Course Description

This course is designed to introduce the essential aspects of dance production. Emphasis will be placed on the theory and practice of production management and lighting design for dance. Additional coursework includes consideration of costuming, set design, sound design, backstage organization, make-up for dance, promotion, and programming. Methods of delivery include lecture, lab experience, and creative application.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion, students should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of production techniques, equipment, and procedures involved in producing and directing a dance concert.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of jobs within the theater.
- 3. Create a lighting design for dance.
- 4. Create a costume design for dance/scenic design.
- 5. Create a publicity campaign for a dance production.
- 6. Develop and create a production budget.
- 7. Edit and create a sound score.

These objectives will be met through a variety of readings, lectures, class discussions, writing assignments, projects, quizzes, and hands-on design and production experience.

Course Requirements

Course Assignments, Assessments, and Grading Policy

Lighting Journal: One Lighting entry due in written journal weekly - Journal will include all Reading Responses*

This is an informal record of the student's observations of light in the natural world with emphasis on the aesthetic quality of the experience as well as an exploration of the physical reality that causes the lighting moment to be. Each entry should be approximately ½ to 1 page, though some events may inspire longer entries, and the student should feel free to write as much as they like. The student must record one experience and thoughtfully reflect upon it per week for full credit and be prepared to discuss it in class. More detailed instructions will be included in the assignment. This journal will also be used to write about your lab/crew experiences. Specific instructions will be posted or announced in class each week.

Reading Responses are intended for students to take notes while reading each chapter. They are also intended to have talking points and/or questions for in-class discussions and to keep students on track for all assigned readings. *See Course Calendar in Canvas for assigned reading schedule and when Reading Responses are expected to be in your Lighting Journal.*

Critique: This will be a critical analysis of the Lighting Design of a current stage production. More information will be given out later.

Quizzes: There will be up to 2 quizzes throughout the semester that may be unannounced and designed to access the student's comprehension of the lectures and reading assignments, as well as to encourage the student to keep up with his/her assignments.

Lab/Crew Assignments: Each student is expected to work 15 hours outside of class to experience the work that goes into a show. The students are to sign up for shows held at UVU and will help as needed. Lab hours will cover helping backstage, observing lighting designers/choreographers setting lights, helping with costumes in the costume shop or during shows, etc. The student will keep a time log and track the experience in his/her lighting journal.

Senior Capstone Lighting Design Project: The student will design a concert and design all aspects to support the specific idea.

EXAMS: There will be two exams during the semester. The final will consist of a presentation and will take place in person alongside final presentations. TBD.
