





“Jazz Masterclass and Quartet Performance”



Students take classes at Birzeit University, a Palestinian university in the West Bank, and Netanya Academic College, an Israeli college near Tel Aviv. The objective for this study abroad is to teach students to listen to those involved in the conflict and to think about peaceful means to conflict resolution.

Global Spotlight is a unique program at Utah Valley University and is housed in the Office for Global Engagement. The most recent agreements have been established in Madrid, Spain; Salamanca, Spain; Porto, Portugal; and Turku, Finland.

2016-2017 HIGHLIGHTS

SALAMANCA, SPAIN

We signed our first agreement with a prestigious academic institution in Salamanca, Spain. UVU, USU, and DSU elementary and secondary education students will be able to conduct their student teaching at the Calasanz School. This partnership has been created by the UVU Office for Global Engagement between the three Colleges of Education in the State of Utah and the Calasanz School in Salamanca, Spain.



PORTO, PORTUGAL

UVU representatives held high-level meetings with CLIP (Colegio Luso International do Porto) and the College of Education at the University of Porto in Portugal. It is a wonderful collaboration between these Portuguese academic institutions, UVU, USU, and DSU. Utah's prospective educators will now be able to conduct their student teaching and professional development at these sites.



TURKU, FINLAND

UVU is building a wonderful partnership with Finland, an international leader in education. The delegation from UVU's School of Education met with representatives from the Faculty of Education at Turku University to establish teacher development opportunities.



UVU GLOBAL ADVISORY BOARD








INTERNATIONAL INTERNSHIPS

An internship can be defined as a learning experience involving the application of classroom knowledge to a real-world environment. Internships involve the use of structure learning objectives designed to help students learn more about potential career paths and to gain job-related skills in a practical setting. Students may be eligible for academic credit if the internship meets the credit criteria set forth by specific colleges and/or departments. At UVU, some departments require internships for graduation and some do not. Internships may be paid or unpaid. While internships are usually temporary positions, typically lasting a semester, it is not uncommon for students who perform well to have their internship develop into regular employment positions!


TOTAL NUMBER BY GRADE

PERCENT BY GENDER



G/I Faculty Workshops:


