you a clear path to graduation?







There is nothing that my advisor could have done differently! When I switched my major to Integrated Studies my advisor was EXTREMELY welcoming and helpful!



One in particular was completely nonsensical and bordered on the line of religious indoctrination. I think for future IS students, the IS classes should reflect some of the more common combinations, or if they don't, then that space should be used for more intensive study in their disciplines.

I think three is a little excessive for these if they don't line up with minors in any way. But the ones I took were wonderful and Scott Abbott was an incredible professor, very skilled at blending many disciplines in his teaching.

I LOVED all of Dr. White's classes. He is very engaging and a great orator. The other topics class I took was Divine in Art. I wish it was more clear on the registration that that particular topics course was Divine in Art. Personally, it was a pretty difficult class that seemed to lack real life application. Unless you were planning to be a future art critic, I didn't understand the relevance? I struggled finding reason for some of the philosophy courses as well. Maybe Education and Psychology, or Computer Science and Morality. Something less totally academic, but more applicable to life as a whole.

I liked learning about interesting philosophical topics and in particular really liked the class about states of consciousness. I appreciated how I thought about subjects in the class in new ways. One thing I would suggest for the program is to have the option more widely known for integrated studies students that they can substitute specific emphasis/future career path courses for an integrated studies course if the integrated studies course special topic doesn't particularly interest them. I did like the classes I took, but I feel that my time could have been better spent focusing on my emphases and integrating them through the class rather than writing papers unrelated to my career path. If the classes more fully encouraged students to include their emphases in the assignments, or use more real life applications, then I think it would be more beneficial.

The available studies were great for diversity and getting out of my comfort zone. However, I would have liked to see some science class options provided.

that we tied the class material to each of our individual areas of focus.


I found the topics to be surprisingly interesting. It pushed me to think in new ways that don't come naturally for me.


I appreciate that the instructors offered courses relevant to their respective fields and interests. It was a unique way to get to know them and learn about something you would never otherwise choose to learn about.



These integrated studies courses helped me see how I could apply my classes to my everyday work life. They have proven to be the most applicable courses I have taken in college.


My project expanded my problem-solving abilities and allowed me to apply my skills in a real-world manner.

The IS topics classes were also excellent. I feel more confident in my ability to do more research in overlapping fields, and not to be limited by boundaries between departments. CS especially has been a good major to transform with integrated studies, because software is usually made for some application, in a specific field where domain knowledge is helpful. The IS department gave me the opportunity to build a project that wouldn't have fit in either the CS or music majors.

I like that most of the content is very self-driven. Because of that, it seems to be a very make or break program that can leave some behind. I don't know that this was necessarily something to improve on, but I think there is something here to look into for student retention.

The courses were boring and didn't apply to anything

I liked the fact that we can choose what two disciplines to enter into, which then reflects our class choices. However, I didn't like most of the IS-topic classes, as they were very bizarre, nonsensical, and didn't give me any information or training that could be applied to my disciplines. I would've much rathered having those IS requirements replaced by other classes in my field of study. While I did enjoy some of them, I don't feel like the actual theme of 'integration' was really explained or taught, resulting in me feeling like a lot of my time was wasted.

I liked meeting lots of students with exciting interests spreading over disciplines and coming at topics from various perspectives. I also really liked how Scott structured his classes to gear towards our separate interests. The program also allowed me to graduate faster which is a huge plus considering I was running out of steam there.

I enjoyed the freedom within the program to create your own educational path. Most majors have a select set of courses you are required to take. With IS, you have more flexibility to avoid, for example, calculus at all costs or some other subject that is of disinterest. I thought it was great!

I love the idea of having so many creative options for how to combine different professional interests and it really opened so many doors for me. I would not have been able to graduate as soon without this program as well. The only thing I disliked was not having the option more readily available to forego taking special topics courses that didn't specifically relate to my emphases, but I addressed that in an earlier section and still enjoyed some things about the classes. I don't think they should be required I think they make more sense as electives in integrated studies because they take up valuable schedule space where I could have been taking classes more applicable to my career. Students who have already had classes in the past where they have developed writing/critical thinking skills shouldn't need to take the special topics classes since writing/critical thinking is the point of them in the first place.

Overall I love the concept as well as the program itself. I got the opportunity to take classes I would have never even thought of due to Integrated Studies. Providing more science classes would be my only suggestion to the program but I was otherwise able to complete all the science material I needed through my minors.
