#### General Description of the Subject Matter of Each Lecture or Discussion

Weeks 2-3 will be about the development of Virtue Ethics. Weeks 4-5 will be about the development of Deontology. Weeks 5-6 will be about the development of Utilitarianism. Weeks 8-9 will apply the three main families of ethical theories to the American Chemical Society Code of Conduct. Week 11 will be about the ethics of climate engineering. Weeks 12 will be about the ethics of psychotropics research. Week 13 will be about the ethics of synthetic biology. Week 14 will be about the ethics of DNA patents. Week 15 will be a critical race theory analysis of past racism in chemistry hiring and academia.
