Course Title: Ethics and Values Credits: 3

Course Description

Challenges students to explore and clarify their values; critically read works of philosophy, literature, religion, and history toward understanding the basis of their ethical views; and read, study, research, discuss, and write about difficult ethical issues. Focuses on issues of good vs. evil, justice vs. injustice, equality vs. inequality, and the necessity of defining and examining happiness and values. Engages students in serious reflection on issues of ethics and values as they relate to the students' own lives.

How this course works

This course is made up of 8 modules. Each of these units will take you about 2 weeks to complete. Each module is made up of a short explanation by your professors, an introductory video, summaries of the readings, the reading text, discussions, quizzes, and a writing assignments. You will watch the explanations and videos, read the summaries and text, participate in a group discussion, and complete the module writing assignment.

You will be assigned to a discussion group. In the discussion group, you will debate the question posed in the discussion. In this course, there may be topics of discussion for which you will have strong opinions. Please remember to express your opinions with courtesy to your fellow students. Also remember to reply with courtesy to your students. Disrespectful comments will not be tolerated. Remember, it is ok to disagree, but it is not ok to be belligerent.

Each module will be open for two weeks. In order to unlock the next module, you must complete all work for the current module. Please be aware of the schedule so you may stay on track. Finally, you will complete the comprehensive Final Exam. The Final Exam is made up of four comparative essay questions. There is no study guide for the exam. You must take the exam before the

last day of class, but once you open the exam you will have two hours to complete all the questions. In order to help you be successful, each module contains an overview page which explains the objectives for each topic. Please review the objectives for each topic, for they will help you focus on the important concepts in the each module. You will also be assessed on the your ability to meet the objectives at the end of each module.

All assignments are to be completed and submitted online through Canvas

Late Work:

Late work will be accepted but with penalties. It is strongly encouraged you do all of your work on time as the penalties can seriously effect your final grade.

- 1) Quizzes may be submitted up to one week after the due date, but will be penalized by one point out of the five possible points. After one week, the penalty will increase by one point each additional week. After four weeks, submissions for quizzes will be closed.
- 2) Writing assignments may be submitted up to one week after the due date, but will be penalized two points out of the twenty possible points. After one week, the penalty will increase by two points each additional week. After six weeks, submissions for writing assignments will be closed.
- 3) Group discussions will remain open two weeks after each due date, after which time each discussion will close permanently. There are no exceptions to this so be sure to participate in your group discussions in a timely fashion.

Generative AI

Therefore, at this time, online learning support platforms (like ChatGPT or Google Bard) may not be used for course assignments in our department except as explicitly authorized by the instructor. Any assignment or content composed by any resource other than the student (whether human or digital) must be attributed to the source through proper citation. Unacknowledged use of online learning support platforms is a form of scholastic dishonesty and will be treated as such.
