Biographical Overview

Jeffrey Nielsen is a philosopher educated at Weber State University and Boston College. At Boston College, Jeffrey was a Teaching Fellow where he taught courses in logic and critical thinking, the history and philosophy of art and science as well as in ethics and epistemology. He has also taught in the philosophy department at Brigham Young University, where he taught courses in the ethics of leadership, reasoning and writing, as well as in the history and development of science. He has been an adjunct lecturer in the Gore School of Business at Westminster College, where he designed and taught the MBA course in Ethical Leadership and Corporate Governance. Currently he is a lecturer in the philosophy department at Utah Valley University teaching courses in ethics, moral decision-making, and democracy.

Jeffrey has consulted with organizations around the world on management and leadership issues and assists organizations in developing peer-based managing, strategic decision-making, and ethical problem solving models. Professor Nielsen has traveled internationally training with many of the Fortune 500 companies. He authored the book *The Myth of Leadership: Creating Leaderless Organizations* published by Nicholas Brealey Publishing, which offers a new paradigm in peer-based management and council-based leadership.

Review of Work Done in Association with the Center for the Study of Ethics at Utah Valley University

With support from the Center for the Study of Ethics, in 2008 Jeffrey started the nonprofit Democracy House Project. The Democracy House Project was an educational initiative to teach political literacy in communities, adult education programs, and schools. The Democracy House Projects also assisted local governments in organizing and training citizen councils to serve as audit and advisory bodies on public policy issues.

With continued support from the Center for the Study of Ethics, Jeffrey organized the Utah Institute for Public Deliberation in association with the Kettering Foundation of Dayton, Ohio. The institute is part of the network of such centers, which convene public forums for the National Issues Forum. Jeffrey has also been a faculty member with Kettering training new centers in the art of public deliberation.

More recently the Center for the Study of Ethics invited Jeffrey to become a project coordinator for the Appomattox Project. The Appomattox Project is a project designed to cultivate political literacy and encourage civil and respectful engagement in our public square through a variety of educational programs. Jeffrey's responsibilities will include training UVU students and community members in the skill of convening and moderating public forums.

Jeffrey has also helped organize the Conference by the Faculty hosted by the Center for the Study of Ethics in 2010 and 2011, assisting as well in editing the journal.

In 2017-2019 Jeffrey helped organize and convene Ethics Awareness Week—a preeminent program of the Center for the Study of Ethics.

Jeffrey is also currently the faculty liaison for the Center for the Study of Ethics.

Professor Nielsen has also coached the Utah Valley University Ethics Bowl team and has taken the team to nationals in 2010, 2013, and 2017. He also organizes and directs the Utah High School Ethics Bowl.
