Include money in your club budget for an International Project

The only way to get empowering matching money back from The Rotary Foundation is by doing a global grant or helping another club fund their global grant.

If your club is developing a global grant, tell the District Foundation Committee and ask other clubs to help you with club contributions (usually

\$10,000 to \$15,000). A grant sponsoring club can get \$15,000 only if they involve two other Utah clubs in their project. They need your help!

I recommend that you visit and present to other clubs. And submit an article to the District Newsletter.

If you want to help another club, contact myself. Bruce Powell or Egor Shulman, to review some of the global grant projects other clubs are developing; then contact the club you want to help. Below are two excellent, developing global grants which need your help very much.

Bountiful Rotary pours love into raising money for kids' winter coats

We hear from principals and teachers every year telling us how this program has changed children's lives and how it has brought the community together for a cause everyone believes in.


Thank you to Governor John Redd for allowing us to continue the planting activities through the 23-4 Rotary year.

Open defecation has been a common practice in Kiribati, due to the lack of sanitation facilities in homes and communities. Each unit contains five private toilets, an indoor and outdoor shower, hand washing sinks and a large clean water tank that collects rain water.

Richfield partnered with the Host club in Tarawa and District 9920 of New Zealand as well as District 5420.

This brings the total libraries installed by Murray Rotary to over 25 and we anticipate continuing such events about twice a year. The **Utah Rotary E-club** has a Magic Treehouse book project for third graders. Every third grader gets a book of their own with a challenge to read the book and do a book report which the club provides to the students.

We set up a goal to complete the book and book report in 30 days. We have a party and the treehouse book report is the ticket to the party. Some students even do multiple book reports for an extra special surprise.

It was a fun event. At the end of the school year when the teacher asked what their favorite activity was - more than half the kids said the treehouse book report party. Reading is Powerful.



The Hurricane Valley Rotary Club had a very busy spring with many projects. The most fun of all was the Boot Stomp'n the club sponsored to raise money for the Hurricane Veterans Memorial Park the city plans to break ground for on September 11. The club also donated to the city a major portion of the proceeds from the Easter Car Show for the park. The club presented scholarships to graduating Hurricane High School seniors and joined the football team repainting the "H" on the ridge above town. Among other projects, club members took part in the ribbon cutting for a new Utah Food Bank pantry in Hurricane Valley, and worked with Habitat for Humanity to prepare for and hold its spring festival.



The **Ogden Rotary Club** kicked off summer with several really fun and diverse events! From the political side, we got to hear from Representative Rosemary Lesser of the Utah House of Representatives. She informed members about the working of the legislature and her personal goals and ambitions for the near future.

From the musical side, we got to hear from Mark Daniel, one of the talents from the musical AIDA currently in production at Ogden's Egyptian Theater.

The club also was treated to a performance by the group *Kids Act Up* who performed *Walked Like an Egyptian!* Finally, the club is looking forward to our annual Garden Party which will close out this wonderful Rotary year.



In May, the Rotary Club of Orem-**Lindon** presented the Utah Fire Chief's Association with a check for \$649. The donation was presented by President-Elect Nominee Cathy Ambrose to Chief Clint Smith, President of the Utah State Fire Chiefs Association and Mr. Brad Wardle, Director of Utah Valley University's Utah Fire and Rescue Academy. This donation will cover the cost of one Galleri Multi-Cancer Early Detection Test for a Utah firefighter. The World Health Organization has classified firefighting as a Group 1 carcinogenic profession. The Galleri test has a 99.5% specificity rate for more than 50 types of cancer using a simple blood draw. Mr. Wardle thanked the Orem-Lindon Rotarians for the donation and shared that, "Currently this type of testing is not covered by any insurance providers." A portion of the gift was funded by the club's district grant.



On Saturday, June 8, five Utah Valley University Rotaractors served alongside the 37 Orem-Lindon Rotarians, members of their families, and volunteers at the OremFest Pancake breakfast at City Center Park in Orem. This was an opportunity for them to contribute to the service to the Orem City local community as a tradition established since the 1990s.

Due to joint efforts, Rotarians and Rotaractors raised more than \$1,800 for projects including Coats for Kids.

Our participation was a practical contribution from Utah Valley University students to the implementation of the sustainable mountain development agenda in the State of Utah.



The Washington City Rotary Club was formed three years ago with the time-honored Rotary focus on community service. Answering that call each year, WCRC hosts an annual golf tournament with part of the proceeds going to the Utah Food Bank. The Mayor's Cup has become a signature event for the WCRC with elected officials, business leaders and community members all participating to support families facing food insecurity. This year's June fun, summer "hot" event was a great success with 29 teams and 117 players hitting the green. Proceeds from the event netted about \$14,600 and Rotary members were all smiles as they presented a check for \$3,000 to Utah Food Bank Southern Distribution Center Director Jacob Miner to support food bank services.



At the Change of Command Party, incoming club president Lois Mastin said, "It is my honor and privilege to serve as the president of the **Park City Sunrise Rotary Club** for the 2024-2025 Rotary year. The theme for this year is "The Magic of Rotary." Believe in the magic of Rotary, Spread the magic of Rotary, Build on the Magic of Rotary, and Celebrate the Magic of Rotary.

As a club we do all of these things . . . we have a jampacked calendar of events with something for everyone from service projects to social functions to fundraising and, of course, engaging and entertaining weekly speakers.
