My contribution to the International Mountain Day observation at UVU



The 11th annual International Mountain Day (IMD) observation at Utah Valley University, (UVU), was a wonderful way for me to learn about the importance of mountain communities and how we as students can contribute to Sustainable Mountain Development (SMD). The focus of this year's event was the importance of preserving biodiversity in mountains. This is especially relevant to UVU students given our community's close proximity to and reliance on the Wasatch mountain ranges.

UVU's observation of IMD is unique because we are the only and the only academic institution to annually observe IMD <u>through a student engaged learning (SEL)</u>. SEL requires us students to work on practical task as a group while our teacher could be involved and provide

indirect advice when we are not able to find a solution on our own. Therefore, IMD observation was the event entirely student led.

At the start of the event, we learned about the difficulties facing people who live in mountain regions. Professor Abdrisaev, on behalf of Dr. Butler, who could not attend, mentioned that mountain communities are among the most neglected around the world, despite the importance of mountains and their resources.

Following these remarks about the challenges facing mountain people, we heard from Anna Mahalak, a Youth Engagement Manager for UNA-USA. She talked about her experiences helping young people navigate the UN system and playing an active role in actualizing Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). It was very interesting to hear how excited she was about helping young people be more engaged in UN activity and community engagement.


