# **CE OVERVIEU**




What: Concurrent Enrollment is a partnership between Utah Valley University and your high school where qualified students can earn college credit. The Concurrent Enrollment Office, UVU academic departments, and the partnering high schools work closely together to uphold the academic quality of each course.

How: College classes are taught at the high school by UVU-approved high school instructors using college curriculum and assessment. Classes are also offered through Live Interactive where the professor is on UVU's campus and the class is televised in real time to the high school.

When: Students can take college classes throughout their high school experience. It's important to note that while 9th graders are eligible to take Concurrent Enrollment classes, if 9th grade is not located in their high school they will not be able to participate in CE until they attend the actual high school as a sophomore.

Why: Concurrent Enrollment can save time and money. The more CE classes a student takes, the less time the student will need to spend in college. Also, Concurrent Enrollment is a lot less expensive than attending college. CE students can choose to take a few classes to get ahead in college, take general education courses and earn a General Education Certificate, or complete a University Studies Associate Degree.





# ADMISSIONS



**What:** The first step to taking any Concurrent Enrollment course is to get admitted. This one-time process makes you an official UVU student.

**How:** In order to be admitted as a new UVU student and prepare to register for courses, there are some important steps to be aware of:

### Admissions

Students must enroll in the correct corresponding high school course and complete the UVU Concurrent Enrollment admissions application.

### **Test Scores**

Students interested in taking a CE English or math course must send their ACT score to UVU or take the corresponding ACCUPLACER or ALEKS test (Learn more about testing by turning the page).

### Transcripts

Students are only required to submit a transcript if it's being used to submit a test score (like the ACT). Learn more about registration on pages 11 & 12.

**When:** All course registrations happen through a student's myUVU account. Login information is emailed 24-48 hours after completing the admission application.

**Why:** UVU requires a one-time application. No matter how many or how few CE courses you take, being admitted makes you a UVU student.



### Student Success Tip!

Know your deadlines!

It's important to know when the admissions and registration deadlines ar during a semester/year. All deadlines can be found on the UVU Concurrent Enrollment website.

Keep in mind, Live Interactive courses follow different deadlines than face-to-face courses.

# PREREQUISITES & TESTING

### Student Success Tip!

### Did you know?

FERPA is a federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. According to this law, the student owns their record. This applies to Concurrent Enrollment students as well. No one, other than the student, is allowed access to student records without written consent from the student.

**What:** Prerequisites are the requirements that have to be completed before taking a Concurrent Enrollment class. Some CE courses require a minimum GPA and/or ACT score in order to enroll.

How: Students should take the ACT with the goal of meeting the prerequisite score requirements. If you're unable to meet the prerequisite ACT requirement, you may need to take the Accuplacer or ALEKS.

**When:** Students should complete any prerequisites before registering for a CE course.

Why: Prerequisites help to ensure that students are prepared to take and do well in their selected CE classes. If you're able to complete the prerequisites, you're ready to earn college credit!

### Accuplacer

The Accuplacer is an alternative exam to test into a CE English course. If you don't have qualifying ACT scores, the Reading Comprehension and Sentence Skills tests are required to participate in English 1010.

You must be admitted as a UVU student before taking this test. There are testing fees, determined by Testing Services. Bring a valid school or government-issued photo ID. Your results will be immediate.

### ALEKS

ALEKS is an alternative testing option for UVU's math placement assessment. Students have six months of access to the prep and learning modules through myUVU to help them prepare to take the test. This test is also subject to fees.

### ACT

Sign up for an ACT test. If you need help, reach out to your high school counselor.

Use our university code (4278) when you register to send your scores to UVU for free. Submit all ACT scores; only your highest scores will be considered.

If you already took the ACT without sending your scores to UVU, don't worry! Your high school registrar can send us an official transcript with your scores.

UVU is an ACT testing location, so you can sign up to take the test on campus.

# REGISTRATION

Even if you're not on campus, you can show your UVU pride by wearing green every week.

What:

Registration is the

process through which

students enroll in courses.

Students must complete this

process for each course they

take. Registration requires a

STEPI

**CRN** (Course Registration

Number) for each course.

### How:

Students register for their courses through their myUVU portal. (my.uvu.edu) This portal provides access to a student's individual college record, including, but not limited to: registration, class listings and class schedule, transcripts, student email, and account information. Students should log in to myUVU regularly for updates and announcements.

