

In addition to serving as a higher education administrator, Melynda is an accredited public relations strategist and has been teaching college-level public relations since 2001.


Currently, Melynda is a doctoral student at Kansas State University and is serving as president of the Utah Chapter of Public Relations Society of America (PRSA).


