Click here to enter text. <u>Attendance and participation</u>: Students are expected to attend class regularly and actively participate in class discussions. No grades will be assigned only for attending to class, but for participating and demonstrating acquaintance with the text or texts assigned for each session. Before coming to class, be sure you have read the required materials and answered the corresponding exercises. You are encouraged to come to class with your comments and ideas regarding the materials assigned.

Late arrival, lack of preparation, failure to bring your textbooks to class and absences will lower your class participation points (10% of the final grade)

Exams: Your Unit Exams will be based on the content of the chapters of Texto y Vida (35% of the final grade)

Homework: Short essays related to the topics discussed in class (10% of the final grade)

<u>Discussions</u>: You will have several discussions (on CANVAS) during the semester related to the material already assigned and scheduled in your syllabus. For that reason, you need to read the material the day before to get ready for the discussion (10% of the final grade)

The Final is the Discussion # 6 in the classroom (10% of the final grade)

<u>Debate</u>: For 15-20 minutes your group will present any topic covered in class such as religion, honor, women's role and so on. You will explain and defend your position to the rest of the class. After the presentation, the class will ask questions regarding your topic. Your presentation will be graded on how well you supported and defended your points and prepared your presentation (15% of the final grade)

<u>Composition</u>: You will write, in the classroom, a two-page essay on one of the subjects studied during the semester. Research on written documents such as books or journal articles is encouraged. Remember that Organization and Grammar play a crucial role in any academic essay. The composition needs: Introduction-Thesis-Body-Conclusion. You can bring a 5x7 inch flashcard with two academic quotations, two literary quotations and your thesis (10% of the final grade)

Generative AI

Just keep in mind that it is **not appropriate** to have an AI tool produce work that you submit as your own.
