## Course Description

Explains the logic of the classical true experiment and how it permits causal inferences. Compares and contrasts the benefits and drawbacks of quasi-experimental and correlational research designs. Includes the design of an empirical psychological study. Covers compliance with guidelines for ethical research as codified in law and the American Psychological Association's ethics code. Requires collection, analysis, and presentation of quantitative data for an empirical psychological study. Includes a lab.

### Team Functioning Activities (2%)

There will be two short teamwork-related surveys throughout the semester. These activities are to check-in about team functioning. The purpose of these assignments is to help you meet the course objective of working with peers to design an empirical study. It will help you assess how your team is working together and provide me with information about how to support you.

### Research Paper (25%)

There is one final research paper during the last week of the semester. This research paper will be the final product of a semester's worth of work of designing, running, and analyzing the data from a group research project. Lab assignments throughout the semester will guide you through the process of writing your research paper.

## Poster Presentation (15%)

In addition to a research paper, your group will be designing and presenting a poster about your research project. This is intended to be a creative and celebratory way to share your findings with the class.

After you have added an appropriate AI disclosure statement (or if we have determined that it was an error) then I will update your assignment grade.
