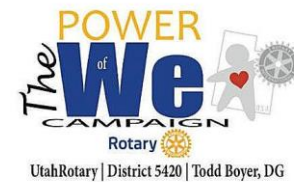
Bring one person to each service project. Demonstrate the magic of Rotary - don't just talk about it. Give them a task to do. Involve them!

Park City Sunrise Rotary celebrates eight years of vision care *and* an anticipated a Global Grant

It began in 2017 when **Park City Sunrise Rotarians** flew with a team to Uganda where they loaded nine huge bags of vision equipment along with their tiny personal bags into two buses at the airport. After a bumpy 10-hour ride, they arrived in Bwindi and began clinics. On Day 1 they turned a village schoolhouse into a Hope Alliance vision clinic complete with lensometers, autorefractors, tonometers, eye acuity charts and 3,000 pairs of eyeglasses.

Soon their patients lined up. 700 of them. Few had ever had their eyes examined. Many couldn't see. No longer could they make a living hand embroidering or sowing crops. Sight is a miracle and the Rotarians brought that miracle in the form of eye examinations and prescription eyeglasses.

The next day the vision team drove on more bumpy roads to another village. This time they set up the equipment in a partially constructed church. The Rotarians would create a vision clinic at three more villages, changing lives so completely it was the real deal - Service Above Self.

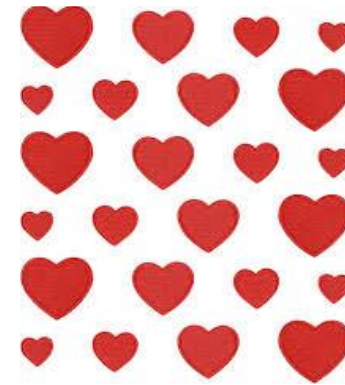
The Hope Alliance, co-founded by Dr. John Hanrahan, Utah Rotary District Governor 2019-2020, continues to run vision clinics around the world with Sunrisers on board over and over again.

This spring, the future of vision care for Ugandans will be even brighter if a **\$274,000 Global Grant** becomes a reality. Twenty-eight clubs all over the US, two from District 5420, have raised \$200,000 so far to equip the Bwindi Community Hospital Dental and Vision Clinic. More club contributions are fulfill to this dream.

- Thanks to promotion of Global Grants in this District Newsletter.
- Thanks to project sponsors for approaching other clubs, and even giving club presentations, to get more club commitments to fund their budgets.

Global Grants Prevent TB to End TB, Nepal, Water/Agricultural Productivity, Armenia, and Ukrainian Refugee School, Budapest are now fully funded. Thanks to the clubs that committed \$ to help them. The money is not collected until the Global Grant is accepted by The Rotary Foundation (TRF).

Examples from the 27 clubs helping Global Grants:

- **Monticello Rotary Club** pledged \$300 to the *Armenia Global Grant* and \$300 to the *Budapest Global Grant*. Their \$600 will be matched by District Designated Funds and the Rotary Foundation World Fund - **thus doing \$1,680 of good!**
- **Roosevelt Rotary Club** committed \$2,500 to the *Armenia Global Grant*. When matched - **\$7,000 of good!**
- **Rotarian Monty Eggett** committed his \$1,000 Paul Harris Society money to the *Reconstructive Urology Training Program, Cambodia Global Grant* - when matched Monty does **\$2,800 of good!**

Of our 18 Rotary clubs not contributing to a Global Grant this Rotary year, nine of them are funding an international project **with their own dollars without matching**. Before applying for a Global Grant, I encourage clubs to do a small pilot project using their own money with the in-country host club to prove that the host club communicates well and they do what they say they'll do. Then, having tested the host club, you can safely do a Global Grant with them and get matching \$. Doing a Global Grant is the only way to get matching money back from The Rotary Foundation.

If your club is developing a Global Grant project, please communicate with us in the District Rotary Foundation Committee. We can help you save time. We can help you avoid mistakes. *We can help you get money.*

Holy Cross Ministries and Sunrise collaborate to create custom gift bags for each family, with our South Summit Interact Club, create games and fun for kids and marvel at the Nativity pageant the children ages 4-8 enact beautifully each year. Sunrisers also laid Christmas wreaths on the graves of veterans at the Park City Cemetery during Wreaths Across America. Happy New Year, Everyone!



Millcreek Rotarians made the season bright again this December, partnering with our City Academy Interactors and the Asian Association of Utah afterschool program at a local Title 1 elementary school. Almost every Millcreek Rotarian participated in some way: buying a gift bag loaded with toys and treats for each of 24 kids, donating warm winter clothing distributed to parents after the party, bringing food and beverage to the celebration, and/or volunteering to shepherd the kids through five fun activities planned and implemented by our Interactors. The club contributed \$50 Walmart gift cards to each family, and Holbrook HVAC (a local business partner) bought a new coat for just about every family member. A great time was had by all!
