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

Happy New Year! We are currently accepting applications for our UB Summer Program. Here is the link to apply https://uvu.gualtrics.com/jfe/form/SV ZsvljNnwpuD65. They are due January 31, 2025. During the UB Summer Program, you will have an opportunity to get a better understanding of what college life will look like when you graduate high school and go to college. It's a great opportunity, and I highly recommend that you apply. We will be earning 6-7 college credits for FREE in only 4 weeks. We will only be accepting 50 students to take advantage of this great opportunity. You won't want to miss out!

Seniors, you should be applying to colleges, financial aid (FASFA), and scholarships. Your UB Advisor is there to help you get through this process. Please reach out to them for help. Every senior in UB needs to apply to at least one college and apply for financial aid. The FASFA is FREE money that the government will give you to go to college. Almost all our UB students should qualify for some FREE money. If you are planning to go on an LDS mission after you graduate, you need to still apply to a college and defer. This will also hold any scholarships you may get until you return. UB has some waiver codes to UVU, if you need one, please reach out to your UB Advisor.


#### For Everyone Else:

It's a new year with new opportunities! First, seniors, five months before you graduate. If you haven't completed the FAFSA, I plead with you to do so. I am happy to help you with that, as is your counselor. There are tons of scholarships that you can apply for as well. As always, see the counseling center for scholarship information. Also, be sure to apply to the schools you are interested in attending. Many schools have admissions and scholarship application deadlines. You should be preparing to attend a college or university this Fall.

To all Upward Bound students, remember when you signed up to participate in Upward Bound, you committed to pursuing a four-year college degree, and completing that degree within six years after graduating high school. You owe it to yourself, to Upward Bound, and future Upward Bound students to follow through on this commitment. If you enroll in a college during the Fall after graduating high school, you are much more likely to complete your college education. The longer you wait to enroll in college, the less likely that you will follow through with that commitment. Don't delay! Start planning out your path to college now and commit to that plan!

#### A few reminders:

- The Summer Program application deadline is January 31<sup>st</sup>. The application can be completed online. Please see the weekly emails that I've been sending you for a link to the application.
- The Spring activity will be on Friday, April 11. A deposit will be required. However, your deposit will be returned to you on the morning of the activity. More information about the Spring activity will be provided to you soon. Just know that it will be worth your time to attend.
- Juniors, you will be taking the ACT at Union High School March 11-12. Additionally, the ACT is being offered at Uintah High School on February 8. It's not too late to sign up for it. And please remember, I have fee waivers that you can use to waive the registration fee.
