- Seven Exams will be taken on Canvas and will assess skeletal and muscular anatomy, movement
 and exercise application, injury prevention, corrective measures, and mechanics will all be
 tested. They will be identification, fill-in-the-blank, multiple choice, matching, and short
 answer.

Labs: 10%.

- Students will be given written lab assignments for each exam. Labs are assigned to deepen understanding and assist in your study. Labs are designed to guide your research but are only one of the tools to be used and not the only source of the material you should study. (In other words, the exams may not include additional information in the labs. In addition, you may need different study methods depending on your personal needs and learning styles (i.e., note cards, coloring books, study groups, etc. We all learn differently.
- Submit labs on canvas on the day of exams; **they must be handwritten**. You will need to scan and upload the lab. Photos will be accepted. Try to consolidate the number of files.

Project: 10%

• You will choose to research a topic that focuses on personal interest and design a project to show improvement. It will include research, analysis, video, prescription, practice, and results from over six weeks. You will present your findings to the class at the end of the semester. This project is self-directed, and you will participate in the assessment. You may work with a partner or groups who are interested in the same research topic.

Participation: 5%

- Participation is based on a consistent, professional approach to class. This class is designed to help you learn the material by memorizing, doing, discovering, and applying this information to the practical practice and application of dance. Therefore, you must be here to ask questions, observe, be curious, hypothesize, and learn.
- Reading is essential in this class. There is no time to cover everything from the text in class. Consistent study is required to succeed in this course. Learning information is vital. It is your opportunity to read and learn as much as you can. The instructor is a facilitator and not responsible for giving you all the information. You are responsible for knowing the information. This means taking notes as you read. You are expected to come to class prepared

to discuss and go deeper into the material. Your learning comes from reading and studying. "A" students stay current on reading assignments and studying. You are responsible for getting any material you miss when absent before you return to class.

- Students will be expected to attend and participate physically and orally in class. I am not responsible for repeating discussions, lectures, activities, or other material you missed.
- Be initiative-taking; ask thoughtful questions about class material before, during, and after class.
- Consistently demonstrate a *professional approach* to class be prompt, respectful, attentive, ready, open, ask respectful questions, and stay awake!
- You are welcome to bring your lunch to class.
- Your responsibility as a student is to communicate with me about your progress and status in the
 course. If you need help, let me know. Teach each other, be curious, and dig deeper into the
 subject.
- Late assignments will be accepted (I understand rehearsals, work and life happens) **however**, I will lower the grade by 10% for each weekday the work is late.

- Completing group work that your group has assigned to you, unless it is mutually agreed upon that you may utilize the tool.
- Writing a draft of a writing assignment.
- Writing entire sentences, paragraphs or papers to complete class assignments.

You are responsible for the information you submit based on an AI query (for instance, that it does not violate intellectual property laws, or contain misinformation or unethical content). Your use of AI tools must be properly documented and cited in order to stay within university policies on academic honesty.

Any student work submitted using AI tools should clearly indicate what work is the student's work and what part is generated by the AI. In such cases, no more than 25% of the student work should be generated by AI. If any part of this is confusing or uncertain, please reach out to me for a conversation before submitting your work.
