# Course Description

Studies the media and compositional elements of the various art forms (literature, music, visual arts, theater, film, dance, and architecture), for greater understanding and enjoyment. Teaches how to interpret artistic meaning by analyzing artworks formally as well as in their historical contexts, such as the predominant subject matters and styles of their period. Encourages students to integrate the arts into their daily lives habitually, so that they become lifelong learners and educators.

## **Consistent Attendance and Participation:**

You are required to attend the in-class sessions and participate in activities both during the sessions and online. Weak attendance affects a student's performance in all areas of evaluation. To help the instructor monitor both attendance and participation, you will be asked to submit a weekly summary by the end of the day on Saturday of each week. While the instructor will not be able to comment on all these submissions, this material will give them a basis on which to grade participation. It will also give instructors opportunity to receive and give feedback.

# **Consistent Preparation and Engagement:**

Your reading, hearing, and watching assigned materials is to be demonstrated by in-class engagement. Unless otherwise noted, all reading and audiovisual materials can be found on Canvas. For a 3-credit class like ours, the average preparation and activity time expected of students is at least seven hours per week.

# **Completing Assignments:**

All assignments can be found, in chronological order, in the calendar, in the <u>Syllabus Course Summary</u> and in the <u>Course Schedule</u>. They can be reviewed grouped by category under "<u>Assignments</u>." The Syllabus, Course Units, Discussion, and Assignments tabs can be found quickly on the home page, as well as in the navigation menu on the left hand side of the Canvas Course Site. Quizzes and discussions are additionally listed separately, both on the home page and under their respective tabs in the left menu.

In addition to a steady sequence of preparatory exercises, there are two major types of assignments to complete:

- 1. Three multiple-choice review exams, each covering the material since the last exam.
- 2. One <u>final essay</u>, minimum 1000 words and double-spaced, interpreting an artwork, text, or performance in a scholarly format. You will be able to choose your subject from one of the arts disciplines covered in class. The final paper is preceded by an <u>outline</u> <u>assignment</u>, which has to be completed first.

### **Communication Outside the Classroom:**

The best way to reach your instructor outside the classroom is through the Canvas Inbox. Students are responsible for being reachable through Canvas as well. Please make sure to check the e-mail account linked to your UVU student account on a regular basis.

## **Late Assignments:**

The due date is the cut-off date for all assignments and exams. However, you may submit late assignments up to three days after the due date, but your score will be deducted by 10% for each day that it is late. After the three-day window, you will not be able to submit late work. Please note: all quizzes and exam must be submitted on the due date posted. Late quizzes and exams will not be accepted.

If there are extenuating circumstances, please email or talk directly to the instructor. The outline assignment and final paper will be docked 10% for each day they are late. Please note that Canvas closes for student submissions on the Friday of exam week at midnight.

#### **Absences:**

Attendance is an important part of this class. The instructor will be taking roll each class period. Each class period is worth 1 point. If you are either more than 15 minutes late or leave more than 15 minutes early, you will be counted as absent (<u>The instructor will be strict about this!</u>). You are permitted three (3) unexcused absences without a penalty during the semester and two (2) sick days. The instructor will not excuse additional absences except for military duty, UVU-sponsored events, and medical issues (<u>signed doctor's note required</u>). If there are extenuating circumstances, please communicate with the instructor in advance. 36 points (1 point per class period x 36 class periods = 36).

If you have perfect attendance (attend all 41 class periods for full time), you will receive an additional 15 extra credit points (36 required class periods + 5 additional class periods + 10 extra credit points for perfect attendance = 51 points).

## **Special Circumstances:**

If insurmountable obstacles arise in the course of the semester that prevent you from attending sessions or submitting your work, please let your instructor know as soon as possible. Please do not wait until the end of the semester to negotiate any special allowance to be made for absences or late work. Reasons to make special allowance include jury duty, military duty or critical, prolonged, documented illness. Accommodation will take the form of a plan to make up for missed attendance and/or work.

#### Generative AI

The use of generative AI tools (e.g. ChatGPT, Google Bard, etc.) is permitted in this course for the following activities:

- Brainstorming and refining your ideas.
- Fine tuning your research questions.
- Finding information on your topic.
- Drafting an outline to organize your thoughts; and
- Checking grammar and style.

The use of generative AI tools is not permitted in this course for the following activities:

- Impersonating you in classroom contexts, such as by using the tool to compose discussion board prompts/responses assigned to you or content that you put into a Teams/Canvas chat.
- Completing group work that your group has assigned to you, unless it is mutually agreed upon that you may utilize the tool.
- Writing a draft of a writing assignment.
- Writing entire sentences, paragraphs or papers to complete class assignments.

You are responsible for the information you submit based on an AI query (for instance, that it does not violate intellectual property laws, or contain misinformation or unethical content). Your use of AI tools must be properly documented and cited in order to stay within university policies on academic honesty.

Any student work submitted using AI tools should clearly indicate what work the student's work is and what part is generated by the AI. In such cases, no more than 25% of the student work should be generated by AI. If any part of this is confusing or uncertain, please reach out to me for a conversation before submitting your work.
