Ambassador Malloy has spent close to 40 years working in Foreign Service with the State Department specializing in Soviet Union and Russian politics. Throughout her career Ambassador Malloy has had the opportunity to work in many different states including the Kyrgyz Republic, Australia, the former Soviet Union, and its successor state Russia. In her first presentation Ambassador Malloy conducted the event as a Q&A. This allowed Ambassador Malloy to specifically address what the attendants were interested in. Ambassador Malloy also spoke of the challenges faced in Ukraine as the Kiev government fights for sovereignty due to her recent posting in Kiev as head of US delegation to facilitate Ukrainian-Russian negotiations.

During her presentation Ambassador Malloy explained that in order to understand the current situation in Ukraine one must understand the history of U.S.-Russian relations. She then emphasized that in order for the U.S. to improve her relations with Russia both parties must focus on mutually beneficial topics such as counter-narcotics and the non-proliferation of nuclear weapons. Being a student of national security it was very insightful for me to hear about the work Ambassador Malloy has been doing with Russia at a time when tensions between the U.S. and Russia continue to grow.