STEP 2

**On Wednesdays** le Wear Green

Students need to find their course CRNs. This is a five-digit number unique to each course that students must enter to register for face-to-face and Live Interactive courses. Students then go to their myUVU portal and follow the registration prompts.

STEP 3

### When:

Registration must be completed prior to the start of each course. Registration for fall and full-year courses starts in spring and goes through the start of school in the fall. Registration for spring semester courses occurs from November -January of each year.

STEP 4

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Students who miss the registration deadline also miss out on getting college credit for the class. Students must tell UVU which class they want college credit for, and registration is the process for doing that.

\*Credit Hours: Typically refers to the number of hours per week a student will spend in a class. Using the credit hours of a class, a student can estimate the amount of time spent outside of class studying. For each credit hour spent in class, a student should spend two hours outside of class studying.



# ADVISING

As a UVU student, you have access to FREE HELP with assignments and homework through UVU Academic Tutoring Labs. Tutoring labs are available for many UVU courses, and you may use any lab even if you aren't taking a CE course in that subject.

What: Your Concurrent Enrollment (CE) Academic Advisor is part of your Success Team. Your advisor helps you select which CE classes to take, when to take them, and which options will help you reach your academic goals.

HOW: To schedule an appointment with your CE advisor click on "Connect with an Advisor" on the UVU Concurrent Enrollment homepage, find the advisor for your school, and click "Schedule an Appointment." You can certainly bring your guardian(s) to the meeting, but they CANNOT come without you.

When: Any Concurrent Enrollment student can meet with a CE advisor. Any student earning 12+ college credits while in high school is especially encouraged to meet with their CE advisor.

Students planning on earning a General Education Certificate (GEC) or an Associate Degree (AS) while in high school MUST meet with a CE advisor. It's best to meet with your CE advisor prior to taking any CE classes.

Why: Concurrent Enrollment is a great opportunity for high school students, but collecting random college credits is not the goal. Too many of the wrong credits can cause issues with future financial aid and can even lengthen your time in college instead of shortening it.

# ACADEMIC WARNINGS & PROBATION

**Uhat:** Academic warnings and probation are holds placed on your account according to your academic standing that prevent you from registering for courses.

UVU Concurrent Enrollment courses are applied to your permanent college transcript, and we encourage students to take their courses seriously. CE students adhere to the same academic standards as all UVU students.

How: You can view your holds under the "Student" tab in your myUVU student portal.

**When:** When things don't go as planned, these holds are placed on your account. Academic warnings are given when the most recent semester GPA is below 2.0. An academic probation hold is placed on a student account when two consecutive semesters are below a 2.0 GPA.

**Why:** GPA does matter. These holds are placed on student accounts to ensure students are ready for their academic workload and to help them stay on a path for success.

To remove an Academic Warning hold, you must complete the Academic Warning Workshop.

To remove an Academic Probation hold, you must complete the Academic Probation Workshop. After you have completed the workshop, you will need to meet with your CE advisor to develop a success plan.

## HOLDS

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**What:** Holds are placed on student accounts for several reasons. Some holds prevent course registration or obtaining an official academic transcript.

**How:** You can view your holds through your myUVU student portal. Here you will be able to determine which department put the hold onto your account.

**When:** The types of holds that are placed on your account may vary. To determine how to remove your hold, you will want to contact the department that issued the hold as soon as possible or reach out to the Concurrent Enrollment Office for guidance.

**Why:** Holds are placed on student accounts to help students stay on track and follow through with various requirements and responsibilities, such as paying tuition or meeting prerequisites.

# PETITIONS

What: We know that life happens, and sometimes things occur that no one can control. We call these "extenuating circumstances" and it is for these circumstances that petitions are available.

How: Students can apply for a review of their circumstance by visiting the petition page found on Concurrent Enrollment's main webside, uvu.edu/concurrent.

When: Sometimes life doesn't go as planned, and things happen which are outside our control. In these cases, students may petition to add or withdraw from a CE course outside a deadline.

**Why:** Students may choose to petition for certain changes to their academic record - to improve GPA or academic standing - which may have fallen due to an extenuating circumstance.

### Student Success Tip!

Wolverine Track is a convenient web-based tool that allows you to track degree progress, prepare for registration, and plan for graduation. It's designed to aid and facilitate academic advising but is not intended to replace advising sessions. To view your Wolverine Track, log into myUVU.
