
My Contribution to the Promotion of Mountain Women at the 66th session of the Commission on the Status of Women

On Monday 21th , 2022, the Utah International Mountain Forum (UIMF), a coalition of student clubs at Utah Valley University (UVU), and college students from Snow college hosted the parallel event "Inclusive Student Engaged Learning Model to Empower Mountain Women Globally" for the 66th session of the United Nations (UN) Commission on the Status of Women (CSW66).
