Course Description

Examines financial management in the business environment; time value of money; fundamentals of security valuation; the capital asset pricing model and capital budgeting. Introduces finance terminology and quantitative techniques used in financial analysis. Covers financial ratios and financial statement analysis, cost of capital, working capital policies, dividend policy, and a brief overview of international finance. Lab access fee of \$13 for computers applies. Canvas Course Mats \$85/Cengage applies.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Apply the basic terminology of finance;
- 2. Evaluate financial performance, and compare performance to appropriate benchmarks; 3. Evaluate financial decisions using time value of money;
- 4. Describe characteristics of debt and equity securities;
- 5. Analyze debt and equity securities using time value of money principles;
- 6. Compute the required return appropriate for an investment using the capital asset pricing model;
- 7. Analyze the basics of capital budgeting;
- 8. Calculate the weighted average cost of capital for a firm or proposed project.

Course Materials and Texts

The text will be *Fundamentals of Financial Management*, *Concise* 11th Edition, by Brigham and Houston, published by Cengage Learning

A printed textbook is not required for this course. The class will use an electronic text and electronic course content that will be accessed through Canvas. This electronic content will be available the first day of class for all enrolled students. A charge (approximately \$85) will be assessed for all students in the course who are still enrolled during the third week of class. This charge will be listed as a "Bookstore Charge" and will be paid through a process similar to that used for tuition/fees.

Although no printed text is required – for those who wish to have a loose leaf copy of the text it will be available through the Bookstore for a cost of about \$45 range. For those who choose to get a hard copy of the text they will have to visit the Bookstore and ask for it specifically because it will not be on the shelves with the regular text.

Microsoft Excel or a financial (TVM) calculator is required for this course. <u>Texas Instruments BA II Plus is recommended</u> (But if you have another TVM calculator you can use it).

<u>Chapter Assignments</u>: There will be 11 homework assignments worth 10 points each. There will be one due each week (except Exam weeks). The lowest score will be dropped.

<u>Chapter Quizzes</u>: There will be 11 quizzes each worth 10 points. The lowest individual quiz score will be dropped. Students must complete these quizzes on their own without the help of textbook, internet, AI or other people. Students can use their written notes.

<u>In Class Team Quizzes</u>: There will be 11 team quizzes taken in class, each worth 5 points. The lowest 2 team quiz scores will be dropped. Teams will complete these quizzes without the help of textbook, internet, or AI. Students can use their written notes.

<u>In Class Team Assignments</u>: There will be 10 in class team assignments, each worth 5 points. The lowest 2 in class team assignment scores will be dropped. Students must complete these team assignments without the use of AI.

<u>Case Studies</u>: Each student is asked to complete three case studies worth 30 points each. The three case studies will cover Financial Ratio Analysis, Time Value of Money, and Capital Budgeting. Must be completed without the use of AI.

<u>Exams</u>: There will be three exams during the course; two midterms and a final. Each will be worth 150 points. The final exam is not cumulative. Students must complete these exams on their own without the help of textbook, internet, AI or other people. Students can use a 3 x 5 card with handwritten notes (front and back).
