Senior Checklist Guide 2nd Quarter

Prep work - if you can prepare before you meet with a senior do so. If you cannot do so, please have a laptop or desktop next to you so you can review the following information while they are with you.

Grades/Class Credits

 If you have access to PowerSchool and the Graduation Progress tab, ensure the student is on track to graduate by meeting credit requirements. If a student is doing well, encourage more challenging classes, such as CE or AP. Assist the student with connecting with the CTE advisor in the school. Is the student an athlete and wants to play in college? Ensure they have enough credits to meet NCAA. <u>NCAA Eligibility Rules & Academic Requirements (ncsasports.org)</u> 	 If you have access to PowerSchool and the Graduation Progress tab, ensure the student is on track to graduate by meeting credit requirements. If a student has F grades, work with them to see how they can improve those grades. It is best if they can re-take the class to get a letter grade, this can be done with Utah Online? https://utahonline.org/ Does the student want/need to complete packets? Work out a plan with them on how to accomplish this as soon as possible. Create a tutoring plan with the student, there are many options. Along with the student, check in with their school counselor to ensure that everything has been discussed with the student to ensure they graduate.
