Utah District 5420 Honored with Four Awards at the Zone Institute

At Rotary's Big West Zone Institute held in San Diego, Utah District 5420 won four big awards. The annual meeting of Rotary clubs from all the US western states - Zone 26 and 27 - was held in November 2023. Our District won these awards:

- 1.#1 in Zone 27 for membership growth. We ended the Rotary year with 36 new members for a 2.26% increase.
- 2.#1 in the combined zones with contributions to the Rotary Foundation totaling \$5,426,472
- 3. #1 for contributions to Polio Plus at \$5,084,410
- 4. Tied for #1 for the creation of three new clubs in our District

Congratulations to all our Utah Rotary Clubs, led expertly to these achievements by District Governor Jose Velasco.

Please Help One More Club with Its Global Grant

Clubs developing global grants need contributions from other clubs to be awarded the maximum \$15,000 District Designated Funds--money that comes back to us from Rotary International three years after we donate it. The Rotary Foundation adds \$12,000 matching money to the \$15,000. That is \$27,000 awarded!

What Is a Paul Harris Fellow?

Most Rotarians know that Paul Harris was the founder of Rotary in 1905. But when asked 'what is a Paul Harris Fellow? not everyone knows the answer.

Continuing the legacy of our founder, the Paul Harris Fellow (PHF) program recognizes individuals who contribute, or who have contributions made in their name, of \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation (TRF).



Once you earn your first Paul Harris award, subsequent donations of \$1,000 or more earn a PHF+1, +2, etc. and you become a multiple PHF (up to PHF+8).

Recognition points (earned by clubs and individuals on a dollar-for-dollar basis when contributions are made to the Rotary Foundation) can be combined with cash contributions to reach the \$1,000 total. For example, you can earn your first Paul Harris award with \$500 of your own funds combined with 500 recognition points from the club or another member.

You don't even need to be a Rotarian to become a Paul Harris Fellow. Some clubs make awards (with points) to prominent community members or "friends of Rotary" as a way of showing their appreciation for what they do while making a contribution to the Rotary Foundation.

Rotary International Updates

Decisions that May Affect Our District

At the October 2023 Rotary International Directors' meeting, 48 decisions were made to improve Rotary's future. Here are the changes most likely to impact the 46 clubs in District 5420:

- On 1 July 2024, the Rotary Citation becomes the Club Excellence Award. No word on whether the criteria for this recognition will change.
- The RI President's annual theme and logo will be eliminated at the beginning of RY2025-26.
- A set of multi-year President-led action plans will be implemented in RY2025-26.
- An RI-led Peace Conference will be held in Istanbul, Turkey in February 2025.
- A membership goal of 1,250,000 Rotarians around the world has been set in celebration of RI's 125th anniversary in 2030.

As these changes are implemented, more information will be provided.

Nominations Open - Rotary Foundation Distinguished Service Award

During the period of 1 January – 29 February, any Rotarian or Rotaractor can nominate any qualifying Rotarian or Rotaractor for the Rotary Foundation Distinguished Service Award.

This award honors those who have demonstrated exemplary service to the Foundation and have received the Citation for Meritorious Service at least four years prior. For more information or to access a nomination form, go to <u>rotary.org/awards</u>.


