Senior Checklist Guide

1st quarter check-in

Prep work - if you can prepare before you meet with a senior do so. If you are unable to do so, please have a laptop or desktop next to you so you can review the following information while they are with you.

Grades/Class Credits	
If student is doing well	If student is not doing well
 If you have access to Powerschool and to the Graduation Progress tab, make sure the student is on track to graduate by meeting credit requirements. If a student is doing well in their classes encourage more challenging classes, such as CE or AP. Assist the student with connecting with the CTE advisor in the school. Is the student an athlete and wants to play in college. Ensure they have enough credits to meet NCAA. <u>NCAA Eligibility Rules & Academic Requirements (ncsasports.org)</u> 	 If you have access to PowerSchool and to the Graduation Progress tab, make sure the student is on track to graduate by meeting credit requirements. If a student has F grades, work with them to see how they can improve those grades. It is best if they can re-take the class to get a letter grade, this can be done with Utah Online? <u>https://utahonline.org/</u> Does student want/need to complete packets? Work out a plan with them on how to accomplish this as soon as possible. Create a tutoring plan with the student, there are many options. Along with the student, check in with their school counselor to ensure that everything has been discussed with the student to ensure they graduate.

 If their GPA is above a 3.0, encourage them to increase it a little every quarter. Although students GPA is in a good place, talk to them on how they can improve their GPA. This can include tutoring. Does the student have an IEP/LEP, what resources can help them? Connect with the 504 coordinator or Special Ed tech. Learn what type of learner they are. What subject(s) is the student struggling with, do they need tutoring? Tutoring that the high school can assist with Tutoring offered by GEAR UP UVU online tutoring

 If a student has less than 10 absences per school year, they are in good shape. Encourage them to continue with attending their classes and being on time. 	 If student has 10 or more absence, explain the impact this can have on their graduation based on the school attendance policy. Along with the student, check in with the school attendance secretary to review their absences and see how the student can make up their attendance.

Follow Up – as you are speaking with the student write down what the student is how and what the student is going to do to graduate and enroll into college. Make a copy for the student, enter information into tracker, and email the parent on what was discussed.
