November is Rotary Foundation Giving Month

Years ago Rotary International designated November as The Rotary Foundation Month, a reminder of the importance of giving by all Rotarians.

As Rotary clubs, we give to the Annual Fund because it is RI's "checking account" which funds district and global grants 3 years after investment.

For instance, in RY2018-19, the Rotary Foundation awarded \$866,773,399 to fund 1,306 grants for preventing disease (\$35+ million), providing clean water (\$18+ million), supporting education (\$11+ million), growing local economies (\$10.5 million) and promoting peace in the world (\$3.5 million).

Although many Rotarians are "polio-weary" after decades of supporting to this cause, we also know the importance of giving to Polio Plus. While Rotary and its partner organizations are "this close" to making polio the second human disease – after smallpox - to be completely eradicated from the earth, our work is not done, and no child is safe as long as the threat of even one more case exists in the world. Unfortunately, the last 1 percent of polio cases are the most difficult to prevent because the virus is now hiding out in some of the hardest-to-reach places on earth.

How much should we give? This year, Rotarians are encouraged to join the Polio Plus Society for a minimum annual donation of \$100 (or just \$8.33 per month) or, as a club, a cumulative minimum of \$1600 in RY2020-21 (please note the word "minimum").

There are many ways to give. Be an EREY member, become a Paul Harris Fellow; join the Paul Harris Society; or give through your estate planning. See your club's Foundation chair or the Foundation Specialist assigned to your area for more information or to sign up for the giving program of your choice.

Whether you give a little or a lot ... in the words of Mother Teresa: "It is not how much we give, but how much love we put in the giving."

Rotary Leadership Institute - November Dates

Registration deadline is November 12 so all printed materials can be received before the training.

Registration fee for each course is \$15.

All participants are reminded they must attend all six modules over the two evenings in order to receive credit for completion. Part 1 must be completed before registering for Part 2; and, Part 2 must be completed before registering for Part 3. A certificate of graduation will be issued upon completion of all 3 parts.

Yearly the club competes with Breckinridge to raise money for nonprofits as 1000s raise a glass and a ski at the same time. This year the club created home shotski packages with a contest for the best photo of the backyard event. The club sold 251 General Admission packages at \$25 each, and 66 VIP packages at \$200 each to raise more than \$20,000 to benefit the club's Nonprofit Grants Program..



Holladay Rotary has been keeping busy with a few projects. We are currently delivering food for the Utah **Crisis Food Response** on Wednesdays. This is a great socially distanced service that is needed year round. We helped load trees for Holladay City's annual tree give-away and finished delivering dictionaries for 8 area schools. We also had a drive by parade to celebrate our senior Rotarians that have not been able to attend meetings. It was so good to see them and wish them well. We were able to have a few zoom meetings, as well as socially distanced meetings at Holladay City Park. We are looking forward to a few more service projects taking us into the end of the year.



Salt Lake Rotaract had an eventful start to the school year. This September they took part in community clean-ups at the University of Utah and Jordan River Park. Salt Lake Rotaract also helped plant trees at Wheeler Historic Park with TreeUtah after the windstorms which took place in the greater Salt Lake City area.



Almost every day for three weeks, **Cedar City Rotary Club** member Karen Tavano diligently went shopping for much-needed sanitation and cleaning supplies for Navajo Nation areas still under distress from Covid-19, as part of an ongoing club support effort. For this project, the Cedar City Interact Club helped organize and box the donations for transport. Karissa Cox, Cedar City Interact Club President, said "I was really grateful to help with bringing these supplies to our neighbors in the Navajo Nation. I believe it is so important to serve those in need, and unfortunately, Covid has created a need there."



On Wednesday, October 21st, members of the **Utah Valley University (UVU) Rotaract** co-hosted World Polio Day with the UVU Office for Global Engagement and the Orem Rotary Club. The event was dedicated to the 75th anniversary of the United Nations. For a second year Rotaract student groups gained professional skills by implementing a faculty-mentored hands-on activity. Speakers were Dr. Baldomero Lago, Vice President for UVU office for Global Engagement, Yana Andersen, President of UVU Rotaract, Dr. Scott Leckman, past District Rotary governor and Dr. Dean Robinson, President of Orem Rotary. Dr. Baldomero Lago emphasized the importance of Rotaract partnering with international organizations to solve global challenges.



The Rotary Club of Dixie Sunrise had another busy month with eight days of Service Projects. Three days of working with the Utah Food Bank packaging and distributing Food boxes. Over 860 needy people received food. Assisted the Lutheran Church with their Food distribution. Went food shopping for Neighborhood Connection which resulted in 1000 Pantry Packs. Working with the American Red Cross the group ran a blood drive in In Remembrance of World Polio Day. Did the semi annual Road Cleanup and combined it with an Alzheimer's walk.

Got crafty and made a Scarecrow and donated it to the Ivan's Veterans Home for their Scarecrow Field.
