### **Course Description**

This is the second of a series of two laboratory courses to accompany CHEM 2310 and 2320, intended for students majoring in science and those interested in careers in medicine, dentistry, veterinary science, pharmacy, etc. This course introduces safety in organic chemistry lab and organic chemical waste disposal. It expands on the organic synthesis techniques used in CHEM 2315.
