Places emphasis on text analysis and effective communication with actors to achieve honest and believable performances in the intimate style of camera acting, as well as the highly physical acting style of the stage. Includes studies in script structure, visualization, movement, pace and rhythm, gesture and rehearsal techniques.

### Course Requirements

#### Course Assignments, Assessments, and Grading Policy

1) Quizzes: There will be 10 quizzes throughout the semester, on topics ranging from readings, plays, and lectures/discussions in class. Quizzes will always be due BEFORE CLASS STARTS on the due date. Quizzes will be available on Canvas.

10 guizzes @ 10 points each – 100 possible points (10% of overall grade)

2) Assignments: There will be 10 assignments throughout the semester, contextually dependent on what we are working on at the time in class. The first assignment, for example, is a critique of a play. As we move through the process of the director, topics including text preparation, director concept, auditions, and other aspects of directing, the assignments and requirements will reflect accordingly. All assignments will have details and expectations on Canvas in their respective assignment page, and will be discussed in class ahead of their due dates. Points will vary according to requirements per each assignment and range from 50-100 points.

10 assignments w/varying point value - 590 possible points (59% of overall grade)

3) Discussions: There will be eight online Canvas discussions throughout the semester. These will normally require an initial post due on a Tuesday, with response to peers due by the Friday of that week. The discussions are designed to help prompt deeper engagement with course material, and will be graded based on depth of response (i.e. surface level posts will lose points).

7 discussions @ 30 points each - 210 possible points (21% of overall grade)

3) Attendance and Participation: See 'Attendance Policy' below for details about how your attendance can impact your score. In addition to the attendance policy, high levels of involvement in all areas of the course, including active participation and engagement in discussions, professional engagement during in-class workshops and activities, and a constructive attitude throughout each class period is expected. ### **Generative AI**

#### **Plagiarism**

- Paraphrase (put into your own words) another author's wording in a manner where the language and/or syntax is too similar to the original passage and is not properly cited
- Fail to clearly acknowledge the partial or full authorship of someone else when submitting work
- Fail to cite or quote textual resources properly, despite the instructor's attempts at educational intervention
- Fabricate false information that is not corroborated by the actual research used on a writing project
- Have someone else, paid or otherwise, write your paper or use a paper mill site that contains ready-to-use papers written by other people
- Generate and submit a paper using artificial intelligence, such at ChatGPT
