## The First International Conference "Women of the Mountains:"

- Was hosted on March 8th-10th, 2007 by UVU together with the Kyrgyz National Center for Development of Mountain Regions;
- Was held under the auspice of the United Nations, the World Bank and the United States Department of State;
- Gathered more than 110 experts from 21 mountainous states worldwide and 9 Rocky Mountain states of the Northern America.

- To understand the need to share our experiences in overcoming challenges caused by nature, by remoteness and by high altitude – all of which afflict mountain communities, families and women and contribute to poverty, terrorism, etc.
- To agree that it is better to exchange experiences as equal partners and human-beings rather than make attempts to explain our problems based on differences along ethnic, religious, etc. lines.





# The First International Women of the Mountains Conference:




- Has created a regional network of institutions in North America to contribute to the promotion of gender and SMD globally;
- Adopted the final document "The Orem Declaration of Mountain Women," as the roadmap for involvement of North American communities in gender and SMD activities globally and commitment to gather it with alternating sites between Utah and different mountain nations depending on funding;

The present report was prepared in response to General Assembly resolution 62/196, in which the Assembly requested the Secretary-General to report to it at its sixty-fourth session on the status of sustainable development in mountain regions. The report describes the status of sustainable mountain development at the national and international levels, including an overall analysis of the challenges that he ahead, and provides suggestions for consideration by the Assembly as to how to continue to promote and effectively sustain development in mountain regions around the world within the existing policy context, including chapter 13 of Agenda 21, the Plan of Implementation of the World Summit on Sustainable Development ("Johannesburg Plan of Implementation") and the Millennium Development Goals.

\* \* \*

58. In response to the Orem Declaration of Mountain Women (the final document of The Women of the Mountains Conference, 2007, organized by Utah Valley University and the Utah-Russia Institutie in Orem, Utah, United States of America), several institutions in the Rocky Mountain States of North America established a regional network on sustainable mountain development and gender issues. This led to exchanges of state legislatures/parliaments between Rocky Mountain States and mountain nations in Central Asia, including support of sales by Vista 360, a non-governmental organization based in the United States of hand-made local handicrafts from the mountains of Central Asia in the United States and the funding of cultural exchanges.






## The Third International Women of the Mountain Conference:

### Report of the Secretary-General

### Summary

The present report was prepared in response to the General Assembly resolution 66/205, in which the Assembly requested the Secretary-General to report to it at its sixty-eighth session on the status of sustainable development in mountain regions. The report describes the status of sustainable mountain development at the national and international levels, including an overall analysis of the challenges that lie ahead, and provides suggestions for consideration by the Assembly as to how to continue to promote and effectively sustain development in mountain regions around the world within the existing policy context, including chapter 13 of Agenda 21, adopted at the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development, the Plan of Implementation of the World Summit on Sustainable Development, Colonance Plan of Implementation", the Millennium Development Goals and the follow-up actions of the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development. The report was prepared by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations in collaboration with Governments, relevant agencies of the United Nations system and other organizations.

### G. Gender and mountain development

63. The Unlah Jalloy University and the Kyrgzy National Centre for Development of Montain Regions organized a conference to address issues critical to women and children of montains unations. Held in Peru in 2012, the conference focused on mountain communities in the Andean regions of Peru and surrounding countries, continuing the traditions of two previous international conferences organized by the voin institutions in Orem. 






## The Fourth International Women of the Mountains Conference:

## Sustainable mountain development Report of the Secretary-General

### Summary

Mountain and upland areas have a universal importance: they provide water and other global goods and services to humanity. However, mountain ecosystems are highly vulnerable to climate change, extreme weather events and land degradation and recover slowly from disasters and shocks. In the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, Member States pledged to leave no one behind and stressed the importance of reaching those furthest behind first. Mountain communities in developing countries are particularly vulnerable and require special attention, given that one in three people in those areas is at risk of hunger and malnutrition.

To achieve the Sustainable Development Goals and the targets relating to mountains as well as to poverty, hunger, sustainable agriculture, climate change and gender equality, there is a need to prioritize mountain areas by focusing on the specific challenges they face and the opportunities they provide. Mountain-specific policies and the inclusion of mountain communities in decision-making processes and capacity development can improve the livelihoods of communities while also conserving and restoring mountain ecosystems. In particular, efforts should be made to increase scientific knowledge of mountains and collect disaggregated data for sound analysis, policy advice and, ultimately, for change.

- 39. The Utah International Mountain Forum hosted the fourth International Women of the Mountains Conference at Utah Valley University in October 2015 to address the critical issues faced by women and children living in mountainous regions across the globe and provide a forum to discuss gender equality. The outcome document contained the following observations:<sup>3</sup>
- (a) Goal 5 could be achieved through strong support for improving women 's rights and welfare, including women's full and effective participation and equal opportunities for leadership at all levels of decision-making in political, economic and public life:
- (b) Successful implementation of target 6.6 could be achieved by supporting the vital role that women play in the protection of the environment and water sources, particularly as custodians of traditional knowledge that builds resilience and allows for adaptation to climate change;
- (c) With respect to target 15.1, women play a critical role in joint planning as promoters of innovation, development and cooperation for common benefit.
