Eichler Watson. Plus The Mark of a Giant by Ted Stewart.

Our last class of the semester will be titled Books That Made A Difference to You and will be led by Judy and Ernest Istook. This is for you, our class members, to tell about books that made a difference in your lives. Although we are not dismissive of books of faith and religion, this segment is intended for class members to share secular works that made a difference to you.


Cultural Geography — Russia Tuesday 11:00 - 12:00 Jeannie Griffiths

Sam Clemens, Mark Twain, and America: America's Most **Distinctive Writer** Tuesday 1:00 — 2:00 **Neal Lambert**

The person we know as Mark Twain first gained his reputation as a literary

funny man and entertaining lecturer. But under the influence of his wife and daughters, his original recognition as a comedian developed into a writer who, by the genius of his own sensitivities, held up a reflection of our society that shows us not just who we are, but also, by implication, what we can and should be; not just as Americans, but as human beings.

Rather than a thorough reading of one book, we will be looking at samples from most of his major writings, beginning with his first travel books, then dip into some of his best known works (e.g. Tom Sawyer, Huckleberry Finn) and closing with some of the tragic implications of his last novels and shorter pieces.

Why Will Rogers? Why not!

A remarkable man, he was a comic, an entertainer, a roper, a sage, a writer, a Cherokee/ cowboy mix from Indian Territory. Through his words and video clips we will get to know Will and what made him the beloved voice of the people of this country during the turbulent twenties and thirties.

His father, disappointed by Will's career in show business, said it was obvious he would never amount to anything. Will became the highest paid entertainer on Broadway, the number one leading man in Hollywood despite knowing his acting limitations, a sought after speaker, a best-selling author, had daily and weekly New York Times' columns and with a national syndicate, produced weekly radio broadcasts, and was known and loved by all Americans from farmers to presidents. With his downhome drawl and slow grin he spoke profound wisdom couched in humor that will never get old.



Cases & Legal Issues Of Relevance Part II Wednesday 10:00 -- 11:00 Alex Ludlow

If you enjoyed fictionalized legal television dramas such as Suits, Better Call Saul, Boston Legal,



How to Get Away With Murder, Perry Mason, The Good Wife, etc. you will enjoy our Elder Quest version of reality law. It's not romanticized fiction but gritty real-life.

This Fall's class is a continuation of our very popular Spring semester class. You will become familiar with many additional legal issues and how they relate to us all. Alex Ludlow understands the reality of laws, their intended effects and the unintended consequences on all of us.

Whether historical or contemporary, the law has in the past, and continues in the present, to explore and examine issues which are important to us as individuals, and collectively as a community and nation.

In this course, we will study and discuss some of the cases and issues which have shaped our society as well as those with which we grapple today. Alexander Ludlow graduated from the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU. Following graduation, he was commissioned as a JAG officer in the US Navy. After active duty and Reserve service, he retired as a Commander. He practiced law in Southeastern Connecticut and served as an adjunct faculty member teaching Business Law. After returning to Utah Valley, he became a prosecutor for the Utah County Attorney's Office.

"Law is an imperfect profession in which success can rarely be achieved without some sacrifice of principle. Thus all practicing lawyers — and most others in the profession — will necessarily be imperfect, especially in the eyes of young idealists. There is no perfect justice, just as there is no absolute in ethics. But there is perfect injustice, and we know it when we see it." – Alan Dershowitz


