- 39% of mountain people are vulnerable to food insecurity a 30% increase since 2000, despite only a 16% increase in population.
- In total, 1 out of every 3 mountain people in developing countries worldwide is vulnerable to food insecurity
- "Mapping the Vulnerability of Mountain Peoples to Food Insecurity" FAO-UN, 2015





By 2030, ensure all learners acquire knowledge and skills needed to promote sustainable development, including among others through education for sustainable development and sustainable lifestyles, human rights, gender equality, promotion of a culture of peace and non-violence, global citizenship, and appreciation of cultural diversity and of culture's contribution to sustainable development





UVU's Student Engaged Learning Model

Based on Problem-Based Learning, a four-part methodology:

- 1. Students are given a task or problem to learn
- 2. Students must work together as a group to solve the task or problem
- 3. Students have the primary responsibility of solving it on their own
- 4. Faculty serve as mentors to the process

UIMF serves as a core for this model

Nontraditional Students

- Delay enrollment (does not enter postsecondary education in the same calendar year that he or she finished high school)
- Attend part-time for at least part of the academic year
- Work full-time while enrolled
- Are financially independent for purposes of determining eligibility for financial aid
- Are married or have dependents other than a spouse (usually children, but may also be caregivers of sick or elderly family members)
- Are single parents
- Do not have a high school diploma










- UIMF members recently partnered with Rotoract International and the Frodsham Community Christmas group to make dinners and give presents to local families in need.





- -Help women improve their lives through agriculture





















































UN Sustainability Goal Number 5

"1 in 5 women and girls, including 19% of women and girls aged 15 - 49, have experienced physical and/or sexual violence by an intimate partner with the last 12 months" (#5).

The National Institute of Justice in the United States



Reports "84% of American Indian and Alaskan women have experienced sexual assault, this is 1.2x's more likely than non-Hispanic white women.

Reports that in most cases the abusers are non-Indian, or non-tribal members.

The Navajo Nation Human Rights Commission NNHRC

U.S and Canada are not "[ensuring] the safety and protection of Native women" recommends that the US and Canada "take immediate action to review, monitor, and provide comprehensive reports on violence against Indigenous women"

Navajo Area Indian Health Service

Response facilities that provide services to indigenous tribal members suffer from inadequate support structures and funding that they need to help these members when a crisis happens.

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

- In 2016, 35 Utahns died from an overdose where both gabapentin and an prescription opioid were present.
- Females accounted for 64% of the overdose deaths involving gabapentin and a prescription opioid from 2014-2016, in Utah.
- Gabapentin and prescription opioid overdose death rates were highest among Utahns aged 45-54 from 2014-2016.






