Examines risk management and insurance planning for individual clients as well as employers of small corporations. Teaches the development of risk management and insurance plans with economic and behavioral theory. Uses a case study approach to apply and integrate the material. Emphasizes evaluation of financial alternatives. Provides learning activities that facilitate growth and development in written and oral communication skills.

Assignments

Homework/Activities/Quizzes: You are required to read all of the material. In order to insure you are keeping up with the reading, you will have homework on Canvas in the form of quizzes. There will also be discussion activities and will be located in Canvas or the OneNote Notebook for our class. Thee discussions and activities will consist of application problems, multiple choice questions, and short answer questions. Your lowest two grades for this category will be dropped at the end of the semester.

Professional Activities: Students will need to attend out-of-class professional events or participate in activities over the course of the semester. These events are listed in the assignment in Canvas. Students will prepare a o summary of each event attended for credit explaining what they learned and how it influenced your perspective of profession. You will submit your summaries to Canvas in ONE document with a heading (include: the name of the event, the date of the event, and the number of points).

Review Activities: You will have review activities based on the material. These review activities will briefly review the material covered previously in readings and videos. The review activities assignments will be on Canvas. Your lowest two grades for this category will be dropped at the end of the semester.

Assessments

Case Study Project: You will find a real individual or family for which you will perform a risk management analysis and prepare a written executive summary with your recommendations. You will then provide a short presentation on your results. All case studies must be submitted electronically on the day it is due. A grading rubric will be posted for executive summary and presentation.

Exams: All exams are mandatory. Exams will be a combination of multiple choice, T/F, and calculation or short answer questions. All exams will be given electronically with a proctoring software. You should plan ahead to have a quiet environment with steady internet access. Make-up exams are not guaranteed.

Risk Management Process and Characteristics of Insurance

Categories of risk, risk management process, causes of financial loss, requisites for insurable
risk, law of insurance contracts, legal principles of insurance contracts, unique legal
characteristics of insurance contracts, law of agency, characteristics of insurance companies,
provisions and features of insurance contracts, underwriting and managing adverse selection,
valuing property for losses, regulating the insurance industry, selecting an insurance company.

Property and Liability Insurance

Risk management principles and personal property and liability insurance, homeowners
insurance, auto insurance, legal liability, personal liability insurance, business and professional
property and liability insurance.

Health Insurance

• Deductibles, coinsurance and out of pocket maximum, the Affordable Care Act, group health insurance, individual health insurance, types of group and individual plans, health savings accounts, health insurance policy provisions, taxation and health insurance, COBRA insurance, planning for health care costs in retirement.

Life Insurance

 Parties to a life insurance contract, life insurance underwriting, life insurance and mortality risk, types and uses of life insurance in financial planning, life insurance contract provisions and common policy provisions, settlement options for life insurance, life insurance policy replacements, taxation of life insurance benefits.

Business Use Insurance

• Life insurance and buy-sell agreements, other business uses of life insurance.

Disability Insurance

 Characteristics of disability insurance, group disability insurance, taxation of disability insurance benefits, disability insurance – employee benefit analysis, creating a plan for disability income needs.

Social Security

• Social security taxes and contributions, eligibility and calculation of benefits, taxation of benefits, other benefits, Medicare benefits including traditional Medicare.

Long-Term Care (LTC) Insurance

• Need for LTC insurance, LTC insurance overview, alternatives to LTC.

Annuities

• Characteristics of annuities, annuity benefit options, types of annuity contracts, advantages and disadvantages, taxation of annuities, uses and applications.
