International Mountain Day at Utah Valley University



On December 5 2018, the Utah International Mountain Forum (UIMF), a coalition of student clubs at Utah Valley University (UVU) hosted the eight annual International Mountain Day celebration. The reason for this event was to recognize different events and activities that the UIMF was a part of trough out the year of 2018, as well as to recognize different achievements between the students, faculty, and community. As an introduction to the event Sam Elzinga, the President of UIMF expressed his feeling and thoughts on this past year and what has been accomplished. Dr. Lago mainly touched base on the conference that will take place in the Salt Lake City in August next year. He expressed his gratitude to students for getting involved in different activities on campus and that it was one of the major success points for the future. After his presentation he was awarded a gift on behalf of the UIMF and a certificate presented to him by Megan Davis, UIMF member.

Following Dr. Bladomero Lago, Mayor Richard Brunst, city of Orem was introduced to the public by Andrew Jensen, President, Model UN Club. She mentioned that she only began to work with the UN in 2011, however she was apart of humanitarian work way before that time. She showed many pictures during her presentation, which were very powerful to me personally. Mrs. Jyang shared many personal experiences and stories that she witnessed being abroad. Now her work allows foreign students to come to the US to get higher education and see the culture and the lifestyle.

The final guest was Ms. Rebecca Bindraban, the Editor-in-Chief of the Youth and the Mountain Journal. She is a current student at UVU and a Vice president of the UIMF.

She made a presentation on the main issues on 2017 issue of the journal. She also talked about how to get involved with the journal and her personal experience related to it.

At the end of all presentations Megan Davis, UIMF member presented certificates to all of the students and faculty, who contributed to the advocacy of the UN mountain agenda, as well as all of the speakers.
