Projects:

You will be expected to complete 4 projects of some significance over the duration of this course. Each project will be evaluated on the following: **A.** technical skill (craftsmanship) **B.** design quality **C.** content, how closely it matches the theme or topic assigned **D.** follows parameters of the assignment. Each project will be presented to the class for a group critique. Your project must be completed and ready to display on the scheduled critique day. Incomplete or unrealized work will result in a grade loss for that project. In the past we have done the projects listed below, but they are subject to and will most likely change.

- 1. *Spirit Animal from Reclaimed Materials:* You will sculpt a 3D creature of your choosing as inspired by our visiting artist Geoffrey Gorman. A variety of materials will be discussed but the final selection of materials will be of your choosing.
- 2. *Alien Plant Form:* We will focus on the construction of a stable armature as well as the manipulation of paper in unusual ways to create a large scale, durable sculpture.
- 3. *Installation in Miniature:* Out of primarily paper or cardboard you will create a miniature environment to be installed in one of the 2 kiosk galleries. The work you install should have a minimal effect on the gallery and when it is removed the space needs to be restored to the original condition for the next artist to use. The piece will need to be documented photographically and possibly in video.
- 4. *Conceptual Self Portrait Doll:* After researching the roll of dolls in societies throughout time, we will look into a variety of materials and process that you can use to construct an artistic doll of your own. Scale will be decided upon through a class discussion.

Sketchbook & Critiques:

You will be expected to keep a sketchbook/notebook. The sketchbook is a tool for you to take notes in, keep track of research and to work out your preliminary ideas for projects. I will check your sketchbooks throughout the semester and at the end of the term to grade it. Bring your sketchbook to each class.

You will be expected to do 4 critiques of a sculpture in a public location or in a gallery/ museum in your sketchbook. After, or while, viewing the work for a sustained time of 5-10 minutes you will sketch the piece and then do a short 2-3 paragraph written critique in your sketchbook. You will find this to be more difficult than you think so select a work that you really find compelling. These are to be 4 separate visits during the semester. Due dates will be given in Canvas.

Discussion Participation:

For 8 weeks there will be assigned an Art 21 program to watch or directed readings assigned. You will be expected to come to class with 2 take away concepts or insights and 2 questions to ask the class from the assigned reading or video. Insights and questions will be submitted on canvas the day prior to the class discussion.

Attendance & Participation:

Attendance and participation in class is required. Most of the instruction in this course will take place on a one-to-one basis as you are working on your projects. If you are not in class, I cannot give you instruction or feedback. Due to the few meeting times we have no unexcused absence will be accepted (2 <u>unexcused absences</u> = 1 full grade drop). Being tardy and leaving class early will also affect your grade so come to class on time and prepared. It is important to note here that a significant part of shop

safety is cleaning up after yourself. Shop clean-up will also be reflected in your participation grade. If there is anything that may interrupt your ability to attend class please inform me of the matter so we can work something out. If you will miss more than 2 week of class contact the Accessibilities office and work with them to see what accommodations can be made. If you communicate with me I will do what I can to assist you in your situation.

Late Work Policy:

I do accept late work, my general rule is that work is marked down 10% form the grade it would have received if it were submitted on time each week it is late. Please speak to me about any circumstances that would cause you to have late work and I will work with you. It is always best to be on time but I do understand that things may happen that prevent this.

- Brainstorming and refining your ideas;
- Fine tuning your research questions;
- Finding information on your topic;
- Drafting an outline to organize your thoughts; and
- Checking grammar and style.

If you can figure out how to use AI to sculpt your work for you I would be impressed. But it would defeat the purpose of taking the class.
