Course Description

Interdisciplinary course in human sexuality, exploring topics in biology, health, psychology, and sociology. Introduces basic concepts of human sexuality, including anatomy, reproduction, and sexual response across the life-cycle. Studies gender roles, sexual orientation, dysfunction, and sexually transmitted disease. Examines sexual behavior from the perspective of ethics, religion, the law, and education. Students assess their sexual attitudes and should be able to make responsible sexuality decisions.

Discussions

Discussions are opportunities to explore and learn about topics together. Posts to the discussion board should add significantly to the conversation and support your point of view. <u>Comments that do not add significantly to a discussion will receive no credit.</u> It is okay to disagree in a discussion and do so in a respectful manner. When we open our minds and learn from others' perspectives, deep learning happens, even if we don't agree. That being said, we must still be respectful and keep our online classroom a safe place to learn.

Discussion board posts and follow-up comments (usually at least two) are due by Sunday each week. After you've made your original post, please check in a few times during the week so that you can respond appropriately to comments and others' posts. When responding to others' posts, please ensure your comments are meaningful, substantial, and contribute to the post in a thoughtful way. Unsubstantial responses (one sentence) will be deducted points. Posting responses such as "I agree", "Great post!", or "I wrote a similar thing to you. Great minds think alike!" will not receive much credit.

Assessments

There is one quiz per lesson. All quizzes have 10 questions students have 30 minutes to take each quiz. The final exam will be held during finals week. <u>All quizzes and the final exam will be taken on Canvas.</u>
