

ta is the second most engaged state, with 45.1% of volunteers. Oregon, Alaska, and Iowa are also in the top five. Florida has the fewest volunteers, with just 22.8% of residents volunteering.

Scholarship committees are often interested in investing in students who are committed to making the world a better place. After asking applicants to share their personal narrative, applications often ask a question like "Talk about your most meaningful volunteer experience and why it was meaningful to you." ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Going forward we would like to highlight our TRIO Educational Talent Search Alumni that have participated in the program at Utah Valley University. While we are building and connecting to our Educational Talent Search Alumni, we would like to share this article on a former TRIO Upward Bound alum who participated in the first year of the program at Utah Valley University.



Angela Clark Young's experience in the Upward Bound program during her senior year of high school (1993-94) laid the foundation for her success in higher education. Although her time in the program was brief, it was profoundly impactful. Through weekly meetings and assessments, Angela discovered how her personality aligned with different careers and used this knowledge to create a personalized educational plan. She gained clarity on her academic path, selecting a college major and identifying the degrees needed to pursue her goals. With the support of her advisor, Angela navigated the often-overwhelming college application process, meeting critical deadlines for the ACT, college applications, scholarships, and FAFSA. Her advisor provided check-lists, reminders, and encouragement, ensuring she secured acceptance to Snow College along with a combination of scholarships, a Pell Grant, and work-study opportunities that made college financially accessible.


A highlight of the program for Angela was the six-week Upward Bound summer camp at Utah Valley State College (now UVU). During the camp, she took college courses, lived in an apartment with peers, and experienced a taste of college life. She learned essential skills such as navigating

campus, following course outlines, studying for exams, and managing stress—experiences that built her confidence and prepared her for the transition to Snow College. Angela went on to earn an associate degree at Snow College in 1996 and a bachelor's degree in Recreation Management with double minors in Human Resources and Mandarin Chinese from Utah State University. She attributes much of her academic and personal success to the mentorship, resources, and experiences provided by Upward Bound. Angela now shares the knowledge she gained with her children and others, encouraging them to pursue their educational dreams.

Angela also advises students to seek out the Student Support Services (SSS) office once they enter college. SSS, a partner program to Upward Bound, offers ongoing mentorship, guidance, and resources to help students navigate the challenges of college from their freshman year through graduation. Angela regrets not having access to such a resource during her time in college but believes it would have further enriched her experience. She encourages students to take advantage of SSS, as its staff are well-versed in campus policies, procedures, and support networks, ensuring students stay on track and achieve their educational goals.
