Celebrating 10 Years of International Mountain Day at Utah Valley University



The Utah International Mountain Forum (UIMF) celebrated its 10th anniversary of hosting International Mountain Day on Monday December 2nd, 2019. UIMF and its affiliates work hard to draw attention to the development of mountain communities, and International Mountain Day furthered that cause. Dr. Baktybek Abdrisaev, one of the professors heavily involved in UIMF, heavily stresses the need for student engaged learning throughout his courses. Instead, Ms. Meyer proposed ways to place an importance in the development in the STEM fields and tech fields within these towns. She has worked for political campaigns and has interned at Senator's offices in order to further this goal. She proposed several ways to further this cause, such as providing better education in these areas on how to improve their economies and also paying attention to the results. She also expressed that we as students don't need to be involved in political campaigns or senator's offices, we just need to attend events related to these issues or read an article related to these small towns.

At the end of the event, yet another example of student engaged learning was on full display. All of the students who had participated in planning and hosting events for both Rotaract and UIMF this semester were able to receive a certificate and a picture with the president of the clubs, including me. It was a very special experience to be recognized for my contributions to the clubs this semester an further showed the impact of student engaged learning on students. Nearly every on of my peers in Dr. Abdrisaev's class received a certificate for their participation this semester.
